6894 CARS REGISTERED AT AUTO CAMP THIS SUMMER

JOB DRIVE IS STARTED

CRIPPLED VETERANS WANT TO EARN LIVINGS.

Federal Bureau Seeks to Place Men Who Graduate From Training Schools.

With a number of rehabilitated war veterans of this city and vicinity unemployed, Kenneth L. Cooper, local manager of the United States Veterans' bureau, urged yesterday that local employers make every effort during the coming week, beginning next Monday morning, to place these disabled veterans, now capable tradesmen, clerical and industrial workers in permanent positions.

More than 900 war veterans of this district have completed their vocational courses and we have 3000 more in process of training, said Mr. Cooper. "Many of the rehabilitated veterans are unemployed and we are prospecting for jobs for scores of former service people who will graduate from their training courses within the next two or three months. Even though the employer has no opening now, he should be listed with the local office of the veterans' bureau in order that we may keep in touch with every employment prospect."

The veterans bureau recently established an employment service in each one of its branch offices.
