DUELING EPIDEMIC ON

ARGENTINE DEPUTIES CLASH 5 TIMES IN 48 HOURS.

More Combats Expected as Result of Friday Night's Debate Over Oil Fields.

BUENOS AIRES, July 31.—An epidemic of dueling has started among Argentine deputies. Five duels have been fought in the last 48 hours, and more may develop as a result of Friday night's debate in the chamber of deputies on government administration of the Argentine oil fields.

One so-called combat of honor was fought Saturday with sabers and another with pistols Sunday. Three sets of seconds were busy yesterday arranging other encounters. All combats participated in Friday's debate which terminated in the early hours of Saturday morning just in time to avert a free-for-all. It is a long time since there has been such an outbreak in Argentina. One of Saturday's duellists already has fought two others since he was a member of congress, but the record still is held by a prominent Argentine socialist who was expelled from his party because of the large number of duels he had fought. His plea against his ouster from the party was that he never even by chance had injured an opponent.

Ex-president Jose Batlle of Uruguay was the most challenged man in that country until by some mistake he killed one of his challengers. Since then he has not been molested.

Izetta Jewell Brown Seeks Democratic Nomination.

Ex-Baker Player Is in West Virginia Politics.

C., July 31.—But for the earlier contest in Missouri, where Senator Jim Reed is fighting for his political life, interest in tomorrow's primaries would center on West Virginia where Izetta Jewell Brown is running for the democratic nomination for United States senator.

Mrs. Brown, as Izetta Jewell, started her career as a member of the Baker Stock company at Portland. Since then she has been associated on the stage with James K. Hackett and Otis Skinner and for three or four years had the leading part in a stock company here in Washington where the principal patronage of the theater at which she appeared was comprised of her personal admirers, or rather her followers. It was while playing in Washington that Miss Jewell met her late husband, William G. Brown, a representative in congress from West Virginia. Mrs. Brown has as her opponent in the present contest M. M. Neely who served in congress with her husband.

KLAN ACTIVE IN IDAHO

MANIFESTO ISSUED ON EVE OF PRIMARY TODAY.

Complete Set of Candidates Indorsed by Organization; Pamphlets Mailed to Electors.

BOISE, Idaho, July 31.—(Special.)—The Ku Klux Klan has taken a hand in the county primary elections to be held in Idaho tomorrow. Manifesto No. 1 was mailed to those of electors in Ada county by that organization. A complete set of candidates for district judge, the legislature and all county officers was named. Many of the candidates thus indorsed are not members of the Klan and know nothing of the indorsement until the appearance of the manifesto. The purpose of the manifesto is to eliminate from the ticket all those of the Catholic religious faith, it is said.

The primary will be held in each of the 44 counties in the state. Under the Idaho laws the primary is confined only to the nomination of candidates to the legislature, district judge, county offices and delegates to the county conventions of the two parties. The delegates are, however, elected at that time.

HONOLULU ENVOY HERE

AIM IS TO AROUSE INTEREST IN TRADE CONFERENCE.

Director of Pan-Pacific Union to Confer With Local Business and Shipping Interests.

In order to arouse interest in the pan-Pacific conference on commerce at Honolulu October 25 to November 3, Alexander Hume Ford of Honolulu, director of the pan-Pacific union, has arrived in Portland for conferences with local business and shipping interests.

Accredited delegates from all countries of the Pacific will attend the conference and it is the hope of the sponsors that 15 will attend from Oregon and Washington. O. M. Clark, lumberman, will head the Oregon delegation. It was announced by Mr. Ford.

The conference, which is sponsored by the pan-American union, is expected to bring the countries of the Pacific into closer relationship with each other. Mr. Ford said, and many of the countries already have appointed delegates.

The programme will include communication and transportation problems as they relate to cable and wireless facilities, development and conservation of the fisheries along the Pacific development of the fuel resources, finance and investment problems, and plans for the arbitration of commercial misunderstandings.

While the pan-Pacific union is not an official body, it is supported largely by appropriations from Pacific governments. Its recommendations on commercial matters are said to carry great weight with the countries bordering the Pacific ocean.

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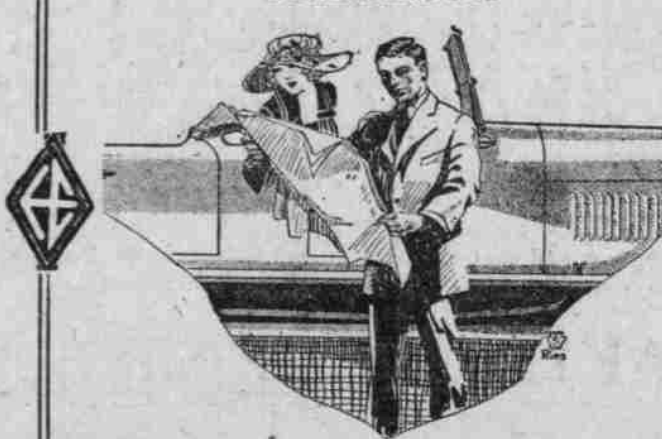
