

Present System Held Cause of Great Waste.

LOSS PUT AT BILLION National Lumber Manufacturers' Association Takes Up Matter at Session Here.

The need for working out some plan for the standardization of the lumber product of the country with a view to eliminating the enormous waste in this industry was the principal subject taken up at the opening session yesterday at the Multnomah hotel of the directors of the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association.

Waste Declared Great. In an address made during the session, Mr. Durgin expressed the belief that the lack of standardization in lumber manufacturing is largely responsible for the annual waste in that industry, which he placed at \$1,000,000,000. Lumber is not alone in this industry, he declared, for he estimated that all the large industries are suffering from the same lack of standardization and suffer an annual loss of at least 20 per cent of the capital, material, labor and mental effort expended in their conduct each year.

Discussion Follows Speech. L. S. Case of Spokane, chairman of the committee on grade nomenclature at the recent gathering of lumbermen in Aberdeen, Washington, D. C., for discussion of standardization plans, spoke on the progress of the plan for standardization, and A. C. Dixon of Astoria, president of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, also discussed this same plan of standardization. The general discussion was presided over by John W. Hodgett, president of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association.
