Array of Fruit Enough to Make Mouth Water.

GREEN APPLES APPEAR

Peaches, Plums, Melons, Corn Eggplant, Tomatoe and Other Edibles Plentiful.

Bartlett pears from California, the first of the season, will be in the stores and markets today priced at 35 and 40 cents a dozen. The fruit still has the appearance of being green and as the shipment arrived on Friday, this may be the case. Bartlett pears are best when taken from the trees as soon as the stem from the trees as soon as the stem enaps with the lifting of the fruit; then they should be put aside and allowed to ripen and become mellow. The canning season for pears is still several weeks distant.




