

LORD NORTHCLIFFE'S CAREER IS EDED

Noted British Publisher Dies
in London.

ALL ENGLAND IMPRESSED

News of Death Causes No Sur-
prise—Funeral Services Will
Be in Westminster Abbey.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Viscount Northcliffe, noted British publicist, died today.

News of Lord Northcliffe's death was given out by the doctors who have been attending him in this bulletin.

"Viscount Northcliffe died at 10:12 o'clock. The end was perfectly peaceful."

The medical terms used in giving the cause of Lord Northcliffe's death were ulcerative endocarditis, streptococcal septicemia and terminal syncope. This, in popular parlance, means an inflammation of the lining and membrane of the heart, with consequent infection of the blood and sudden failure of the heart, due to fainting.

The death of an other unofficial person could have made a deeper impression in England than that of Lord Northcliffe. The news was not a surprise, the bulletins issued by the doctors for the past week plainly indicated that their patient was dying.

Lord Northcliffe was by far the most noted figure in British journalism, and the first question on everyone's lips was as to what effect his death will have on the policies of the Times and his other newspapers, which since the end of the war have strongly opposed Lloyd George administration and its principles, with the notable exception of its dealings with Ireland, which the Northcliffe press supported throughout.

Lord Northcliffe will be buried Thursday in the St. Mary le Bow cemetery, Finchley. The funeral service will be held in Westminster abbey.

MYSTERY CLOUDS ILLNESS

Future of Times in Doubt Owing
to Terms of Contract.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Lord Northcliffe's death, although expected, came as a shock to London and formed the chief news of all evening papers, crowding out even such events as the international conference.

Lord Northcliffe died at his home, 1 Carlton Gardens, where he had been lying ill about three months since his return from Switzerland. There was much mystery about his place of residence during his illness, not even members of the staffs of his own papers being allowed to know where he was. There was mystery also about his illness, which was said to be due to an infection of the blood caused by some obscure poisoning. It is no secret, however, that he suffered a complete mental breakdown at the end.

He first began to show signs of the strain more than a year ago and was persuaded to take a world trip in the hope that rest and change would restore his health. This seemed effective at first, but after his return he plunged into work again and the hope that rest and change would restore his health.

There is much speculation about the disposition of his immense newspaper and other properties. He left no heir to his title. He left a widow and four brothers, Viscount Rothermere, Sir Leicester Harcourt, Cecil Harcourt and Sir Hildebrand Harcourt. It is said no one knows the contents of his will.

The future of the Times is in doubt owing to the strange terms of the contract by which he obtained control. Under this he retained control while the interest on debentures and preference shares was paid. He had been paying this out of his own pocket, although the Times is losing money. If his successors do not carry on this policy the Times will revert to the Walter family. There is also some doubt about the purchase of a heavy block of Walter shares just before his breakdown, and it is said that this may be set aside.

The dean of Westminster Abbey has offered to hold funeral services there on Thursday before the interment in St. Mary le Bow cemetery and his widow has accepted the offer.

PRESIDENT SENDS MESSAGE

Expression of Sympathy Conveyed
to Lady Northcliffe.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 14.—President and Mrs. Harding, in a message dispatched by Secretary Hughes today, directed the American embassy in London to express to Lady Northcliffe their sympathy at the death of Lord Northcliffe. The message said:

"The president desires that you express to Lady Northcliffe the heartfelt sympathy of Mrs. Harding and himself on the death of Lord Northcliffe. The president fully appreciates the high qualities of her distinguished husband, his exceptional ability, his dominant personality and his devotion to the service of mankind. He deeply deplores Lord Northcliffe's untimely death. Will you also express to Lady Northcliffe my personal sympathy and grief? (Signed) Hughes."

changed his party affiliations in good faith was not sufficient and that the contestant had the right to demand that the witness name the candidate for whom he voted for governor. R. S. McNamee, also a resident of the St. Paul precinct, was questioned about his relation to changing his party affiliations at the polls. Mr. McNamee at first said he did not remember whether he voted for governor, but later said he probably did. "If I did vote for this office I probably cast my ballot for Governor Olcott," he said.

