

## WIFE'S COMPANION SHOT BY HUSBAND

Rancher Near Salem Held;  
Victim Near Death.

## PAIR RETURN HOME

Woman Said to Have Gone to Get  
Trunk She Left Behind  
Nine Months Ago.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—C. B. Witt was shot and wounded probably fatally tonight by John Imman, 65, who lives on a ranch about six miles southeast of Salem. The shooting occurred at the Imman home.

According to the story told officers, Mrs. Imman and Witt, accompanied by Mrs. Imman's brother, left Marion county last fall and went to Hood River to pick fruit. Later they located in a number of Oregon cities, it was said, Witt working as a laborer and Mrs. Imman acting in the capacity of housekeeper. Witt and Mrs. Imman returned to Salem today and tonight went to the Imman home in quest of Mrs. Imman's trunk. Witt greeted pleasantly by Mr. Imman as they stepped their automobile in front of the house, Mrs. Imman said, and were invited to enter the dwelling and talk things over.

**Husband Obtains Revolver.**  
As Witt and Mrs. Imman entered the living room, Mrs. Imman said her husband rushed into an adjoining bedroom and took a revolver from beneath a pillow on his bed. Mr. Witt grabbed the revolver, Mrs. Imman said, but it was discharged. The bullet entered Witt's neck. Mrs. Imman hastened to the home of a neighbor and notified the officers. Witt was brought to a hospital here while Mr. and Mrs. Imman were taken to the county jail.

Mrs. Imman told the district attorney that she and Witt had been friends for a long time and that Witt frequently visited at her husband's farm prior to the time she left for Hood River. She said she returned to Salem today to join her husband and that Witt had intended to leave for other fields.

**Woman Married Twice.**

Mrs. Imman is 27 years of age and has been twice married. Her first husband was Martin Crabtree of Albany, to whom she was married in July, 1914. She was married to Imman in the year 1915. She has two children by her first husband. She left these children with Mr. Imman at the time she left Marion county with Witt.

In a statement at the hospital, Mr. Witt said that he and Imman had been friends for several years and that no trouble had ever occurred between them. Mr. Imman would not discuss the case other than to say that Witt grabbed the revolver before the shot was fired. Mrs. Imman told the officers that after her husband had shot Witt, he pointed the weapon at her and threatened to shoot. She said she grasped the revolver and calmed him after a struggle.

Mr. Imman has resided in Marion county for many years and is well known in this vicinity.

## BIGAMIST'S WIVES MEET

DELEGATES ARRIVE FROM  
VARIOUS PARTS OF WORLD.

Mates No. 2 and No. 3 Meet for  
First Time and Laughingly  
Recount Experiences.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Delegates are arriving from various parts of the world to attend the first convention of bigamists' wives. It was revealed today when Gordon, 49, and boasting acquaintance with the late Theodore Roosevelt, was arraigned in federal court charged with bigamy and held in \$2500 bail. Sam's known wives are, according to the Brooklyn prosecutor:

No. 1, Mrs. Ida Schultz Gordon of Manila, P. I., married in 1907; procured a divorce in 1917. Now on her way here from Manila to appear against him.

No. 2, Miss Cecilia Letkovitz Gordon of New York, Roumania and Uruguay. Married in 1910; divorced in 1920; procured annulment May 19, last.

No. 3, Mrs. Martha Perree Gordon of New York, married in 1920; deserted in 1921.

No. 4, Mrs. Rebecca Penner Gordon of Brooklyn. Married April 2, last, and deserted two months later. Wives Nos. 2 and 3 met today for the first time in the home of the former's daughter and laughingly recounted their experiences. No. 2, just arrived from Chicago, said she was married to Gordon in Montevideo and that he left her 10 years later after a trip to London and Paris with money raised from the sale of a rubber business she aided him to establish. He met No. 3 in New York, Pa., when he took a musical comedy company there and engaged her as a prima donna. When the show closed he met Miss Perree on Staten Island and married her after the funeral services for her brother. Leaving her for No. 4, Gordon's downfall resulted from his quitting the latter before he repaid \$1000 she advanced to him, according to the former Miss Penner.

