

SOUTHERN IRELAND AWAITS NEW CHIEF

Five Men Are Mentioned as
Successors to Collins.

DUBLIN MOURNS LEADER

Body of Dead Free State Head
Lies in State in City Hall
Awaiting Burial Sunday.

DUBLIN, Aug. 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—Dublin began to recover somewhat today from the shock caused by the dramatic death of Michael Collins and plans went forward for the meeting of the new southern parliament next Saturday, when the ministerial changes necessitated by the sudden removal of Collins and Arthur Griffith, are expected to be made.

Meanwhile, William T. Cosgrave is acting as the head of the provisional free state government, and Richard Mulcahy, as chief of staff, is directing the final phase of the national army's campaign against the irregulars.

Five Successors Named.

The absorbing question of who is going to succeed Collins is voiced on all sides, and besides Cosgrave and Mulcahy, the names of Kevin O'Higgins, minister of economic affairs; General O'Connell, assistant chief of staff, and General Gerard O'Sullivan, are prominently mentioned.

Twice today the body of General Collins was carried through the streets of Dublin, which were lined with sorrowing spectators. Early in the day, in an impressive procession, the body was taken from the steamer *Classic* and transported on a gun carriage to St. Vincent's hospital. This evening it was removed to the city hall, where it will lie in state until Sunday.

Dignitaries Follow Coffin.

Military and civil guards, ministers of the government, members of the Dail Eireann and many clergy, among them three bishops, followed the coffin, which was covered with the Irish tri-color, while in the mourning carriages were the brother, sister and other relatives.

Irish pipers played a lament, while officers of the Dublin brigade acted as pallbearers. Dense crowds had gathered hours before the appointed time and on all sides poignant grief was displayed as the cortege passed. The Dail Eireann guards formed an escort, while guards reversed and a vast procession of bare-headed men and women followed.

The coffin was placed on the same catafalque on which had rested the body of Arthur Griffith.

Collins, Still, Still Lives.

The Irish Independent, commenting on Collins' death, says: "He could have been relied upon to fill the gap created by the death of Griffith. Both now have gone—two of the ablest leaders Ireland ever had."

"In the words of the government statement—'Collins has been slain but cannot die.' His work and worth, if not perhaps adequately recognized by all Irishmen today, will be appreciated by generations yet unborn."

HALES REPUTATES AMBUSH

Anti-Treaty Leader Offers to Join Government Forces.

CORK, Aug. 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—Tom Hales, who led and accepted the responsibility for the ambush which killed Michael Collins, repudiated it today, threw down his arms and offered to join the national forces.

Hales is the brother of Sean Hales, a pro-treaty member of the Dail Eireann. The former has been a fierce opponent of the treaty, and it is not known whether he offers to join the national forces.

He and his sister, on last St. Patrick's day, set fire to the platform at Bandon where a demonstration in favor of the treaty was being held under the auspices of his brother Sean and Canon Cahalan, parish priest of Bandon.

His present change of front is regarded as significant and as giving point to the prevailing belief that the death of Michael Collins may not have been in vain, as his action may animate his comrades to do likewise.

Sean Collins, proceeding from Clonakilly yesterday to attend his brother's funeral, had a trying experience. He was arrested on the Bandon-Macroom road by irregulars, who taunted him with lacking the courage "to stand up and be plugged," and spoke jubilantly of having "plugged McKee, the traitor," referring to his brother Michael.

Sean Collins remained in custody overnight but was released this morning, reaching home this evening. He left by special train for Dublin with General Ennis and Sean Hales.

ELECTRIC MEN GATHER

Problem of Standardized Policy on Extensions Discussed.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 24.—(Special.)—That there has always existed discrimination between electric companies regarding electric line extensions in the state, was the consensus of opinion of the representatives of 23 electric companies who have been meeting with Supervisor of Utilities Cleveland during the last two days in an effort to establish uniform regulations covering this phase of company work.

Each company has its own policy in line extensions, it was said, and there have been many complaints and much trouble in adjusting individual cases. During the past three years, the companies have been trying to standardize the rules. A conference was held in the spring, of which this hearing was an outgrowth. Eighty-six electric companies in the state will be affected.

County Accepts New Bridge.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 24.—(Special.)—A new bridge constructed by Lewis county over the Chehalis river at Klaskan was accepted formally yesterday afternoon by the county commissioners. The work of filling the approach was completed in the morning. The bridge has a 150-foot steel span and replaces a structure condemned last spring as unsafe.

"LIFE INSTITUTE" RAIDED

MAN SEEMS TO SAVE WIFE FROM "LOVE HEALING."

Husband of Another Woman Held in Meshes of Chicago Cult Sues to Annul Marriage.

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.—Deputy sheriffs raided the "Life Institute" conducted by "Dr." A. J. Moore, founder of the "love healing" cult, and seized Mrs. Shirley P. Talcott, one of the leading disciples. This procedure was the final attempt of "Dr." Talcott to break what he called a "spell" that has been cast over his wife by Moore. Talcott said he was not only anxious to save his wife from the "non-resistance" teachings, but that he took action to protect his 15-year-old daughter, who had been taken to the "temple" sent to the convention for junior vice-commander, J. LADY RHONDA HERE INCOGNITO FOR REST

British Peeress Rejected by Lords Not Defeated.

FIGHT WILL CONTINUE

Englishwoman Who Controls Vast Mining and Industrial Interests Praises American Sisters.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—At last a visiting celebrity—a political lioness at that—has succeeded in slipping into this country unharmed and almost unrecognized. Viscountess Rhonda, known the world over as the woman who assailed the inviolate portals of the house of lords and found them shut in her face, took up the question of keeping her name of the passenger list of the Adriatic.

