

Governor of Utah Urges Patriotism

Foreign Invasion Declared
Menace to Government.

BANKERS PUT UP ON GUARD

Immigrants From Europe Are
Branded Propagandists of An-
archism and Terrorism.

"Along with much of the finest blood of Europe we have had to accept a great deal of the scum. This pestilential breed, which knows nothing but hate and poverty, degradation and dishonesty, has spread itself like a miasma over the land and is contributing more toward unrest and dissatisfaction than all other agencies combined. America can no more assimilate it than a healthy person can digest poison." Thus did Charles R. Mabey, governor of Utah, score the anarchist and the bolshevik in his address on the "Patriotic Obligations of Peace," delivered yesterday before the members of the American Institute of Banking, assembled in one of the sessions of their national convention.

Outlaw Propaganda Spread.
"In rags and tatters they come here and sing the glories of soviet Russia and internationalism and speak of the day when the principles which communists espouse will dominate the earth," Mabey declared. "At home they pillage and murder, destroy property, violate all laws of God and man, starve children and repudiate debts. Here they beg like mendicants and wandering gypsies and allude to the time shortly to come when there will be a new order and a new life, while surreptitiously they spread propaganda against the finest system of government ever established."

"At home they have nothing but blackness, despair and death; here they describe their new method as foreshadowing the new Jerusalem which soon will descend from God on high."
"And the ignorant, the unfortunate, and sometimes even the well-to-do, listen with bated breath and open mouth while these self-made saviors expound the rights of man, the ineptness and archaism of the constitution and the wickedness of those in power."
"They forget that in spite of the war, and the consequent overturning of long-established conditions, we still dwell in the same old world, and that our salvation is to be gained not by trying out every new 'ism' that is preached from the housetops, but by adhering to those basic principles that are the common experience of the race has found to be the best."

Peace-time Patriotism Needed.
"The truth never was more apparent than now. There is a peace-time patriotism which calls for every loyal American to defend the flag, and all that it represents, just as much as that devotion which marches behind it on the eve of battle. It is the same old thing, dressed up in the same old clothes, but brought again to your attention that you have them forever etched upon your memories, and once more make a high resolve to fight in season and out of season for the preservation of this republic."
The speaker called the attention of the bankers to the fact that they represented the capital of the nation and cautioned them to work for a stable government, for without such capital could not exist.

Government Is at Stake.
Governor Mabey defended the constitution and said he was all interested in the security of this country use their efforts to blot out and destroy propaganda that is being spread for the purpose of creating sentiment for a reversal of the constitutional form of government.

Another big event on the program was the address of Governor S. Long of Tacoma, in which the "Lumber Resources of the Northwest" were discussed. He cited the fact that the northwest has the greatest bulk of the country's available timber supply and told the delegates that within the borders of Oregon was more valuable standing timber than in any other state of the union.

Timberless Age Held Myth.
"The future value of lumber as a building material will not be fixed by its scarcity, as our forests diminish, but by the keen competition of substitutes," said Mr. Long. "The alarmist need have no fear of a time when there will be no more lumber. It is well enough that he should direct his thought and energy to the conservation of what we have, the reproduction of forest growth on lands unfit for agriculture and kindred cultivation; to encourage economic conditions that will prevent forest waste. But he need not fear nor hesitate to use freely what is needed from the forest for with the enlarged use of substitutes, the lessening of forest waste, and the practice of forest reproduction there will be no lack of forest products."

Mr. Long stated that the latest statistics showed that there are 2,825,000,000,000 feet of lumber in the United States. That is, the amount of this is to be found in the states of Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and Montana, and that about one-seventh of all the timber in the country is to be found in Oregon.
The addresses of Governor Mabey and Mr. Long were the high lights of the session. There were a number of department conferences during the noon-hour at the Portland hotel.

Today will be one of the most important of the convention. The annual election of officers will be held. Carter E. Tolman, vice-president, will succeed Robert B. Locke as president.