## LIBRARY TO BUY BOOKS

UNIVERSITY PARK BRANCH  
TO RECEIVE STOCK.

Central Board Authorized \$1200  
Expenditure to Obtain  
Necessary Literature.

A total expenditure of \$1200 for books and furnishings for the new University park branch library was authorized Tuesday night at the monthly meeting of the library board. Five hundred dollars of the sum will go for books, mostly juvenile and fiction; \$100 for book lists and \$600 for furnishings.

A gain in circulation of 1539 books during the month of July was reported by Miss Mulheron, librarian.

The lecture committee reported plans for two lectures during the season, one of which is to be given by Vachel Lindsay, American poet, whose contract already has been signed for in November. An attempt to secure John Drinkwater for a lecture was unavailing, and the second lecture of the series has not yet been arranged.

The visit to the Portland library of Miss Florence Overton, supervisor of branches of the New York public library, which has the largest branch system in the country, and Andrew Keogh, librarian of Yale university, were reported by Miss Mulheron in her report.

Several matters of repair work were approved by the board and will be attended to during the month of August.

Two new librarians, Miss Grace Johnson, children's librarian of the South Portland branch, and Miss Thyllis Knott, assistant librarian at Vernon, have arrived in the city and have taken up their duties.

PURCHASE OF COSMETICS IS  
UNDOING OF MR. BURKE.

Young Man Who Posed in Society  
as Son of Millionaire Held  
Pending Police Inquiry.

Although he opened an account at the Meier & Frank department store by telling Credit Manager Willis he wanted to pay in a supply of logging clothing, C. Richard Burke, who says he is a son of a New York millionaire, ran up a bill of \$33 for rouge, face powder, different varieties of perfume and other cosmetics for his own use, according to police and Burns operatives who are conducting an investigation.

Burke also is suspected of issuing worthless checks, but is held on a vagrancy charge pending further investigation. He will stand in police court tomorrow afternoon. The meantime, a charge of issuing fraudulent checks may be placed against him, according to the police.

C. Richard "blew" into Portland recently and put up at one of the fashionable residential hotels. He immediately got himself introduced into the "smart set" and began cutting quite a swath locally in society.

He told his new-found friends he was Harvard graduate, and a son of William Burke, millionaire, and door manufacturer of 111 Broadway, New York. He said his father insisted he come out to Oregon and learn the lumber business from the ground up.

## PYTHIANS IN SESSION

32ND BIENNIAL CONVENTION  
OPENS AT SAN FRANCISCO.

Simultaneously With Beginning  
of Supreme Session, Conclave  
of Sisters Is Begun.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—The thirty-second biennial convention of the supreme lodge of the Knights of Pythias was opened today by William Ladow of New York city, supreme chancellor, with representatives from every state in the union, most of the Canadian provinces, the Hawaiian islands, the Philippines and Australia in attendance. Governor Stephens welcomed the delegates, which was responded to by the supreme chancellor and others.

The first session was brief, the supreme lodge having decided that it would not get down to business until the afternoon session. The outstanding social feature of the opening day will be the big ball to-night.

Simultaneously with the opening of the supreme convention the seventeenth convocation of the supreme temple of the Order of the Sisters is begun. Governor Stephens also greeted this convention. Mrs. Minnie Bunting of Oklahoma city, supreme chief, presided. The supreme temple meeting will close Wednesday.

Notables at the supreme convention are Senator James E. Broening of Indiana, Mayor W. E. Broening of Baltimore and Representative Tom Connally of Texas.

## GAY LOMBARD DIVORCED

WHOLE CHORUS NAMED CO-  
RESPONDENTS BY WIFE.

Charges of Gay Parties in Home  
Are Made by Mate of ex-  
Portland Man.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—(Special.)—Not a single co-respondent but an entire chorus was named by Mrs. Ivy Lombard today when she appeared before Superior Judge Cabanish, seeking a divorce from Gay Lombard, wealthy macaroni manufacturer, club man and ex-Portland resident.

