

\$25,000 HEART BALM ASKED BY HUSBAND

Dr. Porch Accused of Alienating Woman's Love.

J. H. WATSON FILES SUIT

Clandestine Night Visits by Physician, Parties in Office and Intimacy Are Charged.

Setting the monetary value of his wife's love and companionship at \$25,000, John H. Watson, 1016 East Sixteenth street North, filed suit in the circuit court yesterday asking that sum and an additional \$1000 a punitive damages from Dr. Charles L. Porch, local physician, who is accused of the alienation of Mrs. Watson's affections.

A sensational series of charges, alleging clandestine night visits of the doctor to the Watson home during the husband's absence and a series of parties served in the physician's private offices in the Gerlinger building are contained in the document. Mrs. Watson is a middle-aged woman, mother of a family of four children, three of whom have attained legal majority. The husband and Dr. Porch have been fast friends and members of the same lodge. Dr. Porch, according to his statement, has acted as a physician for the family.

Intimacy Is Charged.
Watson, in his complaint filed yesterday, stated that he married Mrs. Watson at Saint Ste Marie, Mich., in 1906, and that the couple are the parents of four children, three of whom are grown and a fourth is a boy of 12. Watson's occupation, he claims, requires that he be away from home for long periods and that during these absences the wife and Dr. Porch grew unduly intimate. The physician, he charges, was a frequent visitor at the Watson home, both during day and night time, and Mrs. Watson was a regular caller in the doctor's private offices in the Gerlinger building. During these visits to the office, Watson charges, private parties were served, and the doctor, he claims, was in the habit of following by trips to theaters.

The doctor was a free spender, according to the husband, and made Mrs. Watson frequent presents of merchandise and money.

Watson asserts that this liaison continued for some time and that he did not learn of the relations between the pair until August 1. As a result of his discovery he has been unable to live with Mrs. Watson and his home has been wrecked.

The \$20,000, he claims, represents the actual cash value of the lost wife while the additional \$5000 should be levied against the physician as punishment.

Dr. Porch Perturbed.
None of the parties to the affair show any inclination to add further information to the charges. Watson's attorney, Elsie A. Baker, flatly refused to make any comment on the charges. Watson, when approached, said he was not prepared to add anything more to his present troubles through publicity.

Dr. Porch was plainly perturbed when informed of the charges. He charges which his erstwhile friend had placed against him.

"There's some mistake somewhere," he stated. "I know nothing of any such affair. I know both Mr. and Mrs. Watson and in fact I consider myself one of Mr. Watson's friends. I belong to his lodge and have been called by him to his home during sickness. Why, the man never said a word to me about this affair. It's an absolute mystery to me."

Dr. Porch is married and lives with his wife at 284 Tenth street.

SELLS-FLOTO SHOW HERE

GREAT AGGREGATION WILL REMAIN TWO DAYS.

Big Street Parade and Unusual Thrills Under Canvas Feature Spectacular Programmes.

FACTS ABOUT SELLS-FLOTO

Arrival.—The Sells-Floto flying squadron—cooks, horse lents and menagerie—was due to arrive in Portland yesterday afternoon. The other two trains were due at 4 A. M. and 5 A. M.

Parade route.—The Sells-Floto street parade—largest in the world and last of the year—will leave the grounds at 10:30 A. M. and proceed on Twenty-fourth to Quincy, to Nineteenth, to Alder, to Third, to Burnside, to Sixth, to Everett, to Twenty-third and to the lot.

Performances.—"Night in Cairo," opening spectacle, begins at 2 and 8 P. M.

Red and yellow balloons will bob today. Bands will play and calliope "will chant."

It's a real circus day, too, with a "grand tree street parade" scheduled to open Sells-Floto's two-day stay in Portland.

Before daylight a train of 78-foot steel cars, loaded with menagerie cages, cookhouse wagons and horses, steamed into the city from Tacoma, and rapidly unloaded. Within three hours two more trains were due—two trains of steel, flat, elephant and horse cars, constituting the only solid steel road equipment ever used by a circus, with a mile and three quarters of footings for the transportation of paraphernalia, animals and people.

Sells-Floto boasts of its street parade this year, pointing to its 150 beautiful horses, its many carved cages, its novelty and clowning and its smart and well-groomed appearance. It is the largest circus parade in the world and it will be the last that Portlanders will see.

