

STAND BY HARDING, IS OHIO'S SLOGAN

Republican Leaders Lay
Campaign Plans.

STATE CONVENTION HELD

Platform Is to Be Adopted at
Further Sessions Today.
Budget System Lauded.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—With the slogan "stand by the president and the national administration," Ohio republican leaders came here today and laid their plans for the state campaign which will terminate at the polls on November 7.

S. D. Fess, representative in congress, of Yellow Springs, the party nominee for United States senator, sounded the keynote of the campaign in a speech before the republican state convention at Memorial hall.

The convention, after listening to the keynote address and a speech by Senator Willis, recessed until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, when the platform will be adopted. After adopting a declaration of principles the convention will adjourn and the campaign be on.

Sounding the keynote of the campaign—"stand by the president and the national administration"—Representative Fess outlined the republican platform and the republican national administration under President Harding, himself an Ohioan.

Referring to the national budget system inaugurated by the present administration, he declared that "the day of the pork barrel legislation is forever gone."

Senator Willis told the convention that something more than a mere state contest was at stake in the impending campaign. "We must back up the president and the national administration," he said.

After declaring that the eyes of the nation are watching Ohio and that the outcome of the state election in Ohio in November will directly decided effect on the next national convention two years hence.

WILSON AND COX CHEERED

Reduction of Taxes Is Made Issue
by Democrats in Ohio.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—The records of the republican administration both in national and state affairs and the reduction of taxes in Ohio were set forth by democrats in their state convention here today as the main issues of the coming political campaign.

The platform, adopted speedily and without amendment, touched upon other issues, but dwelt in the main upon alleged mismanagement of both state and national affairs by republicans.

The appearance at the convention of Senator Alice Pomeroy, candidate for reelection, and of A. V. Doney, the party's standard bearer on the state ticket, was the signal for vociferous cheers by the audience. Mention of the names of Woodrow Wilson and James M. Cox also brought enthusiastic demonstrations and that for Mr. Wilson was particularly pronounced.

Beyond reaffirmation of the national platform of 1920, the state platform today did not mention the issue of prohibition, although prohibition enforcement among the subjects directly discussed. The Newberry fight in the senate also was ignored excepting for brief mention. One plank provided for "proper recognition" of the services of veterans of the world war by the national government.

Charges against the republicans, both at Washington and Columbus, included statements that "they have been utterly unable to grapple with the problems of government," and that "they failed in their obligations and pledges by a policy of vacillation, ineffectiveness and even lack of sincerity."

HEALER OF HEARTS FINED

WOMAN DISILLUSIONED BY

Victim Turns on High Priest
After Paying \$2500; Lone-

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—Mrs. James E. Cartwright, wife of an associate justice of the supreme court of Illinois, in police court today told how she paid \$2500 to "Dr." Albert J. Moore, "healer of hearts and souls," and high priest of the Life Institute, for lessons in raising the dead.

advertising of a religious nature. Mrs. Cartwright was preceded on the stand by W. W. Talcott, Talcott's wife, who now lives without him, is a disciple of Moore's institute. To Talcott, also, Moore boasted of his power to heal the sick and raise the dead, the witness said.

The court room was filled with women, followers of Moore who are loyal to the "home healer." The first reference to Moore's assertion of supernatural powers brought applause from them. They clapped until the judge threatened them with expulsion.

When Mrs. Cartwright was called to the stand she identified checks totaling \$2500 made out by her to Moore. She was asked if her home needed any heating.

"I rather guess it did," she replied, "when my husband found out that I had paid \$2500 to that man."

She said that Moore once treated a woman in Oregon ill, for cancer. When asked if Moore cured, she said: "He said he cured her, but I notice that she had to bury her."

"Dr." Moore was fined \$100 and costs. After the fine was assessed he told his disciples that he would hold services as usual. City Prosecutor Piquett threatened that he would close all meetings at the "institute" and intimated that he would ask the police to raid the place if the followers congregated there.

KLAN WITNESS ON STAND

SON OF SLAIN CONSTABLE
TESTIFIES FOR DEFENSE.

Raiders Declared Accompanied
for Evidence Against Sus-
pected Bootleggers.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—The son of a slain constable testified today in court that he was accompanied by a group of men, known as the Klu Klux Klan, on a raid on a bootlegger's place in April 22 last, was a witness today in behalf of himself and 34 other alleged members of the Klu Klux Klan, on trial on felony charges growing out of the raid.

Mosher said he did not see the man who he said was shooting at him but saw a young man standing in the road astride a motorcycle, holding his hands in the air. This, he discovered upon approaching, was Clyde Vanalla, who drove Deputy Marshal Frank T. Woerner to the scene of the raid. Woerner, Mosher testified, had disappeared when he was arrested. Vanalla asserted that Vanalla recognized him and called him by name. Vanalla testified he did not recognize either Mosher or his father, but he had hands over their faces.

