YOUNG GERMANS CURBED

MEETING OF WURZBURG UNIVERSITY MEN FORBIDDEN.

Students' Attitude Held Wholly Monarchistic—Anti-Semitic Campaign Is Feared.

BERLIN, July 23.—Because the authorities fear that the students of the University of Wurzburg will turn their annual convention into a monarchist demonstration and a pogrom against the Jews they have forbidden the meeting. The authorities assert that the students' attitude is wholly monarchistic and their anti-semitic campaign is carried on to the point of violence.

Commenting on the government's plans for maintaining the republic through suppression of treasonable organizations, the Deutsche Tageszeitung, a reactionary sheet, makes a frank admission that Germany is a republic without republicans, and declares "this reign of terror is worse than Russia."

Meanwhile it is reported that the police have obtained complete documents showing that the monarchists paid the expenses of the murder organization alleged to be responsible for recent political assassinations. Daily arrests are being made and the total is now more than 1400.

Idly as road conditions permitted. It is impossible to make a good time on mountain roads, new grades and detours, as it is on pavement. However, even the worst road in Oregon can be traveled by a careful driver.

There is on the state road map a route called the Pendleton-John Day highway. This is the state's worst road. A delegation talked to the commission for three hours in Pendleton, but to no avail.

There are other roads in Oregon having as bad and dangerous-looking grades, but the grade on the North Fork is so long that the detour is a long one. Some day the highway will be built, but it will cost more than \$2,000,000 to do so, because of much heavy construction before the highway. Unsettled and Grant counties and the forest service may improve some of the sections.

Spray-Heppner Road Bad.
Another tough road which the commission traveled is a so-called Pendleton cut-off between Spray and Heppner. No decision was reached by the commission regarding either of these roads. They are called roads by courtesy.

Between Austin and Unity, no work has been done on the John Day highway, as this is a section for co-operation between the government and the county. The present trail is a weird affair, but when the new section is constructed by the forest service it will shorten the distance and will be a much desired improvement. That section, another near Cummings creek, and one at the Gilliam county end are all that will be graded to open the John Day highway from the Columbia highway at Heppner Junction to Ontario, on the Snake river.

Trip Begun July 6.
The commission left Portland July 6, going down the Pacific highway to Roseburg, thence to Coquille and Marshfield; to Bandon and down the coast highway to Crescent City, Cal. From the California town the party went to Grants Pass, taking a side trip to the marble caves in Josephine county, and ordering three more miles of road for the caves. At Medford the party split, one section going to Crater lake over the new roads and the other using the Green Spring mountain road, both parties uniting at Klamath Falls. The next objective was Lakeview and thence north to a connection with the Central Oregon highway and into Bend. From Bend the commission traveled to Prineville and traveled the Ochoco highway to Mitchell, then going to Antone and crossed the mountains into John Day highway. This was followed to Ontario, at which place the Old Oregon trail was followed to LaGrande, a side run being made to Joseph over the LaGrande-Enterprise highway. From Pendleton the commission struck south over the state's worst road, reaching Dayville. By following west the commission traveled through Picture gorge to Spray. Here the party divided again, one easying the proposed short-cut to

SOAP SENT TO MOSCOW

First Deal Between Private Russian and Foreign Firms Made.

RIGA, July 23.—The first trade transaction between a private concern in Russia and a private foreign concern since the abolishment of the foreign trade monopoly was completed here today.

Armour & Co. of Chicago, through their agent, J. C. Luttkes, shipped 3000 cases of soap to a private co-operative trading company in Moscow. A second shipment, under the new

trade control inaugurated by the bolsheviks will leave tomorrow. Landford & Co., a British concern, is shipping 700 barrels of herring to Moscow.

Both transactions were completed by the concerns obtaining permits from the soviet trade representatives.

DEBT TO BE REFUNDED

Large Government Obligations to Come Due August 1.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 23.—Secretary Mellon will announce early this week the government's programme to take care of financial obligations due August 1. It was indicated tonight at the treasury. On August 1, about \$250,000,000 of treasury certificates mature. At the same time the treasury was expected to take the first step in its programme for refunding about \$4,500,000,000 of the nation's short dated debt maturing during the present fiscal year.

AWARD OF TITLES ROUSES ENGLAND

Lloyd George Under Fire From All Quarters.

