Y. M. C. A. WORKER HOME FROM SIBERIA—Bert G. Mitchell, formerly business secretary of the Portland Y. M. C. A., has returned to his home in Detroit after three years in Siberia. He was first stationed at Ekaterinburg, in the Ural mountains, until the Bolsheviks drove out him and his fellow workers. He stopped at Omsk, at that time the capital of the Kolchak government, and lived in the home of Nicolai Zephoroff, minister of munitions and supplies, but the Bolsheviks arising again forced evacuation. Mr. Mitchell became executive secretary and later city secretary of the associations at Vladivostok and Harbin, Manchuria. He has been instrumental in helping Russian students get scholarships in American educational institutions.

ANNA M. MCGINN FURNERAL TODAY—Funeral services for Anna M. McGinn, Oregon pioneer and mother of Henry E. McGinn, well known local attorney, will be held at St. Mary's pro-cathedral, Sixteenth and Davis streets, at 9:15 o'clock this morning. Interment will be at Mount Calvary cemetery. The funeral procession will leave the residence, 181 North Twenty-third street, at 9 o'clock. The following will act as pall-bearers: John F. Daly, Joseph E. Wiley, Charles A. Shea, Edmund H. Shea, Rowland E. Chapman and Irving R. Stearns. Mrs. McGinn, who was the widow of Charles McGinn, pioneer baker and cracker manufacturer, came to Portland in 1858 and has made Portland her home since that date. She died at her residence Friday night, at the age of 87 years.

PLANT MINING BUSINESS UNARRESTED—Destruction of the Portland Flouring Mills plant at Prescott, Wash., will in no way effect the business of the company, stated Frank L. Shull, an official of the corporation, yesterday. The company operates another mill at Dayton, Wash., only a few miles from Prescott and it is thought that the latter plant will be able to handle the work done by the Prescott mill. No definite plans for rebuilding the structure destroyed in Saturday's blaze have been made by company officials. Mr. Shull stated.

DR. DINGLEY TO SPEAK—Dr. Edwin J. Dingley of Shanghai, publisher, author, explorer, traveler and trade expert, will give an address on "China, the Great Potential Market of the Near Future," at a joint meeting of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and the Chamber of Commerce at the Oregon building tomorrow night at 8:30. Mr. Dingley is publisher and editor of the weekly journal, "China and Far East Finance and Commerce."

DRINK DISPENSER ARRESTED—Ben Adler, soft drink vendor, dealt in drinks far from soft, according to the police who raided his establishment at 211 Third street and found 11 pints of moonshine. Adler was charged with violating the prohibition law with his police court hearing scheduled for today. A clerk who was in charge of the establishment at the time of the raid also was held on a liquor charge.

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tartar, 1/4 teaspoonful of salt, 1 teaspoonful of vanilla. Use the same size cup, preferably a measuring cup, for all ingredients.

Put the whites of the eggs and salt in a large mixing bowl and whip them with a wire whip until they "cut"—that is, until you can cut them with the whip and leave the cut smooth. Add the cream of tartar and heat again until you can invert the bowl. Sift the sugar and add it very slowly, using the wire whip all of the time. Sift the flour four times and fold it in a little at a time. Fold it in—don't beat vigorously. Lastly add the vanilla. Pour into an ungreased tin and bake 45 minutes in a slow oven. When it is removed from the oven invert the tin over two others so that there will be a circulation of air on all parts.

When cool ice with the following: One cup of sugar, 1/4 cup of milk or cream, 12 candied cherries or 1 slice of candied pineapple chopped very fine. Add the milk to the sugar and then add the pineapple. The latter may be omitted.

PORTLAND, Or., May 6.—Dear Miss Tingle: Can you tell me how to make the boiled French meringues the "kissers"? Thanking you, B. C. K.

Try the following: French Meringues—Two cups sugar, 4-cup water, whites of 5 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, or rose, or almond or any preferred flavoring. Boil the sugar and water to a "firm ball" or about 242 degrees F. Beat the eggs until stiff, pour the syrup upon them. Beat well. Set the pan in cold water and turn the mixture over and over for about five minutes. Cover and let stand 15 minutes. Shape with a pastry tube on a buttered sheet or paper sifted with cornstarch. If desired, color may be used to give a faint pink or green tint.
