

**WARNING GIVEN PARENTS**

**BOY'S DEATH UNDER WHEEL OF SPRINKLER REASON.**

Superintendent of Street Bureau Says Children Should Know Danger of Vehicles.

The tragic death of Glenn McCulloch, 5 years old, who was crushed under a heavy street sprinkling cart, prompted Alex Donaldson, superintendent of the street-cleaning bureau, to issue a warning to parents concerning children following these vehicles.

"Parents should impress upon their children the danger of darting in front of or following in the rear of the sprinklers," he said. "Every day the drivers of these carts and employees in the department stop to warn children about this danger. Hardly a day goes by but that I drive children from the carts."

"The children frequently run in front of the carts in order to wet their bare legs and feet, and should one of these children slip and fall it would be almost impossible to bring

the sprinkler to a stop on the wet pavements."

Mr. Donaldson said that E. J. Bennett, who drove the cart that crushed the McCulloch boy, had left his vehicle at least twice to warn the children not to follow in the rear of the machine. Before he began to back the sprinkler he looked on both sides and saw none of the children. He backed slowly and when he heard a woman scream he stopped, but it was too late; the child had been crushed.

"Parents of children should make it their business to impress this constant danger upon their children."

**RABID DOGS BITE SIX MEN**

Victims of Hydrophobic Canines Take Pasteur Treatment.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 20.—(Special.)—Six persons in Lewis county have been bitten by two rabid dogs within the last few days, Dr. L. C. Felton, state veterinarian, said yesterday. The dogs have been killed. Each dog bit three persons, all of whom promptly took the Pasteur treatment.

The department of agriculture is watching the situation closely and should any more cases develop among the dogs of Lewis county a rabies quarantine may be declared.

**MRS. DIEMER RETALIATES**

**WIFE OF X-RAY SPECIALIST TO FIGHT DIVORCE SUIT.**

Aspersions on Portland and Folk of Oregon, Attributed to Her, Denied by Defendant.

She likes Portland and its people and never even has intimated that she considered Oregonians "too uncouth and crude to live with," is the assertion of Mrs. Lucille Diemer in an answer to the divorce complaint recently filed by her husband, Dr. F. E. Diemer, x-ray specialist of this city. Though making counter charges of cruelty, Mrs. Diemer does not ask a divorce herself, seeking only the dismissal of her husband's suit.

Dr. Diemer charged that his wife considered herself a "southern aristocrat" living among uncouth people and married to a man of low breeding, allegations which her answer denies with spirit. She is very well satisfied with Portland, her chosen home, she says, and left her husband to return to her

Tennessee home at one time only because his treatment of her had become unbearable.

The marriage was a war romance, Dr. Diemer being an officer in the army stationed at Camp Lewis, Wash., when he met his future wife in Tacoma. They were married in that city in October, 1917.

The year after marriage Dr. Diemer began to drink heavily, staying out until 2 and 3 o'clock in the morning and cursing her on his arrival home, Mrs. Diemer asserts. At one time he brought home a keg of liquor and stationed it in the bathroom, she says.

On one occasion Dr. Diemer hit his wife in the face with a flank steak, twisted her right arm and grabbed a butcherknife with the threat, "I am going to kill you," Mrs. Diemer charges. She denied that she ever made a scene in his office by shrieking and interrupting his work with patients. For the support of herself and child, \$10 a month is asked during the pendency of the suit.
