SOCIALIST HOPES DASHED

Men Who Went Over to Help Heywood Reconstruct Industries
Would Gladly Come Back.

RIOA, Aug. 3.—Fifty hundred I. W. W. who entered Russia to help "Big Bill" Heywood, ex-Chicagoan, reconstruct the Siberian coal and steel industry, have multiplied.

According to Ward Leigh, civil and mining engineer, and John S. Burroughs, Equitable Trust representative, both New Yorkers, who have arrived in Rioa from Shanghai, the plight of the mutineers is desperate. They are without food or shelter and are trading their clothing for food. One colony is at a deserted coal mine in the Kuznetsk basin in Siberia; another colony is starting for the iron mines in the Ural.

Meers, Leigh and Burroughs were traveling on the trans-Siberian road from Chita to Moscow and had an opportunity to talk to the mutineers in both camps, as their private car was abandoned at each station en route to force them to pay graft to every station master. Being detained a day in each camp, the Americans talked with many of the I. W. W. followers.

Radicals Would Return.
The men exhibited passports proving their citizenship and bawling the fact that they left America. Some expressed willingness to commit few transgressions in the United States and to spend two years in the penitentiary providing they could return.

The men sent the following message to other I. W. W. now in America who were planning to migrate to Russia:
"For God's sake, stay in America, and instead of collecting money to aid starving Russia collect money to aid starving America. Raise a fund to help us return. We will tell you the facts regarding this socialist and communist propaganda."
Mr. Leigh said the I. W. W. declared the bolshevik broke their contract, not providing the agreed houses, food, tools, or co-operating in any way.

Men's Plight Hopeless.

The colony at Kuznetsk, in existence three months, has been unable to put a single mine in working order. Both men say the plight of the I. W. W. is hopeless because they obeyed the advice of the soviet government in not bringing sufficient money to return to America and now are stranded without American protection.

Mr. Leigh expresses the belief that the bolshevik do not want them to leave. The I. W. W. are of all nationalities, many not speaking Russian.
En route to Moscow the Americans met 60 happy I. W. W. en route to Kuznetsk. After talking to them they learned the men had not heard of the disillusionment of the earlier colonists. Both men believe the American government or society should make up a fund to return the I. W. W. to America, where they would tell the world the real facts regarding Russia.

COMPLAINANT IS FINED

CHARGE AGAINST WOMAN
AND RIVAL BOOMERANG.

Vancouver Justice Finds Jealous Man as Guilty as Those He
Would Prosecute.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 3.—(Special.)—Henry Woods, 45, with a sandy mustache, a desire to get married and a fickle fiancée, landed in jail last night, and today before the bar of justice.

Woods scanned the marriage records here yesterday, telling the auditor that his "wife" had come over here from Portland to marry another man. He really meant his "fiancée." His search did not reveal the license had been issued, but he found that she was in the city at a local rooming house. That fired his injured feelings and he went straight to the police station and swore to a complaint that his "promised wife" was sharing her bedchamber with another man, Walter Johnson, alias Harry Clark.

So the police took the couple, Walter Johnson and Mrs. Margaret Miller, 39, a native of Germany with a slight accent left, to the city hall and later to the county jail.

This morning they appeared before Frank E. Vaughan, justice of the peace, and Woods was brought to tell what he knew about the woman, for whom he had bought \$60 worth of clothes, he said.

After questioning Woods, Judge Vaughan learned that Woods had paid the fare of the woman here from Portland, had paid for her room at the hotel and that he had shared the room with her on several occasions. The judge made out a warrant of arrest and gave it to Henry Burgin, chief of police, who arrested Woods in the court room.

At 5 o'clock the trio appeared before the justice of the peace and pleaded guilty. Woods was fined \$77 and each of the others \$52.

SCHOOL EXPENSES CUT

1922 Decrease in Clarke County
Is \$34,226.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 3.—(Special.)—Many school boards in Clarke county have done much in retrenching during the past year. In 1921 the indebtedness of the school districts in this county increased \$39,122. The decrease made was only \$4,717. In 1922 the total increase amounted to \$14,047, while the decreases have been made by Seattle, Grays, \$1,769; Vancouver, \$2,190; Camas, \$4,260; Ridgefield, \$2,869; Washougal, \$2,200; Manor, \$1,100.

The school census showed there are 10,617 school children in the county.

The county spent for schools for the year \$465,454.

113 AUTOS ARE REGISTERED AT CAMP WITHIN 24 HOURS

Two cars ago at the camp from Cherokee, Ia. One carries H. W. Ramestin and wife, with their two children, Leola, age 13, and Wilbur, age 12. Mr. Ramestin is a real estate dealer in Cherokee, or has been, but he has sold his business and may decide to make a new home in the west, maybe in Oregon.

