

\$100 OFFER JEERED BY MRS. WAKEFIELD

"It Was Rod," Says Woman,
"Who Made Proposal."

"I'M BROKE," SHE ASSERTS

Defendant in \$25,000 Suit for
Alienation Scouts Idea of
Buying Another's Mate.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—Mrs. Edith Huntington-Spreckels Wakefield denied today that she had offered Mrs. Rodney Kendrick \$100 a month for life if she would divorce her husband. "It was Rod who offered her the monthly payments," said Mrs. Wakefield. "How could I make her such an offer? I am broke. I wish I had \$100 a month myself. I do my own housework, even the cooking and washing."

Franklyn Wakefield, the former Mrs. Spreckels' husband, refused today to comment on the Wakefield-Kendrick love tangle. He still is Mrs. Wakefield's husband. The divorce suit filed by Mrs. Wakefield has not come up in court yet. Only the initial papers have been filed. "The women in the case are apparently doing enough talking for 20 men," said Wakefield today. "Why should I butt in at this stage of the game?"

Meanwhile, despite Mrs. Wakefield's assertion that she is without funds, attorneys for Mrs. Kendrick are preparing their papers for the \$25,000 alienation suit, which probably will be filed before the end of the week.

Mrs. Wakefield admitted today that she had cared for Mrs. Kendrick in her home in order to help Kendrick out. "But don't think for a minute that I want a former wife around the man I was going to marry," she said. "Nothing doing about that line."

SPECKLES SR. GETS NEWS

Financier's Part in Triangle Is
Not Yet Indicated.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—John D. Spreckels, San Diego financier, denied upon his arrival here today in his yacht, the Venetia, that he would not participate in any way "at present" in the situation brought about by the attachment of his former daughter-in-law, Mrs. Edith Huntington-Spreckels Wakefield, to Rodney Kendrick, artist, and the opposition of the artist's wife, Mrs. Nellie Kendrick, to the attachment of Mrs. Wakefield to the attachment of the late John D. Spreckels Jr.

"It's all news to me," Spreckels said upon his arrival. He said he had come to San Francisco on business.

Mrs. Kendrick plans a \$25,000 alienation of affections suit against Mrs. Wakefield, who owns a villa home at Sausalito, Cal., where the Spreckels yacht lies moored.

"I have been on the high seas on my yacht for two days," Kendrick said. "It seems to me that the wireless operator did pick up some sort of message concerning Mrs. Wakefield, but it was so broken up by static conditions that we could not make it out."

"I want to know all about the case before I can say what I will do, if anything."

All parties to the triangle remained in seclusion today, declining to give out any further statements for publication. The Kendricks have moved from the beautiful Wakefield home, Mrs. Kendrick to the home of friends in Alameda, Cal., and Kendrick to a Sausalito hotel.

When it was suggested to Spreckels that he might have an interest in the \$80,000 reported to have been left by his son to Mrs. Wakefield, he replied that "Jack has nothing to leave." He said that he was providing for the three children of Mrs. Wakefield by young Spreckels, but but would not admit he intended any legal steps to take them from Mrs. Wakefield's custody.

WIFE EXPLAINS DEATH

Denver Man's Suicide Said to
Have Been Because of Girl.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 23.—Mrs. Susan S. Willoughby, widow of Lou F. Willoughby, Denver business man who killed himself yesterday, today declared her husband had shot himself after she refused his request that she kill a 20-year-old girl whom she charges with having broken up her home. The name of the girl was not made public.

"My husband also proposed to me that I consent for him to kill me and then himself," said Mrs. Willoughby. "When I refused to consent to this he said he was going to commit suicide."

"Another woman has broken up my home and has driven my husband to kill himself," Mrs. Willoughby added. "Our domestic troubles began three years ago. I was ill in California at the time. Lou left me and went to live with a widow and her daughter, who was then 17 years old."

Willoughby, who was 56 years old, was manager of the Denver branch of a typewriters' company. He shot himself through the temple in his office yesterday and died 20 minutes later at the county hospital.

FELONY ARRESTS GAIN

California Murders, Robberies
and Burglaries Increase.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 23.—An increase of more than 3000 arrests for felony in California during the last year was shown in the annual report of C. S. Morrill, superintendent of the state bureau of identification and investigation made public today. The increase in arrests were largely cases involving murder, robbery, burglary and moral offenses.

In 1921-22 a total of 16,042 arrests were reported to Mr. Morrill by police authorities and the sheriffs of various counties, as against 12,899 arrests for 1920-21.

FARM EXPERT CONFERS

Federal Official Meets With Horticultural Board Chief.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 24.—(Special.)—D. S. Kinsey of the United States department of agriculture was in Salem today conferring with C. A. Parks, president of the Oregon state horticultural board, with relation to measures looking to the inspection of all fruits and vegetables shipped out of this state.

