

FRAUDS INVOLVING MILLIONS CHARGED

Former Federal Agent and Others Indicted.

BIG POWDER PLANT SOLD

Conspiracy Alleged in Deal by Which Works Which Cost \$5 Million Went for \$3,450,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 7.—Indictments were returned today by the special grand jury investigating alleged war frauds against Ernest C. Morse, former director of sales of the war department; Everly M. Davis, president of the E. M. Davis Chemical company of New York; and Alexander W. Phillips, associated with Davis.

The three men, all of whom live in New York, were charged in the indictment with having defrauded the government out of more than a million dollars in connection with the sale of the war-built plant of the Old Hickory powder plant near Nashville, Tenn.

The indictment explained that on June 28, 1920, the Old Hickory plant was declared by the war department to be a surplus plant and its sale authorized. Soon thereafter the Nashville Industrial corporation was organized primarily for the purpose of submitting a bid for the plant and Davis and Phillips, according to the grand jury's findings, became interested in a syndicate which purchased a large block of stock.

Mr. Morse is now president of the Foreign Sales Supply corporation and is believed to be in Warsaw, Poland.

The indictment returned today specifically charges felonious conspiracy, combination, confederation and agreement to have the Nashville Industrial corporation purchase the Old Hickory powder plant for a sum far less than it was reasonably worth.

The indictment set forth that the government expended \$5,000,000 in construction of the plant and received from the sale by the war department only \$3,450,000.

Morse, being a government employee, knew the character of the Nashville bid which came in with others and advised the secretary of war to accept it. The Nashville bid is said to have been submitted in excess of other bids for the property, but conditions were attached which in the end made the offer less attractive than others.

Upon Morse's advice the bid was accepted. Former Secretary Baker testified before the grand jury in the matter.

TWO GIRLS SHOPLIFTERS

MOTHER PUT UNDER ARREST FOR DIRECTING THEFTS.

Children Said to Have Been Used by Parent in Her Raid Upon Big Department Store.

While she stood as lookout, the two little daughters of Mrs. May Robert, an Italian woman of 419 East Forty-fifth street, were taught the first rudiments of shoplifting, according to complaint made yesterday to Deputy District Attorney Howry, at police headquarters.

A complaint charging Mrs. Robert with larceny, was filed in police court and a warrant was issued for her arrest.

Miss Walker told the authorities that she watched Mrs. Robert and her daughters for more than an hour Saturday afternoon as they walked about the department store. The mother, she said, would select the articles she wanted stolen and point them out to the girls. Then the children would slide up to the counter and steal them.

Miss Walker also charged that Mrs. Robert kept a large shopping bag open so the girls could drop the stolen articles into it without attracting undue notice.

After the mother and her daughters had left the store they were trailed and overtaken. Numerous articles of women's and children's wearing apparel and jewelry were found in the well-filled shopping bag. Mrs. Robert is said to have surrendered them without any trouble.

RETAILERS WILL MEET

DIRECTORS TODAY CONSIDER BETTER ORGANIZATION.

Aggressive Campaign to Create Branches in Cities of State Is to Be Considered.

A more thorough organization of retail merchants of the state will be the principal order of business at the annual summer meeting of the directors of the Oregon State Retail Merchants' association, which opens today at the Imperial hotel.

Plans for an aggressive campaign to create local organizations in all cities and towns of the state and the combatting of trade abuses for the mutual benefit and protection of retail merchants will be discussed.

Advertising, as an aid to the retail merchant, will also receive the attention of the directors. A comprehensive and aggressive campaign for organizing the merchants of the state will come before the directors," stated Edward A. MacLean, secretary of the association, yesterday.

Local chapters of the organization perform certain important local activities such as bringing about cooperation between local retailers in credit information and collection work. Credit loans are a direct tax on retail business that can be avoided by the cooperation of merchants.

In a number of the cities of the state where we have chapters, our members are operating on their mutual benefit along the lines of credit information and collection work.