Contests for Executive Council.
There is a contest on for positions on the executive council. Candidates in the field are A. C. Burchett, of Memphis, Norman T. Hayes, of Philadelphia, James F. Hart, of Des Moines, Grover C. Clark of Utica, Bert V. Chappel of Cleveland and Frank N. Hall of St. Louis. Only one active candidate is in the race for vice-president and he is Clarence R. Chaney of Minneapolis.

One of the features of the session yesterday was a debate between representatives of the New York and Seattle chapters on the subject of whether the United States should cancel the inter-allied war debt. Seattle won the honors with a team consisting of Casper W. Clarke, Allen P. Hull and Herbert C. Bryant. New York's team, which took the affirmative, was composed of J. V. D. Stryker, C. H. Schoeb and E. A. Lahm.

COURT RELEASES NEGRO

VIOLATION OF MANN ACT IS
NOT SHOWN, DECREE.

Judge Wolverton Stops Case and
Orders Jury to Return Ver-
dict Acquitting Prisoner.

Because the government failed to prove the charge against the prisoner, Judge Wolverton in the United States court yesterday cut short the trial of Douglas Roberts, accused white slaver, and directed the jury to return a verdict of acquittal.

Roberts, a negro, was part owner of a lodging house at Kelso, Wash. His partner in the venture, a white woman named Eleanor Bello, went on a moonshine party and woke up in Portland. She telegraphed Roberts for funds with which to return to Kelso, but the prisoner, aware of the Mann act, telegraphed back that she would have to look elsewhere for her fare. The woman finally borrowed \$5 from one of Roberts' Portland friends and returned to the Kelso house.

Max Rosenbloom, Seattle merchant who started off for San Francisco with Billie Ward, chorus girl, and was caught with her at Ashland, was acquitted of a charge of violating the Mann act. The verdict was reached Tuesday night and was opened by Judge Wolverton Wednesday morning. Rosenbloom's wife and child were present at the trial, the wife taking the witness stand in his behalf and showing an evident intention to take back the run, away husband.

was hope. It had been discovered, the message said, that Kate Walsh had another living husband when she married Lord Euston. Hence, his marriage was invalid.

Overjoyed, the young lord hurried home and began proceedings for an annulment. Search was made for George Manley Smith, the alleged first husband. Finally he was found and agreed to testify for Lord Euston.

But the wife's lawyers hurled a bombshell into the annulment proceedings by proving from Smith's own lips on cross-examination that he himself had had another wife when he married Kate Walsh. The court held that the woman's first marriage was invalid and that the subsequent ceremony making her Lady Euston was null and void. She remained Lord Euston until her death.

ESCAPEES ARE NUMEROUS.

Edward Euston's landlady said the dead watchman had been proud of his name, Euston.

In any event Lord Euston's troubles did not stop with the death of Kate Walsh. The records show that he was involved in other scrapes in London—first with a chorus girl, and finally, in 1903, his creditors beset him. Twice he was declared bankrupt and late that year he left his native land for America.

There is a long gap in the record. Then in 1912 the record set forth that Lord Euston had died.

Peering records at the British consulate here tally with newspaper clippings in their lack of details of his death. There was no date save the year, though the obituary record in other cases gave the month and day of death. There was nothing to show where Lord Euston died, or how he died.

MANY SMALL FIRES SEEN

Blazes in Polk County Apparently
Doing Little Harm.

DALLAS, Or., July 19.—(Special.)—John M. Grant, ex-sheriff of Polk county, now assistant fire warden, made a survey of the forest-fire situation in this county Tuesday morning by airplane. He made the trip in one of the government planes sent for patrol duty and reported a number of large brush fires still burning in the western part of the county, but not particularly menacing standing timber unless a high wind should come up.

Teacher Weds School Director.

CORVALLIS, Or., July 19.—(Special.)—George W. Deenan of this city and Mrs. Emma Ragdale of Salem were married yesterday at Cottage Grove. Mrs. Ragdale has been teaching in the Corvallis schools for the past three years and was a member of the United States school board. She has been prominent in local politics for a good many years, having served as county superintendent of Benton county, as district attorney and is at present chairman of the Benton county republican central committee.

