DISABLED MEN TO BE GUERES—
 About 160 disabled veterans of the
 world war now in various hospitals
 in Portland will be the guests today
 of the Red Cross Canteen Workers
 club on an excursion on the boat
 Swan. The Kiwanis club will fur-
 nish automobiles to carry the vet-
 erans to and from the hospitals.
 The boat will leave the west end of
 the Morrison street bridge at 10
 o'clock this morning and will re-
 turn at 4 this afternoon. A band
 orchestra, a basket lunch, cigars
 and cigarettes will be furnished for the
 occasion.

SCIENTISTS ASK FOR MONEY—Per-
 mission to draw \$10,000 from the
 Henry Wetmore endowment fund
 for use in erecting a caretaker's
 home, barn, outbuildings and im-
 proving roads in the vicinity of the
 tract of land near N. 2nd street,
 where the Christian Science churches
 of Portland plan to build a sanitar-
 ium, was asked of the circuit court
 in a motion filed yesterday by the
 defendant in the suit of August
 Wetmore and other heirs to compel
 the churches to relinquish the
 Wetmore fund.

CHURCH LAYS CORNERSTONE—The
 cornerstone for the new St. Joseph's
 Catholic church at Gervais, to be
 constructed on the site of the former
 building, which burned to the
 ground June 19, was laid Sunday.
 Archbishop Charles J. Byrne, who
 presided at the ceremony and was
 assisted by Rev. Charles Sorokki, the
 pastor. The new building will be 100x16
 feet and will be of the construction
 with stucco finish. It is ex-
 pected to have it ready for occu-
 pancy by the Christmas holidays.

IMPRESSO DROVE VESPER HUNT—
 Leslie Eller, accused cocaine re-
 tainer, who was caught by the city
 police last week in the act of mak-
 ing a sale of drugs, was held in
 awaiting grand jury action by Fed-
 eral Commissioner Fraser yester-
 day. Eller has been charged with
 a violation of the Harrison anti-
 narcotic act. His bail was set at
 \$2500, which he was unable to raise.
 Dell Collins, alleged addict, was or-
 dered held at a material witness for
 the government.

EX-BARKER ARRESTED—
 "Paddy" Lynch, ex-barker and
 well known to habitués of the north
 end, was arrested early Sunday
 morning, with C. W. Houck and
 Mrs. F. Chofman, at Beach and
 Commercial streets, with 15 gallons
 of moonshine, which they were pre-
 paring to deliver to a customer, ac-
 cording to the accusation of deputy
 sheriffs. They pleaded guilty yester-
 day in the district court and
 will be tried later.

LIBRARY HAS GOOD SEASON—De-
 spite the usual summer lull, the
 calls for books, the Arleta branch
 library has enjoyed a brisk summer
 season. Over 5000 books were bor-
 rowed during the month of July,
 a record for the month, according
 to the figures. The fact that many
 are borrowing the books on the new
 vacation plan, which allows each
 person ten books to take on their
 vacation, is increasing the number
 borrowed this month.

GARDEN FETE TO BE HELD—The
 committee from the Sacred Heart
 parish is making elaborate prepa-

FIREWORKS TO BE SHOWN

**PYROTECHNICS WILL FEAT-
 URE BEAUTY FETE.**

**Miss Portland to Be in Midst of
 Unusual Illuminations at
 Atlantic City.**

Among the other big entertain-
 ment features on the programme at
 the Atlantic City pageant of beauty
 early next month will be a lavish
 display of fireworks. Not only once,
 but throughout the fete, pyrotech-
 nics will be blazoned upon the sky.
 Besides there will be day fireworks,
 giving a distinctiveness and change
 from the usual night displays.
 The fireworks that will be set
 off are the products of the country's
 leading manufacturer. He it is who
 has made the fireworks used at
 the leading world's fairs held in
 this country during the last 20 years,
 as well as for the Dewey and
 Hudson-Fulton celebrations and the
 inauguration of the presidents.

On opening day of the pageant
 there will be a fireworks display that
 will signalize the landing of King
 Neptune to take over his realm. From
 high ascending rockets will burst
 forth great clouds of many colored
 parades, holding both beautiful

 along the beach. The pyrotechnics
 will be set off along a distance of
 five and six miles and the display
 will continue for hours. This show-
 ing will be full of surprises that
 the fireworks company has not dis-
 closed to anyone, nor will it do so
 until the time arrives. Needless to
 say, they will be of a striking nature.

VAUDEVILLE TO RESUME

SEPTEMBER 10 IS ORPHEUM
 DATE FOR REOPENING.

Manager McGettigan Back From
 Coast to Take Reservations
 and Complete Details.

In order to make ready for re-
 opening of the Orpheum season at
 the Heilig theater Sunday, Septem-
 ber 10, Frank J. McGettigan, man-
 ager, returned from the Tillamook
 coast yesterday. The Orpheum's
 season list is an institution of long
 standing and the manager has cur-
 tailed his vacation to prepare the
 reservations of the Orpheum's regu-
 lar patrons.

Announcement was made yester-
 day that the Orpheum during the
 coming season will present only six
 shows weekly instead of seven as
 heretofore. This means that the
 Orpheum show will close its Port-
 land engagement Tuesday night in-
 stead of Wednesday afternoon as
 has been the custom for several
 years. The Orpheum has relin-
 quished use of the theater Wednes-
 day afternoon to the Heilig theater
 company on account of the great
 number of attractions that have
 been booked for the Heilig.

Under this new schedule the Or-
 pheum show will open Sunday mat-
 inee, as usual, but the final show
 will be staged Tuesday night in-
 stead of Wednesday afternoon. Sea-
 son patrons who have been attend-
 ing the Orpheum Wednesday after-
 noon will be accommodated with
 reservations for other matinees as
 they desire. This is one reason for
 Mr. McGettigan's early return from
 his summer home on the Oregon
 coast.

That the new Orpheum season
 looks promising is asserted by the
 vaudeville manager. Vaudeville con-
 ditions in the east are improving
 and the outlook for the west is said
 to be brighter than any other year
 since the war.

The personnel of the Orpheum's
 first show has not yet been an-
 nounced, but the publicity depart-
 ment of the circuit reports that a
 popular comedienne will be the first
 headliner and that many new acts
 have been booked.

The demand for Orpheum season
 reservations is reported by the man-
 ager to be the best in several years.
 Practically all of the old-time sea-
 son ticket holders have renewed
 their reservations and mail orders
 for season reservations have ac-
 cumulated by the hundreds during
 the Orpheum's closed period.

Mr. McGettigan announces that
 his staff will be kept in contact with
 the exception of a full change or
 two among the ushers. Robert T.
 Berven will be assistant manager.
 Louis Fried ("Butch") will hold
 forth as stage manager and the
 orchestra will be under direction of
 George E. Jeffery, who has been
 musical director at the Orpheum for
 the past seven years.
