AUTO THIEF SENTENCED—Justice came swift and sure yesterday for George Davis, confessed automobile thief. Just 10 hours after he had been arrested with a stolen automobile in his possession he had pleaded guilty and started serving a one-year sentence imposed by Municipal Judge E. K. Wall. Davis was arrested at 4 A. M. yesterday by Patrolmen Gallagher and Perry at Interstate and Alberta streets with an automobile which had been stolen from Frank Arthur at Eleventh and Taylor streets Wednesday night. He attempted to break away from the arresting officers and had to be struck down before he would submit to capture.

VETERANS TO ENTERTAIN CHIEF—Robert L. Woodson, national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, in company with a number of the national executives of his organization, will arrive in Portland Sunday morning at 7:30 o'clock. He will take breakfast at the Multnomah hotel and then, as a guest of the local post, will spend the day at the city hall. The veterans will be taken on a trip over the Columbia river highway. Mr. Woodson will spend the day night for Seattle, where the convention of his organization will be held next week.

MOTHER SEKS SON—Mrs. Emma Darnum, 222 Harrison street, Topeka, Kan., has written to The Oregonian for aid in locating her son, Alfred Darnum, from whom she received no word since 1905. The mother states her son left home in May 1905, and she received one letter in June of the same year. Since that time she has been unable to locate him. She believes he may have come to the Pacific coast.

BIOLOGISTS ON INSPECTION TRIP—Predatory and insectivorous birds and Assistant Biologist Gabrielson, both of the United States bureau of biological survey, left last night for a regular inspection trip into central Oregon on which they will be gone about two weeks. Jewett is planning conferences with government trappers and will determine upon their locations during the winter trapping season. Gabrielson will lay plans for the fall rabbit campaign in the central and eastern Oregon counties.

DRAWINGS ARE REQUIRED
MR. BIGELOW'S DEMAND ON BUILDERS PROTESTED.
 Blueprints for Private Garages Before Obtaining Permits.
 Said to Be Costly.

Architects' drawings of private garages and other small buildings are in demand at the city hall these days.
 Many individual complaints have been made to city officials concerning the demand of the city building bureau for architects' drawings for private garages before permits will be issued—drawings that cost in the neighborhood of \$20. It is maintained that simple drawings would suffice.

Wednesday in the regular council session Commissioner Bigelow came to the rescue of the architects by refusing to vote for a permit to A. P. Elerath for a brick and tile building on East Glisan street, between East Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, unless he first produced a drawing made by some architect.
 Mr. Elerath said that if the permit was granted he was bound to follow the building code and that it was not fair to require him to furnish an architect's drawing before he knew whether he was to be granted the permit.

City Commissioner Barbur, in charge of the building bureau, said such a drawing was not necessary, but Commissioner Bigelow remained adamant. As a result the applicant must bring in the drawings to gain Commissioner Bigelow's vote.

YOUNGSTER IS DISARMED
 Boy, Chased by Man, Caught Loading Rifle for Fight.

Wallace Sabin, 12, went gunning for H. E. Laventine, 1947 East Seventh street North, late Wednesday night because the youth stubbed his toe while in full flight to escape the wrath of Laventine's dog. According to the story told to Patrolman Reed, who investigated and took a rifle away from the youth, young Sabin had slipped on a piece of ice down the neck of Jean Laventine, aged 8. The girl's father started to chase the youth, who fell and stubbed his toe. Then, in anger, he went to the home of his parents and got a rifle which he was attempting to load when the policeman arrived.
 The youngster's parents are at the coast and the boy is staying with friends. He was admonished to leave firearms alone and then released.

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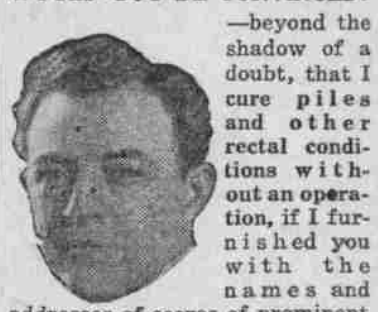
