

ELECTION CONTEST
TO RESUME TODAY50 Called to Testify in Hall-
Olcott Proceedings.

DISCREPANCIES ARE CUT

Prominent Marion County Men
to Testify on Alleged In-
fluencing of Voters.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—Serving of a half hundred civil subpoenas on prospective witnesses was completed last night and the stage has been set for resumption of the Hall-Olcott election contest proceedings in the Marion county circuit court at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. Most of the attorneys interested in the case arrived here tonight.

R. R. Cozier, plaintiff in the contest filed on behalf of Charles Hall, defeated candidate for the republican nomination for governor at the primary election last May, originally alleged that approximately 750 votes in Marion county had been cast illegally. The recount of the votes here failed to show any serious discrepancies and last Friday the list of alleged illegal voters was reduced to 162. Yesterday there was a further reduction. The amended list of Marion county voters who are alleged to have cast their ballots illegally has been fixed by the contestant at 55.

Salem Editor Summoned.
George Putnam, editor and publisher of the Salem Capital Journal, is among the prominent men of this vicinity who have been summoned to appear and testify tomorrow morning. The contestant charges that Mr. Putnam is a democrat, and that he changed his party affiliation at the polls on primary election day in bad faith. Before accepting reelection, Putnam demanded the \$2 fee allowed witnesses by statute, together with 10 cents mileage. This was paid to Mr. Putnam by the person serving the subpoena.

Another prominent Marion county man who will testify here tomorrow is Theodore Brentano, a resident of the St. Paul precinct. The contestant alleges that Mr. Brentano was influenced to vote for Governor Olcott and to refrain from voting for Mr. Hall by a priest of the Catholic church. Mr. Brentano said today that he had voted in Marion county since 1923 and this is the first time his ballot has been questioned. Mr. Brentano is now serving as justice of the peace of the St. Paul precinct.

Others to Testify.
Besides Mr. Putnam, persons summoned to testify with relation to changing their party affiliations at the polls in bad faith are Mary Fisher, Robert McNamara, John Bannick, Charles Meier, W. H. Farr, Josephine Nibler, Theodore Higginberger, Lawrence Farachsweller, Theodore Brentano, Peter G. Braxell, Fred Meier, Jennie Farr, John Ditter and Frank Bell.

Witnesses who are alleged to have been unduly influenced by priests at the primary election include Mary Fisher, Robert McNamara, Peter G. Braxell, Josephine Nibler, Josephine Nibler, Theodore Brentano, John Bannick, Walburga Belland, Marie Kraemer, John Hertl, Alois Duhl and Lawrence Farachsweller.

Several Days Required.
Attorneys said today that it probably will require three or four days to take the testimony of the witnesses already under summons. Because of court rulings handed down when the case was first called for trial here two weeks ago, attorneys indicated today that the taking of testimony will proceed smoothly. The court already has held that a voter has a legal right to change his or her party affiliation at the polls on election day.

In case such action is free of fraud and in good faith. It also has been held by the court that any irregularities of this nature would effect only the individual voter and would not warrant the court in invalidating the entire election in any precinct. Judges G. G. Bingham and Percy Kelly are sitting on bench in the trial of the case.

Dried Fruit to Be Shipped.
SALEM, Or., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—The first carload of evaporated loganberries to be shipped from Salem this season will leave here tomorrow. The fruit will be consigned to the Chicago markets. The car will contain 2800 boxes of berries, or approximately 24 tons. The order for the fruit was received late Friday afternoon, and the packing was not started until yesterday. The shipment will be made under the direction of the Oregon Growers Co-operative association.

THROUGH BEAUTY SPOTS.

Vice-President and Family Attend Church in Morning.
Highway Trip Today.

was the hour of worship at the First Presbyterian church. In the afternoon a motor trip about the city and its view-giving drives was enjoyed. Dinner at the residence of Judge and Mrs. Wallace McCann, whose guests Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge and sons are during their stay in Portland, rounded out the day for them.

Environment in Planning.

The Oregon day and the Oregon environment gave highly pleasing impressions, the visitors said. Not only the city's beauty spots, but its substantial foundations of commercial and industrial nature as well made appeal to him, the vice-president said.