IN POLITICS, KLAN BORES FROM WITHIN

Experience of Others Put to
Good Use.

TEXAS IS BEST FIELD

Hooded Knights Said to Have
Been Most Successful in
State on Border.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 14.—A flavor of the dark, mysterious, heightened by terrible oaths, mystic pass-words and creepy ritual, has been contributed to the political contests in several western states by the white robed Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

In politics the klansmen are the "Know Nothings" of the '50s brought up to date. In exerting political power along the lines of race and religious prejudice, through secret organizations, the Klan is the counterpart of the Know Nothings, but unlike the Know Nothings the Klan is not a political party. Taking a leaf from the successful experience of the Anti-Saloon league, the Non-partisan league and the American Federation of Labor, the Klan is "born from within" the republican and democratic parties and creating considerable havoc thereby.

Most Success in Texas.

The Klan has been most successful up to date in Texas, where its candidates for United States senator, Earle B. Mayfield, led the field in the recent democratic primary. The democratic nomination for senator will be determined by Ferguson, run-off primary on August 26 in which Mayfield is opposed by J. E. Ferguson, who was impeached and removed from the governorship a few years ago. Senator Culberson, arch opponent of the Klan, ran third in the first primary and was eliminated.

Among the also rans in the first primary was "Bob" Henry, ex-representative in congress, who went into the contest with Klan support. Eventually, however, the grapevine circuit carried the secret sign from the imperial palace at Atlanta designating Mayfield as the favored one and Henry disappeared from the contest.

Mayfield Is Prohibitionist.

Mayfield is a prohibitionist as well as a Klan candidate, while Ferguson, advocating light wines and beer and attracting strong labor support, is giving Mayfield a hard tussle for the nomination. Ferguson accuses Mayfield of being a dry for political purposes only and challenges Mayfield to make an affidavit that he has purchased no liquor since the Volstead act was passed. Furthermore, Ferguson says in his speeches that if Mayfield will attach a \$500 draft to his affidavit he (Ferguson) will honor it.

The republican candidate is E. C. Wilcott, an Austin banker who hails from Pennsylvania. A prospective progressive republican candidate is Major George C. Butte, former University of Texas law professor.

In Oregon the Klan precipitated a bitter fight in the republican party. With the nomination of Governor Ben W. Olcott in the republican primaries over Charles Hall, endorsed by the Klan, a contest was instituted, the Hall forces claiming that voters in many precincts. After a recount of ballots in certain precincts in Marion, Multnomah and Clatsop counties, and a court hear-

ing on the fraud charges, the Hall
forces finally abandoned the con-
test, having failed to prove the al-
legations, thereby leaving Mr. Olcott,
who has openly opposed the Klan,
the republican nominee.

The Klan won the democratic pri-
mary for the nomination of county
offices of Tulsa county and counties
in Oklahoma along the Texas border
where its Texas propaganda had
percolated. In the big contest over
the democratic nomination for gov-
ernor, however, the Klan met signal
defeat. The nominee is Mayor Wal-
ton of Oklahoma City, who fought
the Klan to a standstill and an-
nounced that if elected governor he
would run all the klansmen he could
lay hands on into the Arkansas
river.

Lumber Company Organized.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 14.—(Special.)
—The Penn Lumber company, with
a capital of \$50,000, has been orga-
nized here and announcement made
that the Penn mill near Eugene,
recently destroyed by fire, will be
rebuilt at once. The directors of
the new concern are W. J. Lichty,
J. D. Harvey, L. A. Carson, W. W.
Harvey and Thomas F. McGlynn.
The new plant will have a daily
capacity of 40,000 feet.

Suspect to Be Returned.
