STAVE EXPORTER IS HERE—Louis Warner, owner and proprietor of the Louis Warner Stave company, with headquarters in Shreveport, La., is in this city visiting on an extended pleasure trip. He is one of the largest exporters of staves in the business. Shreveport is the headquarters of the operations of his business for the reason that it is in the heart of his timber holdings, which are located in Arkansas and Texas. He exports to France, Argentina and the West Indies to wine manufacturers principally. Some of the finest of his staves are hand made in the forests by expert foreign craftsmen who have come to this country from Europe and have been long in the trade. Calveson, Tex., is the shipping point to France, and Mobile and New Orleans for the other countries.

SLEEPER SERVICE TO BE ABANDONED—Through sleeper service will be put on by the Southern Pacific railroad between Portland and Newport and the Yaquina Bay territory for the remainder of the summer. It was announced yesterday. The car will be sent from Portland on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 1 A. M., the service being instituted on Friday of this week. It will be handled on a special train leaving Albany at 7:50 A. M. and arriving at Yaquina Bay about noon. The car, it was explained, the special sleeper service is needed to take care of increasing summer tourist business and commercial travel occasioned by greater lumber activities at Toledo and around Yaquina bay.

DRUG HOSPITALS URGED—His experience as police judge has convinced Municipal Judge Ekwall that there should be special hospitals for the treatment of drug addicts, he said yesterday. A surprising percentage of the petty thievery and vagrancy cases coming before him in police court are of persons addicted to the use of drugs, and under present conditions there is no successful method of trying to reclaim these addicts, he pointed out. "An institution that is successful must be one where the addicts may be cured by degrees and kept there many months after they are apparently cured," he said.

EX-SENATOR CHAMBERLAIN RETURNED—George E. Chamberlain returned to Portland Sunday night. He explains that he will remain here for a week to rest and visit his family. The ex-senator, now a member of the United States shipping board, decided to look around his old home after completing hearings on the Pacific coast on the advisability of enforcing section 28 of the merchant marine act of 1920. It is probable that renewed representations will be made to the shipping board by Portland's need of increased ship allocation by the shipping board.

LIQUOR POSSESSION FINED—When the tailoring business gets a bit dull Ben Adler deals in liquor as a side line in order to pay the rent. This was indicated in police court yesterday when Adler was fined \$25 for the possession of 11 pints of moonshine. The liquor was found cached in his tailoring establishment. Adler denied ownership of the liquor and said he did not know of its presence in his place of business. He admitted on the witness stand, however, that he had recently pleaded guilty to a charge of selling liquor.

CLUB SMOKER ANNOUNCED—Members of the Portland Motor Boat club will participate in a big smoker to be held in the clubhouse tonight to celebrate the completion of the membership drive. Two teams have been competing against each other in securing new members recently and prizes will be awarded to the individual members of the teams that have brought in the greatest number of new candidates.

LIQUOR CHARGE PAID—Zekie Wilson, proprietor of the Coo-Coo pool hall at Seaside, is not a bootlegger, a jury in Judge Wolverton's federal court decided yesterday. Wilson had been arrested in February after a prohibition agent said that he had purchased a pint of liquor in the place. The jury, after deliberating for several hours, returned with a verdict acquitting the prisoner yesterday.

CASH REGISTER LOOTED—A sneak thief ran into House's restaurant, 128 Third street, and stole \$25 in currency from the cash register early yesterday while waiters and other employees were in the rear of the restaurant. Charles Schmidt, waiter, entered just in time to see the thief run through the front door. He gave chase, but was unable to catch him.

CHURCH PICNIC SLATED—Members of the Presbyterian Missionary society of the Sellwood Presbyterian church will meet at Evergreen station Friday night for a big picnic and social meeting. Families of the members are included in the invitation list and a big dinner will be a feature of the affair.

BURGULARS ENTER HOME—Burglars "hummled" their way into the home of J. W. West, 784 East Fifty-ninth street North, while the members of the family were asleep upstairs, and made away with a quantity of loot, including wearing apparel, a watch and \$1 in silver.

AUTO THEFT CHARGED.

DAMAGES OF \$30,000 ASKED—Damages of \$30,000 from the Portland Taxi cab company are sought by P. L. Wilkinson in a suit filed against that company in the circuit court yesterday. He asserts that he was painfully injured when struck by a

taxi at Tenth and Yamhill streets while crossing on March 17. He was dragged about 25 feet by the machine and badly mangled, he says.

PREVAIL DAY'S SPIRIT—The annual picnic of the Montavilla Baptist church and Sunday school has been set for this year for August 9 and a committee is going ahead with arrangements. The affair will be held in Laurelhurst park and a programme for the entire day is being prepared. Last year there were more than 250 present and it is hoped to exceed this attendance this year.

FOUR CONVICTS GO EAST

Quartet to Serve Terms at Leavenworth Prison.

Because McNeill's island prison is filled to capacity, four prisoners recently convicted in federal court here started last night for Leavenworth prison to serve their sentences. They were T. Takimoto, Japanese sailor accused of smuggling narcotics, who received 18 months; M. Matus, another Japanese, who smuggled two fellow countrymen into the United States and who received a like sentence; Homer Earl and Tommy Ryan, drug addicts and dope peddlers, both convicted under the Harrison act and both sentenced to 13 months. Deputy United States Marshal Smith was in charge, with City Detective Graves acting as guard.

Graves, who is connected with criminal investigation work at police headquarters, plans to make a further study of this work at the central identification bureau connected with the federal prison at Leavenworth.

\$20 Liquor Fine Eats Up Junk Dealer's Profit.

LEAVITT, junk dealer, was agreed yesterday that you can't beat the police on any kind of a business deal.

Last week he purchased a large part of the police department's empty liquor bottles which had been taken in "bootlegging" raids. He figured a neat little profit on the re-sale of these empties.

But when he found a full bottle of moonshine among the supposedly empty bottles, he was very properly fined \$20 for possession of moonshine. But Judge Ekwall decreed that the mere possession of liquor, regardless of how it was procured, was evidence of guilt.

The court assessed a fine of \$20 and the police got back their moonshine. Leavitt paid the fine but declared that the expected profit on the empty bottles had been more than consumed by the police in their little deal with him.

In police court yesterday Leavitt sought to win his freedom on the novel plea that he could be guilty of nothing when the police had by mistake given him the pint of moonshine. But Judge Ekwall decreed that the mere possession of liquor, regardless of how it was procured, was evidence of guilt.