After making an address before the American Bar association convention in San Francisco the vice-president, members of his family and guests of the trip headed for Portland. An incentive for the visit was the privilege of spending three days with Wallace McCann, prominent Portland attorney and political leader, and family. Friendship and admiration of Mr. McCann for the then governor of Massachusetts, expressed in a nominating speech before the republican national convention at Chicago in 1920, helped make Mr. Coolidge vice-president of the United States.

Family With Mr. Coolidge.
With Mr. Coolidge are his wife and sons, John and Calvin Coolidge. Mr. and Mrs. Frank W. Stearns, friends from Boston, and a member of the government secret service. The first presidential party since the fall of Wednesday morning. Tomorrow night at the municipal auditorium Mr. Coolidge will make his first public appearance at an address which all citizens are invited to hear.

In company with Mr. and Mrs. McCann, the vice-president and members of his family attended service yesterday morning at the First Presbyterian church, where they heard a sermon by Dr. Norman K. Tully on "The Risen and Glorified Christ." Presence of the distinguished visitors at the service was rather expected by the church-going public, though the advance announcement had not indicated the particular church they would attend. They unobtrusively entered the McCann pew during the singing of the opening hymn. The departure was equally inconspicuous except that at the door the vice-president shook hands with Dr. Tully and a few others near at hand.

Sermon to Commend.
Mr. Coolidge expressed commendation of the sermon to Dr. Tully and those with him. It dealt with the contrast that while in centuries past Christians placed Christ on too high a pedestal of reverence and remoteness, the present generation has swung to the opposite extreme in ignoring Christ's divinity. Present civilization was criticized as too materialistic and militaristic. In citing examples of how the present generation slights the divine Christ the preacher touched momentarily on things political. He said: "When we engage in our campaigns we think there is just one thing to accomplish—get our man elected—and the man of God becomes only an iridescent dream."

As guests of Mr. McCann Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge, their sons and Mr. Stearns were taken at 3:30 o'clock for a two-hour drive about the city. They visited Mount Tabor and Washington parks and the Foresty building, drove through Irvington, Westover Terraces and other residential districts and viewed the valley panorama from Fairmount and Terwilliger boulevards.

Dinner at Residence.
The drive was followed by dinner at the McCann residence, 234 King street. The guests then returned to pass the night in the hotel Portland, where for the three days of their stay they are occupying the presidential suite, so called because in the past occupied by visiting presidents and other noted guests.

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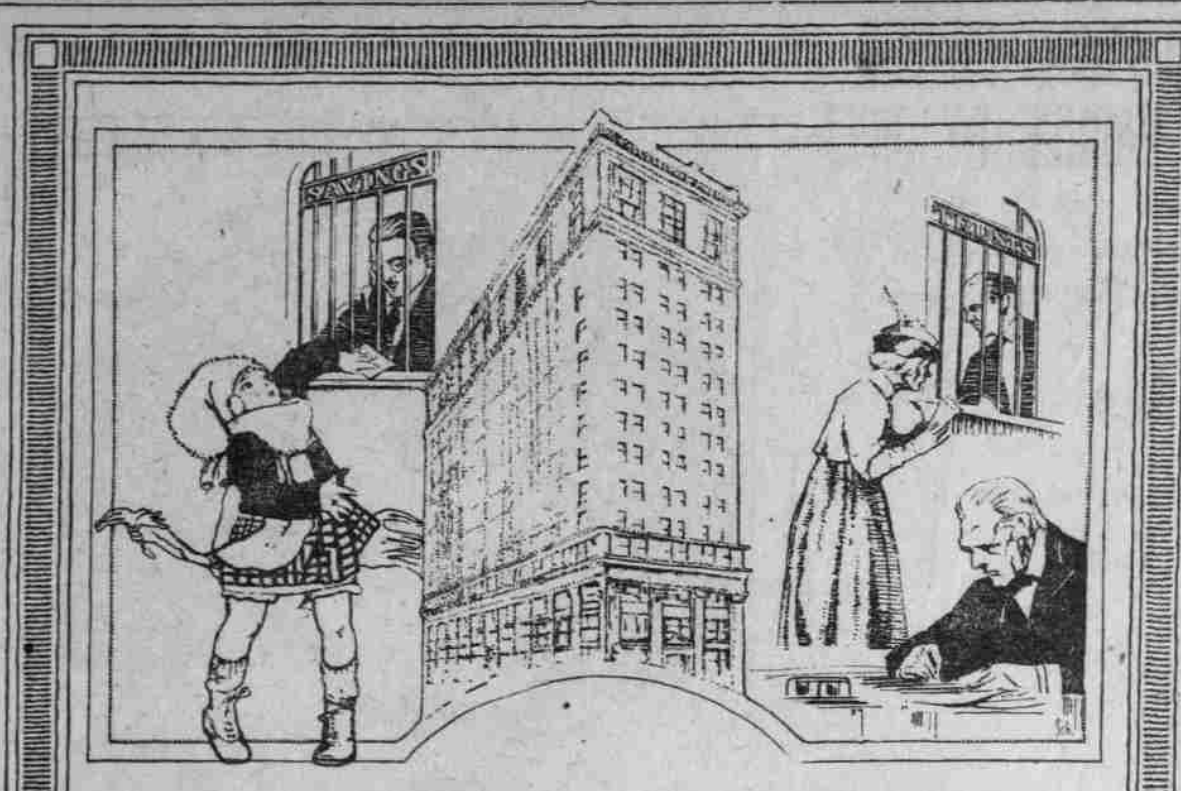