BOOTLEGGER GETS YEAR

Fine of \$500 Also Imposed on
Clackamas Heights Man.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Charlie Straight, Clackamas Heights moonshiner, today changed his plea to guilty and drew the heaviest sentence ever given for violation of the prohibition laws in Clackamas county. One year in the county jail and \$500 fine were imposed by Judge Noble in the justice court.

Straight was arrested at his ranch August 12 by Sheriff Wilson and his deputies, who were accompanied by three state officers. The state men had previously arrested Straight, who was convicted of the first offense in the federal court in Portland.

FIVE MEN ARE MISSING

FOUL PLAY IS SUSPECTED
AND POLICE ARE BUSY.

Requests From Anxious Relatives
Indicate None of Quintet
Has Left Any Trace.

Five men were reported as missing Tuesday to the Portland police, and in several instances relatives fear that the missing persons might have met with foul play.

Chester Davis left Portland Saturday night for Ridgefield, Wash., but had not arrived there by last night. Friends and relatives who reported his absence to the police said they could not account for his disappearance unless he had met with a serious accident. He is of sandy complexion, with reddish brown hair. He was wearing a dark blue serge suit with stripes. He was driving a Chevrolet bug.

Police were urged to conduct a search for W. M. Lee, who left the Carlton hotel at noon, Monday, expecting to be gone but a short time. He has not yet returned. He is 59 years old, of fair complexion, with gray hair and gray eyes. He weighs about 155 pounds. He is a native of Illinois and has been in the city since August 15, and no trace of him has been found. Relatives believe he may be in Portland, and a search is being made of the hospitals and other institutions in an effort to find some trace of him.

THREAT-MAKER CAUGHT

WRITER OF LETTERS IS BE-
LIEVED UNBALANCED.

Wife, Who Is Mother of Four-
Months-Old Baby, Tells Same
Weird Story of Persecution.

Nathan Garner, 36, whose threatening and obscene letters sent to Portland newspapers and others throughout the city have caused the police considerable concern for two weeks, was arrested Tuesday by Police Detectives Coleman and Colquhoun. Garner, who lives at the Raleigh building where Garner, a printer, had delivered some business cards for a client.

Garner's arrest, Mrs. Garner and her four-month-old baby were escorted to police headquarters. Examination of both Garner and his wife convinced Captain Harris and other police officials that both are mentally unbalanced.

Garner, who had turned over to the police, but insisted he was the victim of persecution which has extended from Denver to Portland. Examination of Mrs. Garner disclosed that she shared the same hallucinations as her husband. She told the same weird story of being followed by hirelings of the "art loquax."

The case revealed more of pathos than of criminality, according to the police. Since coming to Portland from a residence at Portland, Ore., a small hand press in their meagerly furnished room at 68 North Fourteenth street. They earned from 75 cents to \$1 a day with which they paid for their room rent and food.

Because Garner sent some of his threatening letters through the mails his case will be investigated by the federal authorities. Mrs. Garner was placed in charge of Miss Martha Randall of the women's protective division.

SCHOOL MEN TO MEET

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—The second session of the Clarke County School Directors' association which was organized last spring has been called for Saturday, September 26, and will be held in the courthouse here. The organization was formed to bring about more co-operation among the directors, eliminating expensive competition for teachers, doing away with unnecessary "frills" in education and cutting down expenses.

At the first meeting of the association Abe Miller, county commissioner, who is also a school director, was elected president and C. L. Hoover of Camas was chosen secretary.

Proposed changes in the present school laws will be taken up Saturday by the organization.

ROUND HOUSE BLOWN UP

BUILDINGS IN THREE-MILE
RADIUS ARE SHAKEN.

Men at Work Reported to Have
Escaped Injury in Tremendous Illinois Explosion.

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Aug. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—A tremendous explosion which shook buildings within a radius of three miles, occurred at the round house of the Chicago & Alton railroad at the south end of Venice, five miles north of here, shortly before midnight. Several sticks of dynamite were thrown on the roof, according to Yardmaster J. E. Redmond. About 12 men were at work in the round house.

Several policemen from Venice who hastened to the round house reported nobody had been injured. The employees had been severely shaken up by the force of the explosion. The detonation was so terrific that residents of Granite City, Mo., and Brooklyn, Mo., were thrown from their beds. A fire broke out in the round house, which is located.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Aug. 22.—Twelve bombs were exploded on Sixth street in the northwestern section of the residential district, here shortly before 10 o'clock tonight, terrifying scores of men, women and children, who rushed into the streets.

The bombs, police said, were wrapped in rags and thrown on the lawns of Santa Fe employees' homes. Shrieking fragments broke windows in several houses but, so far as could be learned, no one was injured.

The bombs were chemically timed, officers who found one before it exploded, said, and are similar to the 25 used in bombing the Santa Fe shops here two weeks ago.

Automobiles carrying officers armed with sawed-off shotguns patrolled the district where the bombs exploded.

CHILD-BEATER IS FINED

Mrs. Harry Hosford Found Guilty
of Abusing 2-Year-Old Girl.