The chorus, attached to one of the gayest of the town cabarets, came in the Lombard family affairs in September, 1921, the wife alleged, while she was in Los Angeles. They were guests at a party which was described to be by the neighbors as both picturesque and hilarious, it was alleged. Mrs. Lombard explained that she had every reason to believe the neighbors were right, inasmuch as both china and glassware were broken in the gayety.

Besides the party, Mrs. Lombard told the court that her husband, who was once known as the "millionaire mayor" of Portland, Or., was unkind to her five-year-old son, by a former marriage. When he dined at home in his luxurious apartment here, the child was not permitted to be a member of the family group, she said.

She received an interlocutory decree.

## THOMPSON LEADS IN OHIO PRIMARY

Fess Apparently Has Re-  
publican Nomination Safe.

## ARKANSAS IS FOR McRAE

Voters Indicate Indorsement of  
Sunday Blue Law Enforce-  
ment—Brandon to Fore.

**SUMMARY OF PRIMARIES  
IN THREE STATES.**  
Ohio.—Carmel A. Thompson, Harding administration and Anti-Saloon league candidate for governor, has wide margin; Fess leading for republican senatorial nomination and Pomerene for democratic.

Alabama.—W. W. Brandon leading Bibb Graves for governor, Almon, representative, leading feminine opponent. Arkansas.—Indorsement of McRae indicated.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—With Carmel A. Thompson leading by a wide margin at midnight for the republican gubernatorial nomination in Ohio, political observers hailed his apparent victory as a victory for President Harding's policies and for strict enforcement of the prohibition laws.

The tide of political unrest seen in recent elections in Indiana, Pennsylvania, Iowa and North Dakota seemed to have been checked in the president's home commonwealth through Mr. Thompson having in the early returns a two to one lead over his nearest opponent.

**Pomerene Far in Lead.**  
In the Ohio democratic senatorial contest, Senator Alice Pomerene was leading by more than two to one over his opponent, John J. Lentz, while Representative S. D. Fess was holding a substantial lead over three opponents in the republican senatorial race, Charles Dick running second, John Harold third and David W. Wood fourth. Both Lentz and Dick had the support of organized labor.

In other commonwealths where state-wide primaries were held the returns came slowly and victors seemed in doubt at a late hour.

## THOMPSON IS FAR IN LEAD

Nomination of Anti-Saloon  
League Candidate Indicated.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—The nomination of Carmel A. Thompson of Cleveland, the Harding administration and anti-saloon league candidate, as the republican nominee for governor was indicated on the face of unofficial returns tonight from 318 precincts out of approximately 600 in the state and representing 69 of the 88 counties. On these returns Thompson was maintaining a lead of more than two to one over his nearest opponent and was leading in all but a few of the counties heard from.

Thompson's nearest competitor in the three-cornered race was C. Homer Durand of Cocheton, the beer-and-wine candidate. Representative Charles L. Knight of Akron, who campaigned as a Roosevelt progressive, was running third, and Secretary of State Smith was fourth on the 134 precincts.

The vote from 134 precincts was: Thompson 25,234, Durand 11,167, Knight 10,025; Harvey C. Smith of Zanesville, a candidate with professed liberal tendencies, was fourth with 7706. The other five candidates appeared to be hopelessly distant.

The republican gubernatorial race developed the two main issues of the campaign—wet and dry and progressivism within the party.

Colonel Thompson, who is an ex-treasurer of the United States, issued a statement from his headquarters in Cleveland saying: "All indications are that I will be nominated by a large plurality. I appreciate the splendid indorsement given me. I am not unduly of the responsibility my success will entail, but with help of all republicans we will win in November."

In the senatorial contests, Senator Alice Pomerene, democrat, was maintaining a large lead over ex-representative John J. Lentz of Columbus who had the strong indorsement of organized labor, and Representative S. D. Fess, ex-chairman of the republican congressional committee, had an even larger lead over his three opponents in the republican race for the senatorial nomination. Senator Pomerene had the open op-

position of the Anti-Saloon league. Fess, like Pomerene, was opposed by organized labor.