MERGER HEARING TODAY

PORT CONSOLIDATION WILL
BE DISCUSSED.

Foreign Trade Department of
Chamber to Test Sentiment of Public.

At a public hearing to begin at 10 A. M. tomorrow, a special committee of the foreign trade department of the Chamber of Commerce will listen to the views of Portland citizens regarding the consolidation of the Port of Portland with the following commission of public docks. About two years ago the Chamber of Commerce went on record as favoring the consolidation, which at that time received approval of business men generally, and a measure authorizing consolidation was placed on the state ballot in the 1920 election. The measure carried in Multnomah county by a majority of 5827, but was defeated by the up-state vote with a majority against for the whole state of 1678, although the act did not affect the state outside of the port district. The legislature

enacted a law at the 1921 session authorizing the two commissions to consolidate, provided the port acquired properties of the dock commission, and under the terms of this measure the consolidation if effected must be before January 1, 1923.

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce, when the subject was brought to public attention several weeks ago, requested the foreign trade department to name a special committee to hold a hearing at which all parties interested would have an opportunity to express their opinions in order that it might be known whether there are economic or other reasons reflecting a change in public sentiment. The committee to conduct the hearing is composed of men representing the financial, mercantile, realty, shipping and jobbing interests of the city, with the following personnel: A. L. Mills, chairman; Ben Selling, W. B. Ayer, J. W. Ganong and Nathan Strauss.

The hearing will be open to the public and will be held in the green room of the chamber, seventh floor Oregon building.

State Hospital Patient Fees.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—Afton Morn, aged 32, who was committed to the state hospital for the insane from Portland about six months ago, last night prior to the escape of the bars of his cell and

escaped. Hospital attendants believe he headed for Portland, where his wife lives, and the police there have been asked to be on the lookout for him. Morn left in regulation hospital garb, but with only one shoe. He is considered a dangerous character, with homicidal tendencies.

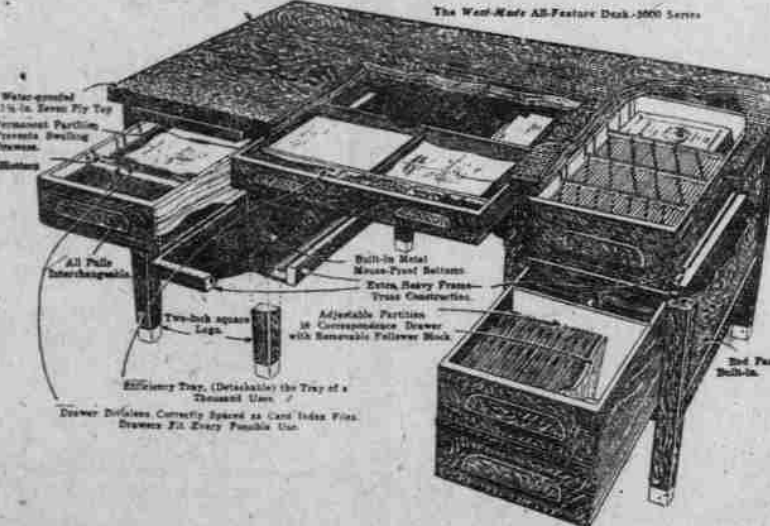