She stayed one night at the Plaza hotel, then made off for Connecticut. She is here for one reason, she says—to rest. The middle of September she will return to Britain, controlling her great interests and helping along the woman's cause.

Survives Lusitania Tragedy.

Viscountess Rhonda, a peeress in her own right, has other claims to fame than her near victory in the house of lords. She is the foremost business woman in the British empire, controlling in the British empire industrial interests of her father, Viscount Rhonda, the late food controller. When he visited the United States in 1916 she assumed the directorship of his shipping and coal interests. In the previous year she herself was here, returning on the Lusitania. When it was torpedoed she was unable (or unwilling) to enter a boat and as she was swept off the starboard deck by the waves which were beginning to break over the sinking liner she managed to grasp a small packing case, to which she clung until she was picked up unconscious. This is her second visit to this country since the war ended.

Femininity In Present.

Early in 1918 she was made president of the Women's Industrial league, formed for the purpose of considering the position of women in industry. Later in the year she was appointed chief controller of women's recruiting for the army.

With 4 all Viscountess Rhonda has preserved a fine glow of femininity. Known as the "busiest woman in Britain," she manages to look soft and fluffy with her deep blue eyes, creamy skin, wavy hair and an English blush that comes and goes with the rise of her enthusiasm and her recession. Her words and gestures are concerned with sentences jipped and decisive.

In spite of her defeat she will try again to get into the house of lords. She wants to win the privilege not so much for herself as to establish a precedent for the 21 other peeresses who then might lay claim to seats. Among them are a duchess, two countesses, two viscountesses and numerous baronesses. Viscountess Rhonda was a little worried for fear to hold a peerage in her own right.

Party Affiliations Denied.

"I have none," she said. "I think that membership in a political party binds one and prevents freedom of action. We are bound to get into the house of lords sooner or later. It is a matter of principle, and it must be met as such."

Lord Birkenhead who turned the tide against her. He is a powerful man and close to the government. I am saying this quite frankly in England, so I do not mind saying it here. Viscountess Rhonda said she thought that women were given almost more power than they could cope with during the war. She described Lady Astor and Mrs. Thomas Winstanley, first women members of the house of commons, as "splendid."

Flight on Lords Not Ended.

Timely and zealous Viscountess Rhonda has made the assertion that she now regards it as her mission in life to get into the house of lords. She is the only child and heiress of the late food controller. His death would have made his vice-regal duties his, but he had no male heir, but by act of "special remainder" King George perpetuated it by creating his daughter, Margaret Haig Thomas, Viscountess Rhonda.

FISH PACK COMPLETED

For the river fishermen it was much better than the season of 1921. There is a double reason for this. The first is the elimination of the purse seine evil.

Purse Seiners Driven Out. In 1921 fully 50 per cent of the catch was made by the purse seine, operating off the mouth of the river. These craft were owned on Puget sound or in California and as such were not subject to any of the laws which govern the river. These craft were taken over by the state and the purse seiners were driven out.

Another factor that tended to make this season a more remunerative one for the workers was the high price for raw salmon which prevailed from the opening day. In consequence of these things the greater industry of the state has not only paid expenses with something left over, but many have even wiped out the indebtedness which they incurred last year.

The outstanding feature of the season was the almost unprecedented run of bluebacks, which entered the river about June 20, continuing for some time, the seiners and the gillnetters, who had small mesh gear, making enormous hauls. It is estimated that between 50,000 and 70,000 cases, "as they run," of this class of fish were put up. This run of bluebacks that helped out the season's canned pack.

Blueback Quality Good.

The bluebacks are a first-class fish and demand a good price, but they make up for the loss of the royal chinooks in certain markets. On account of the small catches of chinooks, but few one-pound cans were made. This year the canners cannot make deliveries of more than 20 per cent of their orders on that class of goods, while the deliveries of halibut and flat fish will be approximately 60 per cent of the orders on hand. About 75 per cent of the pack had to be of high-grade goods, showing that the quality of the fish taken during the season was excellent.

Big Early Catches Made.

The season opened on May 1 with a fair run of choice spring salmon in the river and during slightly over two weeks big catches were made, the returns in early May being by far the best for the season.

Women Working Together.

"We are constantly helping up your progress here before our women," she said. "I am told that you feel somewhat the same way about us. We are working together splendidly in England and we feel we are ready for equal rights. The best of the men are with us."

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AUSTRIA NOW ON BLOCK

AGED CHANCELLOR IN ROLE OF AUCTIONEER.

Catholic Bishop Touring European Capitals in Hope of Staving Off Winter Famine.

BERLIN, Aug. 24.—With scant possibilities of Austria getting a loan of any sort from America and with the downward crash of the kronen continuing, Chancellor Seipel, 65-year-old Catholic bishop, is still making a strong struggle to save the destiny of Austria's remaining 5,000,000 people. He was due in Berlin Tuesday on a tour of Europe, which, it is believed here, has the object of offering Austria on the auction block to the bidder offering the best possibility for staving off the winter famine.

The Tribune learns that Chancellor Seipel is seeking Herr Stinnes to renew his request for a loan from the industrialist. Failing this, it is understood, he will see Chancellor Wirth, advancing him the widespread Austrian hope that Germany might persist in Austrian amalgamation. The project, however, is extremely doubtful, as Germany does not want to add the burden of Austria's debt to her already chaotic finances.
