GIRLS ORGANIZE KU KLUX KLAN

The Girls' Ku Klux Klan is the name of a "new and powerful" organiza-
 tion recently formed among some of
 the high school girls of this city. A
 communication received states that
 the idea of the new club is to
 "help along the girls of this city
 by stopping false rumors and dis-
 seminating mistakes made through gos-
 siping, and lead them to higher and
 nobler life, which thing seems to be
 some from the life of the modern
 girl." P. T. Parker, secretary of the
 Portland Ku Klux Klan, said
 yesterday that no women's organiza-
 tion with the exception of the
 recently organized Women's auxil-
 iary to the Klan, had received offi-
 cial recognition. He knew nothing
 of the girls' Klan.

POLICE SEIZURE

Household Problems

Dear Miss Tingle: (1) What would be
 suitable to serve at a children's valen-
 tine box?
 (2) My pie crust is not flaky, but
 tough. Can you make it that way?
 (3) Have you a recipe for a good de-
 viled food cake, the kind the men like?
 Thank you.

I don't know just what a valen-
 tine box may be, but in any case
 refreshments for children should be
 very simple and should be deter-
 mined, primarily, by their age and
 usual diet. Except for very small
 home-made and not too rich, with
 simple cookies which may be out
 in fancy "animal" or other shapes,
 or a plain sponge cake, decorated if
 you wish, but without any heavy
 rich frosting, would be satisfactory.
 This could be preceded by some
 simple sandwiches and cocoa if de-
 sired. For children's parties a little
 fanciness and elaboration in the