Although there are 25 elephants with the circus, ten will not be seen in parade. They are babies too small to make the parade. Among them is Tom Thumb, aged 4 months, the smallest baby elephant in the world, a wee chap just over 3 feet high and weighing but 274 pounds. Tommy is on a diet of boiled rice, and although he and "Fodder" Hanneford, famous equestrian comedian, will be guests of honor at the luncheon of the International 100 Per Cent club at the Multnomah hotel this noon, Tommy will have to stick to his regular rations.

PARK TO BE DEDICATED

Farmers and Business Men Will Join in Community Picnic.

MONTESANO, Wash., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—The dedication of Schaefer's park, about ten miles northeast of Montesano, on the banks of the Satsop, will be celebrated Friday with a farm bureau picnic which will be attended by the farmers from all over the county, and by a Montesano business men's picnic, jointly.

This park was donated by Schaefer Brothers Logging company to the public, and was put under the charge of the Montesano chamber of commerce. From almost the first settlement of the country it had been used as a picnic grounds. First there was a fort there and later a hippodrome and a fair. The Fish Hatchery bridge, and on the east banks of the Satsop was a big grove of maples and firs in which was a playground for some distance back from the gravelly river beach. At the dedication ceremonies a bronze tablet will be laid which will honor the parents as well as the boys who made the gift to the public.

WOMAN ACCUSES GREEK

MRS. WILLIS, 17, REPORTS ALLEGED KIDNAPING.

Police Asked to Investigate Story to Effect That Wife Was Carried Off From Home.

To be kidnaped by a swarthy Greek and taken to a shack near Linnton, where she was blindfolded and placed in a room with several other women, all disrobed, was the harrowing experience of Mrs. Howard Willis, 17, 555 Rhine street, according to a story related to the police yesterday.

Mrs. Willis said she was walking near her home when a woman drove by in an automobile and invited her to take a ride. A few blocks farther, she said, a Greek got into the machine and bound and gagged her. It was then she was taken to the shack near Linnton, she said, where she was attacked. There were several other Greeks in the shack as well as three other women, who were blindfolded and nude.

Mrs. Willis said she was not released until late in the afternoon, when she went home and told her husband of her experience. The husband and the young woman's brother reported the affair to the police immediately.

Mrs. Willis said she sought to scream out and attract attention when she was first seized in the automobile, but that she fainted as soon as her assailant grappled with her, and was powerless to summon aid.

The husband told the police he thought he knew the identity of the Greek whom Mrs. Willis accused. The husband was told to procure a warrant for the man's arrest and the matter would be thoroughly investigated.

1925 SESSION PLANS LAID

Head of International Body of Specialty Salesmen Meet.

Plans and purposes of the International Association of Specialty Salesmen were discussed by the president of this newly formed organization, Albert G. Burns of Oakland, Cal., at a dinner and get-together meeting of interested Portlanders at the Washington Hotel Tuesday evening. Through efforts of President Burns, Portland was selected as the place for the 1925 convention and preliminary plans for this event were talked over at the meeting.

Committees were appointed to carry forward arrangements for the international sessions to be held here and the routine work of the association as well. President Burns is to address other civic bodies before leaving for Spokane.

HUNTER RUN TO COVER

Man With Beaver Meat Heavily Fined for State Offense.

Warren A. Cornell, deputy game warden, reported into the offices of the game commission yesterday that he had effected the arrest of George Kallias of Mays, Or., who has been suspected for some time of having beaver meat in his possession. The

tip came to the game officials from Denver that Kallias was an offender, and officers of this state were on the lookout for him. Cornell proceeded to the Deschutes country to serve a warrant on Kallias, whom he accidentally encountered while the suspect was hunting without an alien license.

Cornell arrested him for this offense, ignorant of the fact that he was Kallias, the man for whom he had a warrant. He was tried August 8 at The Dalles and fined \$25 for hunting without an alien license.

Cornell then brought him to Portland, where he appeared before Judge Deleh of the district court and pleaded guilty to the accusation

of possessing beaver meat. Judge Deleh imposed a fine of \$250 to be altered in case of appeal from his court to \$500 with six months in jail, and \$1500 in bonds.

Lois Kahemic of Mays also was arrested by Cornell for hunting without an alien license and fined \$25 at The Dalles, August 8.

Offense Held Unintentional.

Because Tom J. Myers, 126 Grand avenue, and J. M. Force, 655 East Forty-sixth street, North, were able to convince Federal Judge Wolven-ton that their fishing in the Bull Run forest reserve was done without intent to violate the law, they were let off with \$5 fines when they appeared in court yesterday on charges of trespassing on the reserve. The two men were arrested by forest rangers last week. They said they had been directed to the stream by the proprietor of a nearby mountain resort.