Returns from 114 precincts gave Pomerene 11,412 and Lentz 921.

The vote from 327 precincts in the republican senatorial contest stood Fess 14,301, former Senator Charles Dick, Akron, 4501; ex-Lieutenant-Governor John H. Arnold of Columbus 4749, and David W. Wood, a civil war veteran of Samsky, 2558.

The vote from 366 precincts gave: Donahy 10,847, Duffy 5413, Johnson 4508.

Returns showed the republican vote compiled at 11 P. M. was almost twice as large as the democratic vote. This was due to the unusual interest in the wet and dry and progressive issues prevailing in the republican gubernatorial race.

## MOTHER SEEKS HER BOY

RECOGNITION OF KIDNAPED  
CHILD TO BE ATTEMPTED.

Young Man Believed to Have Been  
Abducted in 1906 Principal  
in Unusual Identification.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 8.—Whether a mother can recognize a child she has not seen for 15 years may be tested out tomorrow at Soap Lake, when Cecil Lenighen, believed by some to be the Cecil Brittan who was kidnapped at Walla Walla in 1906, goes there to see Mrs. P. L. Brittan, the woman whose child disappeared.

## LABOR DAY BOIT OPPOSED

GOVERNOR AGAINST DEMP-  
SEY-BIENNIAL CLASH.

No Decision to Bar Championship  
Match of Heavies Has Yet  
Been Made by Executive.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 8.—Although he has made no decision to bar the proposed boxing contest between Jack Dempsey and Bill Brennan, for the heavyweight championship, to be held at Michigan City, Ind., Labor Day, Governor McCray today said he was opposed to such a match.

Prize fighting in Indiana constitutes a violation of the law, the governor said. Boxing, however, is permitted. The governor indicated that any further action taken by the state in connection with the proposed match would depend on whether the bout was found to be a prize fight or a boxing contest.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—The opposition by Governor McCray of Indiana to the Jack Dempsey-Bill Brennan match at Michigan City, Ind., Labor day, will cause no change in his plans for the contest, Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, said tonight. Kearns said he was leaving tonight for Michigan City to discuss details of the fight with Floyd Fitzsimmons, promoter.

"If the law allows a boxing contest," he added, "I don't see how the governor can stop it. That's all it's going to be."

## I. W. W. Must Stand Trial

KIAMATH FALLS, Or., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—Four members of the Industrial Workers of the World indicted in June on a charge of criminal syndicalism will have state trial. This is the decision of Circuit Judge Leavitt, who today handed down a decision overruling the demurrer to quash the indictments and denying the motion to return propaganda.

## LOAN COMPANY IS URGED

REALTORS ADVISED TO BACK  
ORGANIZATION.

Samuel Stern, Philadelphia Authority, Outlines Plan to Build  
Up Communities Here.

The organization of a building and loan company operating under the mutual and serial plan as in the eastern cities would be of great value in building up many of the communities in Portland, local realtors were told Tuesday night at their meeting in the Chamber of Commerce, by Samuel Stern, Philadelphia authority on the organization and management of building and loan associations.

Such an organization, according to Mr. Stern, would not only mean more business for the real estate men, but would aid possible purchasers of homes who wouldn't be able to obtain their own homes otherwise.

Under the Pennsylvania laws, a building association can loan money on a second mortgage to anyone buying stock in the association. Mr. Stern told the realtors. As the Oregon laws do not permit the loaning of money on anything but a first mortgage and then only 50 per cent of the appraised value, Portland realtors would have to get other legislation passed before a mutual building association could be of benefit to the community.

## CRIPPLED SHIP IN PORT

Bow of H. F. Alexander Is Mass  
of Torn and Twisted Steel.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 8.—With nearly 20 feet of her bow a mass of torn and twisted steel, the Admiral liner, H. F. Alexander, which crashed upon Cape Rock, off the coast of western Washington, early Monday morning, was towed into Elliott bay shortly before 7 o'clock tonight.