Another matter of importance with the creation of a conference committee to meet with a similar committee from the Oregon State Retail Merchants' association. The retail merchants are the chief advertisers and supporters of newspapers, yet editors have no real understanding

of retail business and the problems and difficulties of their best customers.

"Advertising is an economic force when it is planned and carried out intelligently, yet many retailers are not educated along those lines. They advertise half-heartedly and inefficiently. Many retailers fritter away enough money in useless advertising schemes to pay for a real constructive advertising campaign. Through cooperation with the editors we can undertake to educate retailers in correct and useful methods of advertising."

The officers of the association are: L. L. Thomas, Marshfield, president; Everman Robbins, Molalla; W. F. King, Prineville; and E. F. Douglass, Portland, vice presidents; Edward A. MacLean, Portland, secretary; and Thomas C. Watts, Reuben, treasurer.

OFFICER IS REMEMBERED

ADMIRAL SEEBEE ONCE RESIDED IN PORTLAND.

Lieutenant of Years Ago, Now Dead, Known to Many as Likeable Young Officer.

Rear Admiral Uriel Seabee, United States navy, retired, who died at Coronado, Cal., last Sunday, after nearly 35 years of active naval service, is well remembered by several of the pioneer families of Portland who knew him as a likeable young officer.

Seabee, who was born in Portland, was a member of the Seabee family, which was one of the pioneer families of the city.

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SUN'S ARMY MEETS STINGING DEFEAT

Forces Are in Hasty Retreat Back to Kiangsi.

CHEN BOTTLES UP FOE

Deposed President of China Is Aboard One of Remaining Loyal Vessels of Navy.

CANTON, China, Aug. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—The northern army of Sun Yat-sen, deposed president of China, met a stinging defeat by Chen Chung-ming's troops near Shichow, in northern Kwangtung province, and is in retreat back to Kiangsi province, whence it came a few weeks ago, according to advices received here today.

The advices from Shichow, which were made public at the headquarters here of General Chen Chung-ming, who deposed Sun, declared that Sun Yat-sen's northern forces, on which he had pinned his hope of regaining control of Canton, were in full retreat toward Kiangsi and Hunan provinces.

1000 Rifles Captured. Chen's troops occupied Nanyang after driving out their opponents, and captured 1000 rifles, 12 cannons, two airplanes and an entire regiment of the deposed president's soldiers. The remainder of the Sun forces, it was reported, retreated toward Kiangsi with Chen's men in hot pursuit.

Northwest of Shichow General Chen's attack resulted in his capturing the forts at Chung-chung King, whose defenders were forced to retire toward Hunan.

Neither of the two leaders contending for control of Canton is at the front with his troops.

Chen Is Silent. Chen Chung-ming remains silent at his headquarters in Shichow, 60 miles from Canton, refusing to make any statement or to be interviewed. Sun Yat-sen is aboard one of the remaining loyal vessels of his depleted navy, the Winglung, anchored in Canton harbor and virtually bottled up. Chen's forces guard every exit.

In the meantime Sun's supporter, General Hsu Tsung-chi, is losing the battles in the north, which were to have again cleared the path to the presidency of south China for his chief.

SUN HAS MENTAL TROUBLE. Attendance of Two Foreign Brain Specialists Required.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—Dr. Sun Yat-sen, ex-head of the Southern Chinese government, is suffering from a mental trouble which has already required the attendance of two foreign brain specialists, says a Hongkong dispatch to the Daily Telegraph.

The correspondent describes Dr. Sun as exercising impotent authority from the cruiser Winglung, anchored off Shamien, in Canton harbor, but depending not only for his restoration to power, but for his escape from the city, on the return of his northern expeditionary force, which Chen Chung-ming slowly is bringing up.

Chen is determined to prevent this force, which is described as a rabble of bandits living by pillage, from joining Sun Yat-sen and, according to the correspondent, he will be successful. The writer adds: "News of the final dispersal of the force probably will have the effect upon Sun Yat-sen which his colleagues openly anticipate and dread."