Oregon is the only state in the northwest, Mr. Kinsey said, that does not provide legal machinery for official inspection of products to be shipped outside of its boundaries. Last year Idaho shipped out 13,000 cars of farm and orchard products, California, during the same period, shipped out of the state more than 14,000 cars of products.

LIGHT STATION DAMAGED

Explosion of Transformer Puts
System Out of Commission.

SANTA ANA, Cal., Aug. 23.—A sub-station of the Southern California Edison company, located at Katella, between Santa Ana and Anaheim, was damaged today by the explosion of a 10,000-volt transformer. The station supplied light for Santa Ana, Anaheim and several nearby towns, but it was announced that the company would re-route its power to avoid any extended interruption of service.

Five men working in the station were warned of the trouble by electrical disturbance, and ran from the building in time to escape most of the force of the explosion. Three were hurt, but physicians said their injuries were not fatal.

JAPANESE IS GIRL BRIDE

Pretty Maid of 16 Speaks Little
English and Bridegroom None.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—Miss Chujoko Takeuchi, aged 16 years, a native of Portland, but with very little knowledge of the English language, was married here today to Masara Sakurai, a Multnomah county farmer, whose birthplace was in Japan. Sakurai, who is 24 years old, speaks no English at all, so when the couple appeared in the office of Justice Vaughan, flanked by numerous relatives, it was necessary to employ an interpreter.

"You're getting a very pretty bride," Justice Vaughan told the bridegroom at the conclusion of the ceremony.

BOOM FOR HEARST IS FLATTENING OUT

Smith Announcement Blow
to Gubernatorial Hope.

FIGHT STILL POSSIBLE

Wealthy Publisher Expected to
Seek Nomination of Friend to
Boost Higher Ambition.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—William Randolph Hearst apparently has been eliminated as a formidable contender for the democratic nomination for governor of New York.

The announcement by ex-Governor Smith that he would accept the nomination has aroused boundless enthusiasm among the democrats and the artificially-inflated Hearst boom upstate has collapsed, seemingly beyond the possibility of resuscitation. All surface indications point to the choice of Smith, though possibly not without a lively fight in the convention on September 13.

As an aspirant for the presidency in 1924, however, Hearst is far from eliminated. While unable to make himself governor, he holds such influence as might be employed successfully to prevent the election of the democratic gubernatorial candidate.

Those two facts furnish the key to the maneuverings now going on in the democratic camp.

That Hearst looked upon the governorship as an easy stepping-stone to the democratic nomination for president has been admitted by the chief sponsors for his candidacy. There is a widespread impression that his only reason for seeking the honor was to further his larger ambition. As governor he not only would acquire a prestige that would place him in the first rank of candidates for the democratic nomination for president, but he would be in a position to make himself a choice of the New York delegation, an indispensable prerequisite.

Next to being governor himself

the most important consideration of Hearst has been to place a friend in the office. That would insure him the delegation to the democratic national convention, at least. So Hearst has been booming Mayor Hyman for governor, while Hyman and William J. Conners have been booming Hearst. It looked like a shrewd political play.

Smith Upsets Plans.

Now A. L. Smith, with the hearty approval of Tammany hall, has upset Mr. Hearst's plans and Mr. Hearst's long, long trail to the White House, upon which he set out many years ago, become rockier, if not also longer. "Alphonse" Hearst still insists that "Gaston" Hyman won't let him run, still insists that "Alphonse" Hearst must be the candidate, though in the light of the response to Smith's announcement, it seems exceedingly unlikely that either could get the nomination anyway.

So, if neither Mr. Hearst nor his friend is to be governor, the millionaire publisher and movie magnate must rely upon other means of landing the New York delegation to the 1924 democratic national convention.

This is a matter now occupying the attention of Charles F. Murphy of Tammany Hall and other democratic leaders. The question is whether Mr. Hearst can be kept in line for a democratic state ticket headed by Smith, whom he denounced so comprehensively two years ago, and what arrangement, if any, would keep him in line.

Murphy Against Hearst.

Could a harmony understanding be arrived at whereby Tammany would undertake to deliver the New York delegation to Hearst?

Murphy doesn't want Hearst for a candidate, but he wants his support for the ticket. Otherwise the democrats might be defeated by an independent candidacy or a third party backed by Hearst. The publisher has brought out Major LaGuardia as his candidate for the republican nomination for governor. LaGuardia is a progressive, some call him a radical republican, and under either tag he has small chance of winning the republican nomination.

He would be, however, the logical leader of a third party sponsored by Hearst.