The waterfront was lined with spectators as the big vessel, towed by a four-knot speed by two tugboats, was slowly warped into her pier. She will be moved to drydock tomorrow to undergo repairs.

If the young man, now 21 years old, is Cecil Brittan, Mrs. Brittan believes she can recognize him, she said today over the long-distance telephone to a relative of the Brittan family.

Attention was directed to Lenighen by G. W. Stark, a fellow worker in the hotel here and graduate of a detective correspondence school. Lenighen himself remembers nothing earlier than living with a Davis family in Portland, and later with an elderly couple named Lenighen, who gave him his name. Lenighen matches the missing boy in certain physical characteristics, however.

The kidnapping, July 4, 1906, attracted wide attention, and clues were followed to many parts of the country. Mr. Brittan died last Independence day. There is one other child, a boy of 17.

## BURGLAR IS SURPRISED

Proowler Flees When Housewife  
Spots Him and Screams.

H. H. Brown, living at Lakewood station on the Oregon City line, reported to the police Tuesday night that a burglar of about 25 years threatened Mrs. Brown with a revolver yesterday afternoon, but had been frightened away without loot.

Mrs. Brown, after an absence, returned to the house to find that it had been burglarized. As she passed the bathroom door the man jumped out, threatening her with the revolver and demanding that she keep quiet. As a result she screamed as loud as she could and ran from the house. The proowler ran away.

**Mrs. Sadie McManis Is Dead.**  
SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—Mrs. Sadie E. McManis, 60, arrived in Spokane from Portland to visit her sister, Mrs. Margaret Pauker, West 113 Kierman avenue. Mrs. McManis was extremely ill and was conveyed from the train to the Pauker home, where she died.

**Mascott Loses Decision.**  
EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Aug. 8.—"Peewee" Kaiser of St. Louis won the newspaper decision over Billy Mascott of Portland, Or., in a ten-round no-decision bout last night. Kaiser defeated Mascott decisively on points, according to sport writers. They are bantamweights.

**Logger Crushed to Death.**  
Lewis Hendrickson, 41, single and a logger, was killed about ten miles from Linton Tuesday afternoon while employed in the woods when he was crushed between two logs. His body was brought to the city by the coroner.

## EDITOR ESCHEWS AUTO

LICENSE TO DRIVE GIVEN UP  
AFTER ACCIDENT.

R. Y. Blalock Blames Self for  
Allowing Machine to Run  
to Center of Road.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—R. Y. Blalock, editor and manager of the Western Baptist, with headquarters at Beaverton, has the distinction of being the first automobile driver in Oregon who has surrendered voluntarily his operator's license. Mr. Blalock's operator's license was received at the offices of the secretary of state here today.

"Owing to the fact that I was caught off my guard while driving my car on the Columbia River highway 14 miles below The Dalles last Monday night," said Mr. Blalock's letter to the secretary of state, "I let the machine run to the center of the road. At that moment I was crashed into by a car driven by N. Morast, a 17-year-old boy living at 222 Calhoun street, The Dalles.

"For this failure on my part of keeping my car to the extreme right of the highway, I surrender my motor vehicle operator's license. My car was a total loss. Elder C. R. Chase of Grangeville, Idaho, was in the front seat of the machine with me. He was bruised and suffered a few cuts on the face, but was not hurt seriously. I was bruised all over my body. E. T. Clark of McMinnville and my two daughters were in the rear seat of the car and escaped with a few minor bruises.

"The mother of Morast, who occupied the other machine, said she suffered a few slight bruises. I went back to The Dalles and agreed to pay for the repairs, which Morast said would settle the matter between us. I did not see the approaching car."

Steel Merger Proposed.  
TOKIO.—A proposal has been made to the government for a merger of the private and government owned steel concerns of the country. It was also suggested that the Manchurian iron and steel plant, included, but this has been dropped.

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
