

ALL CHICAGO CARS TIED UP BY STRIKE Both Surface and Elevated Employees Walk Out. TRAFFIC PINCH IS FELT

CHICAGO, July 31.—A complete tie-up of street car traffic and elevated service began to make itself felt shortly before midnight after the surface employees at a mass meeting had voted for a walkout effective at 11 o'clock.

As the cars went into the barns at the end of their early night runs, the waiting crews refused to take them out after hearing of the strike order. The gradual paralysis of the transportation machine began to make itself felt in the downtown section shortly after 11 o'clock and was marked by longer waits between cars and an unusual crowding on the elevated.

The immediate sympathetic strike by the elevated roads employees was unexpected. They were not scheduled to take final action until tomorrow night. The elevated action was precipitated by some 300 elevated employees who attacked the surface lines employees mass meeting earlier in the evening.

When the approximately 6000 surface men at the meeting voted unanimously to strike the elevated representatives joined them and later induced the train crews to join them.

"Let's go," was the shout in the union hall when the question of an immediate walkout was put and after it had been decided, those at the meeting hurried away to notify the men still at work.

Big Preparations Made. Widespread preparations were begun last night by suburban railway, motor bus companies and automobile owners to meet the strike.

All efforts of business men, city officials, union leaders and car line chiefs failed to avert the walkout, precipitated by the demand of the surface lines that their men accept a wage reduction of approximately 17 per cent.

A compromise offer by the men expressing willingness to take a flat ten per cent reduction was rejected by the surface lines following an order reducing fares from eight to seven cents with three tickets for 20 cents.

The sympathetic strike by the elevated employees was caused by the refusal of the companies to extend the present monthly wage contracts for a year. With both surface and elevated employees out, the strike affects approximately 25,000 men.

Auto Owners to Aid. To meet the threatened tie-up automobile owners were preparing some 250,000 automobiles tonight, and many expressed the conviction that the automotive power of the city alone would be able to take care of the situation.

Many of the street car employees who own cars were preparing to operate them as "jitney buses," wearing their own uniforms to obtain public sympathy and attract patronage. It also was predicted that the unions would put out trucks on the street to carry passengers.

To handle the situation successfully the automobile fleet, probably the largest ever called upon in such an emergency, would have to handle more than 2,000,000 passengers daily.