Man's Body Identified.

MARSHFIELD, Or., July 19.—(Special.)—A body taken from the bay last night was identified as that of Ed Vandecarr, aged about 35, a man despondent over poor health, frequent injuries and a divorce complaint recently filed by his wife. Vandecarr had been missing for several days. There are five children surviving.

PROBE PLANS ARE LAID

SCORES SUBPENAED TO TELL
OF JACKSON OUTRAGES.

Grand Jury Investigation Or-
dered by Governor to Begin
on Monday, July 24.

MEDFORD, Or., July 19.—(Special.)—Subpenas were issued today by the sheriff's office for scores of witnesses to appear Monday, July 24, before the special grand jury ordered by Governor Olcott to investigate the series of outrages in this county last spring. Among the number was Assistant District Attorney Doran of Los Angeles county, California, who has been requested to bring with him data and letters found in a raid following the Ingleside affair, and bearing on the local situation.

The sessions will be held in the federal building, this city, owing to the inaccessibility of the courthouse at Jacksonville and the lack of facilities to handle the large volume of business slated to come before the body.

It was at first reported that the attorney general's office would be represented by Assistant Attorney-General Liljequist, but this was denied locally, the name of the official not being made public, if he has been selected.

The outrages to be investigated are "racket parties" perpetrated in this county last March and April, in which J. F. Hale, a piano dealer of the city was a victim, being tortured and threatened with hanging. Arthur Burr, a negro, upon the completion of a 30-day sentence for bootlegging, was "captured," taken in an auto to the summit of the Siskiyou and after having a rope tied around his neck was told to run.

PATROL TO BE LIMITED

FORESTER TELLS OF PLANS
OF FIRE SERVICE.

Planes to Be Operated on More
or Less Emergency Basis in
Oregon This Season.

A. O. Waha, assistant district forester in charge of operations, returned yesterday from Salem, where he conferred with the airman who are commissioned to act as a forest fire patrol in Oregon this summer.

"The patrol will be operated on a more or less emergency basis this season," said Mr. Waha yesterday. "On account of the scarcity of planes, the service will be carried on only when there is urgent need."

At present, on account of the prevalence of smoke, no regular routes of patrol will be designated.

"The airman will serve in reconnaissance work where groups of small fires are being fought and where forest supervisors engaged in fighting request the assistance of the planes. In case of large fires the planes will do scout duty and carry observers to secure desired information for the fighters. No regular observers will be employed. When they are needed forest service men will accompany the fliers."

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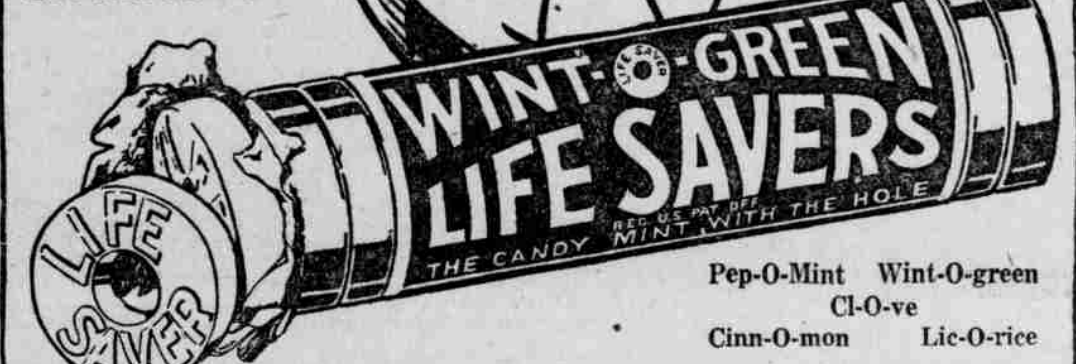

"The eight planes are to be equipped with radio sets, so that upon securing information it can be immediately transmitted to patrol headquarters and relayed to the fighters. To operate the radio equipment at Eugene, Salem and