The correspondent, who has just completed a three months' journey of observation from Peking to Canton, draws a hopeless picture of conditions and says Sun Yat-sen's appearance from the arena will avail little. Predicting years of chaos and turmoil, he declares: "No thinking man in China today sees a ray of hope."

EXHUMING IS DEFERRED. Undertakers Says Body That of Joe Furey, Swindler.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—The proposed exhuming of a body supposed to be that of Joe Furey, nationally known swindler, in an endeavor to identify him with a mysterious figure regarding the disposition of his body, will not be undertaken by the San Francisco authorities until a report is received from the authorities of Los Angeles, where he was supposed to be Furey's last home, Captain of Detectives Matheson announced today.

The body was sent here from Huntsville, Tex., and was buried August 1 in Cypress Lawn cemetery. Mrs. Helen Matheson, who said she was a resident of San Francisco and a niece of Furey, took charge of the funeral arrangements here. The funeral director, who handled the body said today it was that of Furey.

Crops at Meridian Good. OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—Fall-sown grain in the Meridian area has been thrashed and wheat averaged from 10 to 12 bushels per acre. Considerable smut was encountered. Oats averaged 25 bushels to the acre. The hops are small compared with those in former years. There will be a large crop of Evergreen blackberries in this section of the county. They are beginning to ripen.

ALFALFA PEST FEARED. Meeting Called at Baker to Combat Spread of Weevil.

BAKER, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—The spread of the alfalfa weevil in Baker county fields has caused such alarm that the Baker county chamber of commerce has called a meeting here August 19 of all the county's alfalfa growers to discuss means of combating the pest. In the meantime farmers are being sent formulas of poison that has successfully coped with the weevil in other counties.

Floyd J. Campbell of Portland, who has a large ranch on lower Powder river brought to Baker today a cloud of dirt containing hundreds of eggs claimed to be that of the alfalfa weevil.

PRUNE DAMAGE FEARED. Fruit Drops From Trees in Some Clarke County Districts.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—The longest dry spell on record has been exceeded by many days this year and prune growers are expected to be disappointed about their crop. It is expected that the rain will begin about the time that the prunes are ready for picking. This would make them pop open and of no value.

In some sections, many prunes are dropping from the trees. It is reported one man near Felida shook a tree and all but two prunes dropped off, so he did not try to shake any more. The prunes are getting the good prune color now.

CAMP MEETING OPPOSED. Woodstock Folk Ask Suppression of Pentecostal Gathering.

More than 100 residents of Woodstock signed a petition presented to Multnomah county commissioners yesterday characterizing the Pentecostal camp meeting being held in that district as an unqualified nuisance and requesting that steps be taken to stop it. The petition was referred to District Attorney Myers and Sheriff Hurlburt for investigation and action.

Interference in the religious services by neighborhood toughs caused a complaint to reach the authorities last week from the heads of the mission. Investigation at the time disclosed that the action of the rowdies had been indefensible and they were warned against repetition of hoodlum tactics.

Runaways Held for Albany. ALBANY, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—Albany is evidently becoming the mecca for runaway boys. Following the capture here of two fugitives from Portland Saturday, two more were expected today from their homes in Mill City. The latest young adventurers were said to be 10 and 12 years of age and armed with a shotgun. The Portland boys caught Saturday and turned over to the father of one were Frank Amick, 16, and Stanley Palmer, 15. They left home Friday.

Nephews, Nieces Remembered. Bob Lowe, indicted last April on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, but who has not yet been tried, was arrested yesterday on a charge of threatening to coach and ten grandnephews and mit a felony, preferred by Albany.

Auto Upsets; Man Injured. BEND, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special.)—While attempting to pass last night C. A. Bushong sustained severe injuries, according to reports, when his car turned over. A companion, who was unhurt, was able to release him from the weight of the machine.