Mrs. Harry Hosford, 85 Cook avenue, was fined \$10 Tuesday by Municipal Judge Rossman after being found guilty of whipping Beverly Taylor, 2-year-old daughter of Mrs. J. N. Taylor, Palace hotel.

Mr. and Mrs. Taylor took their child to the Hosford home to board and when the child was several days later to visit the girl he noticed her body was discolored. He at once suspected the child had been beaten.

The matter was reported to Mrs. F. W. Swanton and Ross Churchill of the humane society, who investigated and found the child in the hands of Mrs. Hosford. She denied whipping the child when the case came up for trial in police court. She filed notice of appeal to the circuit court after Judge Ekwall had found her guilty.

FARMER'S IRE STIRRED

Anlauf Man Appeals to Highway
Body to Curb Autoists.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—B. P. Flynn, a resident of Anlauf, Douglas county, today appealed to the state highway department for protection against automobile drivers. Flynn said in a letter to the highway department officials that the drivers hit the high spots while passing his ranch and already have killed one of his best steers, several pigs and a large number of turkeys.

The road on which he asks protection, Mr. Flynn said, is not a deeded road, but a road through his own property which is used as a public road. Mr. Flynn asks that the highway department install signs there regulating the speed of drivers below 15 miles an hour. If the highway department refuses to assist him he said he will take the responsibility of curbing reckless drivers on his own shoulders.

UNION SCHOOL VOTE TIED

One Canby District Will Settle
Fate of Entire Project.

CANBY, Or., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—One district of the 11 included in the proposed Canby union high school programme will decide next Saturday night, the fate of the entire project. The vote in the other districts, which were cast Monday leaves the matter tied and the delayed ballot in Marks Prairie district No. 38 either will establish the joint control plan or reject it.

At the election Monday, according to the returns made today, five districts favored the consolidation, four voted against it and one district tied. The issue, to carry, requires a majority vote in the territory as a whole and also a majority of the districts.

PLANE COMES TO GRIEF

BRIEF MESSAGE REPORTS
BRAZILIAN FLIGHT ENDED.

Lieutenant Hinton and Members
of Crew Are Picked Up Near
Windward Passage.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 22.—Lieutenant Hinton, pilot, and "the members of the crew" of the seaplane Sampaio Correia, which left Nassau in the Bahamas today for Haiti in its flight from New York to Brazil, were picked up by the U. S. S. Denver at 7 o'clock this evening in latitude 20 north, longitude 73:38 west, according to a wireless message to the naval communication service here tonight from the Quantico station. Those aboard the craft were understood to be included in the report that "the members of the crew" had been rescued. Upon a report being received from the cruiser Denver, it was added, a station tug was sent to assist in salvaging the seaplane. No other details were contained in the brief message received here.

According to the latitude and longitude it was said that the seaplane must have come to grief in or near the Windward Passage.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—Don Hogan, aviator of Denver, completed this morning a flight from Denver to Detroit today, arriving here early this afternoon.

IMPACT CRASHES SEABOAT
Message Says Hinton Did Not
Realize Nearness to Water.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Meager details of the wrecking of the seaplane Sampaio Correia were contained this morning in a message to the New York World from George T. Bye, one of its passengers. The hull of the boat, damaged when it was smashed when Lieutenant Hinton attempted a landing in the water from a height of 100 feet.

The five members of the crew clinging to the half submerged seaboat for half an hour before they were picked up by the U. S. S. Denver. None of the members of the party was hurt, according to Bye's message, with the exception of Lieutenant Hinton, who suffered a cut lip.

The landing was attempted in the dark at 8:30 o'clock and Hinton did not realize how close his plane was to the water when he began to descend. The force of the impact crushed the boat and the plane immediately began to sink. Lieutenant Hinton said he hoped to salvage the big seaboat, repair it and resume the trip to South America.

CARDBOARD COP PULLED

MAYOR TAKES HAND "IN
NAME OF LAW."

Manager of Blue Mouse Theater
Ordered Arrested for Viola-
tion of Ordinance.

Pasteboard placards cannot be put on the streets of Portland and the city council or a majority of that body give specific permission. And such permission will not be given by the present personnel of the council.

Mayor Baker Tuesday so informed Chief of Police Jenkins, as ordered the arrest of F. W. Teufel, manager of the Blue Mouse theater, for violation of the bill-posting ordinance.

The theatrical manager is charged with having caused pasteboard policemen to be posted on

downtown street corners to advertise a motion picture attraction.

It developed that permission for the posting of the cutout pasteboard had been granted by the public works department, but Mayor Baker held that single commissioner or the mayor had any right to grant such permission.

"I called in Chief Jenkins and told him that as a police officer he recognized nothing but an order from the city council on a matter of this kind," said Mayor Baker. "We have laws governing advertising on city streets and no official can set aside such laws. When another motion picture theater put out street signs we promptly pulled them down, and

there is no reason why we should give fish to one and fowl to another."
