BUILDING EXEMPTIONS PROPOSED — City Commissioner Barber will present at the next council session and recommend the passage of an ordinance granting certain exemptions to the Meier & Frank company in the construction of a big department store at the intersection of Irving and Fifteenth streets. The chief exemption will permit the construction of long glass and metal marquis on sides of the building where loading and unloading operations are to be performed. A second ordinance will grant a permit for construction of a railroad track to serve the building.

FOREIGNERS TO GO ON BOAT TRIP — Members of court Pacific No. 1247 of Foresters have completed arrangements for a boat trip to the coast and picnic on the river tomorrow. The Bluebird has been chartered for the day and will leave the Alder street wharf at 8 A. M. in the morning, returning early at night. An invitation has been extended to the public to participate in the festive occasion.

HOTEL TILL STOLEN — A hotel prowler stole the money till containing about \$50 in cash at the Hotel Alder early yesterday, according to a report made to the police by John Farrow, night clerk. Relatives of the aged man said he had a considerable quantity of money on him when they last saw him and they fear he might have met with foul play.

REPUBLICANS LAY PLANS

TILLAMOOK CENTRAL COMMITTEE MEETS.

Walter L. Toozee Jr. Gives Ideas on Best Way to Organize for Election.

TILLAMOOK, Or., Aug. 3.—(Special.)—The republican county central committee met this afternoon at the chamber of commerce, H. T. Bots, chairman of the committee, presiding.

The meeting was called for the purpose of meeting Walter L. Toozee Jr., chairman of the state republican committee, who outlined a plan of organization for the county committee to follow at the general election. It was unanimously agreed that the committee adopt the plan, which calls for the organization of county candidates, a permanent executive committee, a finance committee, a legal committee, a county publicity committee, a special organization committee, precinct organizations and a women's auxiliary.

Mr. Toozee suggested that a woman be elected vice-chairman of the county committee, and the honor fell upon Mrs. W. W. Alderman. To complete the county committee John Benson was appointed to represent Garibaldi, U. S. Edwards, for Sandlake, W. H. Christensen, for Newkwin, and Hubert Smith, for Hebo. Following the business of the meeting the matter of amending the primary law was discussed. The consensus of opinion being that the law should be amended. Some of the committee members declared that no person should be allowed to vote unless he had registered and his name was on the poll books. The committee will be called together again in the near future, when the committees mentioned in Mr. Toozee's will be appointed. As Tillamook has a strong republican county committee, the county will be well organized.

BONDING COMPANY SUES

Credit Preference in Klamath Bank Liquidation Asked.

Because Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, who is in charge of the affairs of the defunct Klamath Falls, refused to enter the claims of the United States Fidelity & Guaranty company of Baltimore, Md., the last of preferred creditors, suit was filed in the United States court here yesterday by the representatives of the bonding company.

The company had given a bond to the United States to cover \$50,000 of federal funds which had been deposited in the institution by Walter G. West, superintendent of the Klamath county. After the bank closed its doors this sum was paid the government and the United States interest in the claim assigned the bonding company. Contending that under federal law it was a preferred creditor of the bank, the bonding company on July 2 filed notice of that effect with Mr. Bramwell. On July 14 it received notice that its claims would be settled along with the claims of other unpaid creditors.

That Mr. Bramwell now has a sufficient fund with which to settle the \$50,000 claim is the contention of the bonding company, which asks that the federal court order immediate payment.

PASSING "BUCK" COSTLY

Negro Gets 13 Months for Trying to Put Blame on Another.

An attempt to shove responsibility for his own crime onto the shoulders of an innocent companion proved disastrous for Shelly Mitchell, negro, yesterday. He was sentenced to 13 months in the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan.

Mitchell and Albert Corley, also a negro, had been arrested for violating the narcotics act. Both went to trial Thursday. Mitchell in his testimony painted Corley as the guilty party, who had agreed to sell a packet of morphine to a government informer. Corley told his story, clean version which drew laughter from the lawyers, the jury and even the judge.

The jury, after deliberating for a short time Thursday night returned a sealed verdict which was opened yesterday morning before Judge Bean. Corley was acquitted, but Mitchell found guilty.

Judge Bean in passing sentence showed that he had no sympathy for a man who would attempt to make another bear the responsibility for his crime, and in pronouncing sentence severely criticized Mitchell.

NEGRO OUTLAW IS SLAIN

Murderer, Trapped in Cornfield, Dies Battling 800 Men.

CHEROKEE, Ia., Aug. 4.—Trapped in a cornfield, an outlaw negro who shot three men in the last 48 hours here battled for life against 800 armed men yesterday and was killed by bullets from the guns of Henry O'Neil and John Stiles, postoffice employees, late today.

Wednesday night the negro shot two guards at the Illinois Central railroad yards here, fatally wounding one, and fled.

hospitals, with a view of determining their needs in the liquor line. There is no doubt that there is moonshining in the state, and it will take many years completely to eradicate it. But I can say, after checking reports from various states, that there is less liquor and less drunkenness here than in any other state in the Union."

FEDERAL COMMISSIONER LINVILLE Declares Drunkenness and Drink Are Less Here.

Oregon is the alcoholic Sahara of America, the driest state of the 48 commonwealths which comprise the Union, declared Dr. J. A. Linville, federal prohibition commissioner, yesterday, after concluding an investigation of liquor conditions in the state.

"Comparison of the reports of the prohibition directors of all the states shows that Oregon is in the lead for enforcement of the prohibition law," Dr. Linville declared. "We have less moonshine in the enforcement of prohibition laws."

Dr. Linville, accompanied by Chester Skipe, prohibition agent, returned to his office yesterday after an eight-day tour of western and central Oregon. He visited valley cities, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Bend and returned to Portland via McKenzie pass. During his trip Dr. Linville checked up on drugstores who hold permits to sell grain alcohol and also studied the needs of hospitals for liquors.

"I am more than pleased with the progress which the prohibition laws are making," he said. "I can attribute it, to a large extent, to the attitude of the people. Some time ago there was a pronounced antipathy to the prohibition law. But gradually the public, realizing that it is a law, have rallied to its support. Sheriffs, constables and police officials of the state are behind the law, and this co-operation is proving valuable to us. Federal state and city officers are all working together."

"I checked up on all drugstores in the towns which I visited. This is an annual inspection, but it showed that none of these men are attempting to take advantage of their privileges. I did not have to call down single druggist for overstepping his authority. I also investigated