The other Cherokee car carried Walter Kirsch and wife, with their four children, Clatus, age 5; Carvel, 3; Jane, 2; and Little Gerald, 14 months. The inmates of this car expect to make their future home in Portland.

POISON CASE BAFFLING

Shelburne Restaurant Mystery
May Never Be Solved.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—The poisoned pastry mystery of the Shelburne restaurant may never be solved.

Although three separate inquiries into the strange case are being conducted by the police and health departments and the district attorney's office—investigators today admitted they were without the slightest clue to the motive or the individual responsible for the presence of arsenic in the pastry which has resulted in the death of seven persons and the illness of more than 700 other patrons of the place.

FAST PRECEDES PRIMARY

Would-Be Senator in Tennessee
Spends Day in Prayer.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 3.—Noah W. Cooper, reform candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator, observed yesterday, preceding the primary, as a day of fasting and prayer.

Throughout the day and night only a few sips of water from his "gourd of righteousness" passed the "blue law" advocate's lips. He declared that hundreds of persons all over the state were fasting and praying with him.

Mr. Cooper has practically completed his collection of 56 gourd which he says he will carry to Washington for presentation to the senators if he is elected. He has issued an invitation to members of the senate to attend a corn bread and turnip greens dinner after his election.

for August 21.

CANBY, Or., Aug. 3.—(Special.)—Petitions have been filed in the office of County School Superintendent Vedder, asking that a special election be held to vote on the proposed union high school at Canby.

The petitions are from districts No. 15, Munder; No. 20, Mackburg; No. 22, Oak Lawn; No. 26, Mark's Prairie; No. 63, Central Point; No. 72, New Hope; No. 81, Union Hall; No. 83, Canby; No. 81, Ninety-one; No. 97, Barlow; No. 110, Lone Rider.

The special election will be held Monday, August 21, from 7 P. M. to 9 P. M. Each district will have its voting places.

FILIPINO BIT RESENTFUL

Island Legislator Urges Passive
Resistance to Uncle Sam.

MANILA, P. I., Aug. 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—Resistance to America by non-co-operation, along the lines of the revolutionary movement led by Gandhi in India, as a means of gaining Philippine independence, is advocated in a published statement by Representative Vincente Llanes of the Philippine legislature.

Llanes was a member of the Philippine independence mission which returned to Manila from the United States yesterday.

FARMERS ADVISED TO WITHHOLD GRAIN

Keep Product for Reasonable Prices, Says Marcy.

UP-GRADE MARKET SEEN

Situation Declared to Hold Out
Much Financial Benefit to
American Agriculturist.

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—George E. Marcy, president of the Armour Grain company, issued a signed statement tonight urging farmers to hold back their grain for reasonable prices and saying that as prices for grain go up better business conditions throughout the whole country will follow. He said:

"An upward movement in grain prices is in prospect, and the situation promises to be of such financial benefit to the American farmer that he, in turn, will be in a position materially to improve general business conditions."

"An orderly and gradual marketing of existing wheat stocks will end the present depressed price conditions and there are tremendous economic factors at work to force slower and more stable marketing."

"Settlement of the coal strike will result in decreased amount of rolling stock capable of moving grain to terminals, and expected improvement in general business conditions should further affect the amount of equipment available."

"On the other hand, the demand promises to get constantly better. The American farmer holds the key to the situation. He sold his surplus grain last spring at high prices, good crops and good surpluses are in prospect, and thanks to the relief measures adopted by Eugene Mayer, by the war finance corporation and farm board the farmer is now in a fair position to hold his grain for reasonable prices."

Realtors Subscribe \$3000 Quota
Toward Big Caravan.

Nearly the entire quota of \$3000 for the 1925 fair allotted to the Portland realty board was raised at a meeting of the board Thursday night in the Oregon building. Arrangements were completed for the sending of one and possibly two automobiles in the exposition caravan now being organized by Mayor Baker to tour the state. At least ten men from the board will make the trip.

Slayer of George Sweeney to Be
Hanged September 8.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 3.—(Special.)—George Howard, who has been in the penitentiary here for more than a year awaiting execution for the murder of George Sweeney of Malheur county, will be hanged September 8, according to a death warrant received by prison officials today.

The testimony indicated the murder was committed so that the prisoner might obtain possession of his victim's automobile.

A death watch was placed over Howard today by the prison officials.

Time on Liquor Charge.