TITLE AGENCY ALLEGED

Old Aristocracy Enraged by Pollution of Private Ground; Dominions Enter Protest.

LONDON, July 23.—(Special by Wireless.)—Lloyd George's government, like the cat, has many lives, and it is possible that it will survive the disclosures of the corrupt traffic in honors from the crown. But the feeling is more deeply stirred on this subject than ever before. The attack comes from all quarters. The old aristocracy is outraged over the pollution of their private waters. The liberals are angry because of this corruption in public life. Labor is rejoicing because of the exposure of these scandals in capitalistic society.

For the moment the premier has diverted the attack by the appointment of a royal commission to investigate. That he is seriously concerned is evidenced by his refusal to create a parliamentary commission to probe the charges to the bottom. The royal commission has put the question in cold storage until the scandal blows over.

Fixed Prices Charged.
The sale of crown honors long has been notorious, but in the past money never has been the only consideration. Character and public service have been the supposed basis for the honors conferred. Now it is alleged the distribution of titles has been a bare-faced money transaction. It is charged that there is a regular fixed price for honors according to the character of the recipient. The more shady the candidate the larger the price paid. Bankruptcy is no obstacle. Police court is no obstacle. A man convicted of food-hoarding during the war was made a baronet. Cases of this kind are innumerable. War profiteers have blossomed into knights, baronets and peers of the realm.

Title Agency Alleged.
The duke of Northumberland disclosed letters from touts to customers for titles. He alleged a regular agency for titles exists. The scandal is not without its comic aspects. It is declared that one man, a frequent bankrupt, received knighthood and then recovered the money he paid through threatening a future bankruptcy with consequent exposure of the transaction.

A most sinister feature has been the shower of honors conferred on anyone who controlled newspapers. It is not suggested money was involved here. The method was to obtain the favorable attitude of the press toward the government. Every owner of a Sunday paper in London has received a peerage or a baronetcy from Lloyd George in the last five years. The Harmsworth family received two viscountcies and two baronetcies. The surest way to enter the old nobility is to purchase a newspaper and say nice things about the government. Parliament is strong in favor of the press government. A half dozen newspaper owners make English opinion. All have received honors from the premier.

Dominions Against Titles.
Another grave aspect is the effect on the overseas dominions. Already Canada has revolted. Now South Africa is outraged by the proposal to give a peerage to Robinson. No self-respecting overseas dominion henceforth will tolerate titles which are under suspicion. This is a healthy sign but a severe blow on the mother country.

Where does the money go? Northumberland alleges Lloyd George has a campaign fund of from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000. It is notorious that money has been spent in certain constituencies like water. The tory allies of the premier complain his own party is overflowing while their own is depreciating. Meanwhile legislation prohibiting trade unions levying on their members for political purposes aroused the indignation of the labor party.

Abolition of Titles Wanted.
The present revelations are unjust to the king, as the discredit belongs to others. He acts on the recommendation of the lords. The remedy is that all nominations for titles be acted upon by a committee of the privy council and that the services honored be made public. But the true remedy is to sweep away all titles, which, after all, are antiquated and reminiscent of feudalism. England and Japan are the only two great countries to retain them. No safeguards can make them sanitary. They are a stink in the nostrils of the public. The vulgarities of their

social atmosphere corrupt public life and insult public intelligence by creating false standards of human relationship. Plunkism and snobbery still are powerfully rooted in the English character, but liberal opinion is strongly moving in favor of its abolition and the present revelations have brought strong reinforcements to this view.

Lloyd George may yet live in history as the man who destroyed the order of nobility by making it cheap.

JAPAN PLANS OPEN DOOR
Wish Is for Friendly Relations With Siberia, Says Embassy.

BERLIN, July 23.—The Japanese embassy, replying to the charges of M. Tchitcherine, foreign minister of Russia, regarding Japanese designs on Siberia, declares that Japan intends to maintain the open door. "Although the Dairen conference was not successful," says the embassy's statement, "Japan has decided to recall all its troops from Saghalien when satisfactory amendments are made for the Nikolaevsk massacre. This should end talk of Japan's intentions of attacking the far eastern republic. Japan's only wish is for friendly relations with its neighbors and recognition of the open door policy."
