

PITTSBURG PIRATES HANG UP RECORD

New York-St. Louis Monopoly Is Threatened.

TEAM CLIMBS RAPIDLY

Club Playing With Fire and Dash That Recalls Pennant Drive of Braves in 1914.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Playing with the fire and dash that recalls the Boston Braves' famous pennant drive in 1914, the Pittsburgh Pirates, rejuvenated under the leadership of Bill McKechnie, threaten to upset the New York-St. Louis monopoly in the National League and make a three-clash struggle down the home stretch.

The Pirates hung up a season's record Saturday when they won their thirteenth straight victory, and although checked in a ten-inning battle today by Cincinnati, they are separated from the first-place Giants by only five and a half games. Steady and at times brilliant pitching, plus a terrific batting attack, are the driving factors in the club's success.

The Giants, meanwhile, whose fielding and pitching cracked badly against western rivals, regained first place from the St. Louis Cardinals by trouncing Brooklyn three times in two days. By defeating Boston today the champions increased their lead to a game and a half.

Though unable to gain on the St. Louis Browns, the Yankees apparently have hit their real stride. The margin separating the two rivals remained unchanged today as both clubs won. The Yankees, who have lost the Browns to Chicago.

Improved infield play, due to the addition of Joe Judge and a sustained batting attack by Wally Pipp and Babe Ruth have combined to fortify the Yankees for the drive toward the finish.

The Browns, with none too good twirling, have maintained their pace chiefly because of heavy hitting.

Detroit and the White Sox, unable to withstand the swift pace of the leading American contenders, dropped back while the Chicago Cubs are on the heels of the Pirates in the National League.

Cleveland and Cincinnati top the second division by comfortable margins.

FIGHT HEADS GATHERING

DEMPSEY-BRENNAN MATCH BRINGS CHIEFS TOGETHER.

Following Posting of Forfeits at Chicago, Boxers Will Go to Quarters to Train.

(By Chicago Tribune Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, heavy-weight champion, who will defend his title against Hill Brennan of Chicago in Floyd Fitzsimmons' bowl at Michigan City Labor day afternoon, came to Chicago tonight to meet the champion, who will arrive from Detroit early tomorrow.

Following the arrival of Kearns and Fitzsimmons came Leo Flynn, manager of Brennan, who arrived at night to meet his opponent. Flynn was afraid the railroad strike would hold him up. Flynn was not expected until tomorrow morning, but was eager to get on the ground and start the wheels of machinery in motion to have him in the best of shape. Flynn asserted he is ready to meet his opponent and is anxious to have his fighter settle down to training.

Flynn let it be known he will be boss of the Brennan camp and that there will be no fooling when Hill gets to work. He will box from eight to 10 rounds every day and cover at least six miles on the road.

Following the posting of forfeits Promoter Fitzsimmons will take both boxes and Brennan will be training quarters have been established.

The champion's manager announced that sparring partners will be Michigan City tomorrow and that Dempsey will put on the gloves Tuesday. Jack Malone, Billy Wells, Jack Taylor and Jack Thompson have been engaged to do the catching and pitching during Dempsey's training.
