

EIGHT WOMEN SEEK OFFICES IN TEXAS

Seven Out for Legislature and One for Congress.

STATE PRIMARIES TODAY

Fight on Representative Blanton Bitter, While Five Candidates Oppose Senator Culberson.

DALLAS, Tex., July 21.—Seven women are seeking nomination to the house of the Texas state legislature, at the democratic primary tomorrow.

They are: Katie Daffan, Houston; Mrs. Sidney H. Houston, Houston; Mrs. C. P. Fain, Livingston; Mrs. J. A. McConnell, Crockett; Hattie Walker, Alto; Edith Williams, Dallas; and Julia Sue Gott, Rosebud.

A large number of ex-members of the legislature are candidates to succeed themselves, but as the state has been redistricted they are not incumbents in the sense that they are seeking nomination from the districts that they formerly represented.

Five Candidates Unopposed.

Five candidates for state office nominations are without opposition. They are: George B. Terrell of Austin, for commissioner of agriculture; W. A. Keeling, Austin, for attorney-general; Judge C. M. Curston, for chief justice of the Texas supreme court; Judge Thomas B. Greenwood, for associate justice of the Texas supreme court; and Judge P. L. Hawkins of Austin, for justice of the court of criminal appeals, to fill the unexpired term of Judge Davidson.

There are contests for the nominations for governor, lieutenant-governor, state treasurer, railroad commissioner, commissioner of land office, superintendent of public instruction, judge of the court of criminal appeals, and controller of public accounts.

Aspirants to State Offices.

The candidates for state offices are:

Governor—Governor Pat M. Neff; Fred S. Rogers, Bonham; W. B. King, Graham; and Harry T. Warner, Paris.

Lieutenant-governor—W. A. Johnson, Memphis; Hulla Mayfield, J. Houston; T. W. Davidson, Marshall; Joe E. Edmondson, Grapeland; and A. S. Jamison, Fort Worth.

State treasurer—L. E. Tammison, Clifton; George B. Garrett, Dallas; E. A. Christian, Austin; D. Carroll, Comanche; C. V. Terrell, Austin; and A. H. Kerr, Fort Worth.

Railroad commissioner—Allison Mayfield, Austin; and J. C. Mason, Merkel.

Commissioner of land office—J. T. Robinson, Austin; and J. C. Thompson, Crowell.

Superintendent of public instruction—Ed R. Bentley, McAllen; J. G. Smith, Rankin; and S. M. N. Marris, Austin.

Court of criminal appeals—Judge W. C. Morrow, Austin; and A. J. Harper, El Paso.

Controller of public accounts—Lon A. Smith, Austin; and William M. Woodall, Austin.

For the state senate there are 10 contested places out of 17 and for the house there are 45 contested places.

Second Primary August 26.

The primary tomorrow will decide many of the democratic nominees—United States senator, representatives in congress and the state ticket. A second primary, August 26, is expected to determine the nominees in a few races. Nomination is considered equivalent to election. A majority is required for nomination in the first primary and wherever no candidate receives a majority the two high candidates will enter the second primary.

In the race for the United States senatorship, Charles A. Culberson, incumbent, has five opponents, and in some counties possibly six.

Other candidates for the senatorial nomination are R. L. Henry, Waco; Earle B. Mayfield, Austin; Clarence Osley, Fort Worth; and Cullen F. Thomas, Dallas.

Blanton Makes Hard Fight.

Of the 11 congressional districts in which there are contests for the democratic nomination, the 17th, which now is represented by Thomas L. Blanton, is attracting most interest because of the action in the house in censuring him. Mr. Blanton has four opponents. Mr. Blanton has defended himself energetically in his own district, where he claims many staunch supporters.

Those opposing him are: Ernest G. Albright, Brownwood; Oscar Calloway, Comanche; J. B. Dibreil, Coleman; and N. S. Holland, Jones county.

Usually nomination at the democratic primaries is equivalent to election. This has not been the rule, however, in the 14th district, which now is represented in congress by Harry M. Wurzbach, a republican.

Defeat of Republican Sought.

The democrats believe they can defeat the republicans in this district this year, and six men seek the democratic nomination. All are from San Antonio. They are Carlos Bee, J. H. Cunningham, Harry Hertzberg, W. D. Glover, S. D. Hopkins and James A. Harley.

One woman, Mrs. F. M. B. Hughes, of Wharton is seeking nomination for congress. She is running in the ninth district, and is opposing not only J. J. Mansfield, Columbus, the present representative, but four other men—W. M. Fly, Gonzales; W. S. Holman, Bay City; George J. Schleicher, Cuero; and J. W. Griffin, Davy.
