

AMUNDSEN DELAYS FLIGHT OVER POLE

Season Too Far Advanced
to Permit Success.

HOP-OFF IN SPRING PLAN

Exploration Ship Maud Frozen
In Near Wrangell Island,
Says Radio Report.

NOME, Alaska, Aug. 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—(Delayed.)—Captain Roald Amundsen, Norwegian explorer, has definitely abandoned for this year his plan for an airplane flight from northern Alaska across the north pole to Spitzbergen or Greenland, but plans to hop off next spring, it became known today with the arrival here of the coastguard cutter Bear from Point Barrow.

Captain Amundsen told the correspondent of the Associated Press, who joined the Bear at Point Barrow, that the start had been delayed by unfavorable ice conditions, and that the season was too far advanced to permit chances for success. Ice conditions, he said, militated against the chances of a successful landing at either Spitzbergen or Greenland.

Plane Is Lander.
Captain Amundsen landed his plane and equipment at Wainwright, 100 miles southwest of Point Barrow, and will make that point the base for his flight.

Radio advices from Captain Amundsen's exploration ship Maud indicated that the vessel is frozen in the ice near Wrangell Island, off the northeastern Siberian coast, and not off Point Hope, Alaska, as was previously reported. This fits in with the plans of the explorer, who expected the ship to start somewhere near Wrangell Island, the long drift with the Arctic ice pack across the north polar basin. Extensive research will be made by the scientists aboard the Maud, with particular emphasis on the study of ocean and air currents and meteorological conditions at the "top of the world." The explorer expects to return to Nome by airplane sometime next year after the completion of his transpolar flight.

Ice Conditions Bad.
Ice conditions in the Arctic off the northern Alaska coast are the worst in many years. Captain Cochran of the Bear guided his vessel for miles through tremendous ice floes, reaching Point Barrow with the greatest difficulty. Passengers for the Bear were finally transferred to the ship by dog sled after several attempts had failed. The trading schooner Merman was caught in the ice near Point Barrow August 22 and narrowly escaped being crushed between the huge floes. A shift of the wind saved the vessel and she reached Point Barrow safely.

IDAHO AUTOIST IS SUED

Lewiston Man Refuses to Convey
Injured Woman to Hospital.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—Actions were filed in the circuit court this afternoon by William W. Johnson of this city against F. S. Randall of Lewiston, Idaho, to recover \$200 for personal injuries sustained by Mrs. Johnson and \$225 for damage to a machine resulting from an automobile accident last night. As Mr. Johnson, his wife and little niece, Gladys Strow, came down the Columbia river highway this side of Clatskanie last night, their automobile was crowded off the pavement by another machine which passed them. The Johnson car was overturned. Mrs. Johnson's right arm was broken in two places, but Mr. Johnson and the little girl escaped only minor bruises and cuts. The driver of the other car said he did not have time to convey Mrs. Johnson to Clatskanie, but after giving his license number and saying the insurance company would pay the damage, proceeded toward Astoria.

JAIL BREAK EXPLAINED

Theory Advanced That Convict
Escaped in Guise of Woman.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—William Viera, former inmate of McNeil prison, advanced the theory today that Frederick Henry DeLage, who escaped from the penitentiary last week, made his getaway in the garb of a woman. Viera states that DeLage was well known among prison acquaintances as a female impersonator and that it would have been an easy matter for him to have had clothes "planted" in the woods. Viera said DeLage was anxious to escape because he feared sentences would be imposed for other offenses at the termination of his two-year term.

PRUNE FESTIVAL DATED

Vancouver's Big Event to Be Held
October 19, 20 and 21.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—The Prune Harvest Festival will be held October 19, 20 and 21. The committee to have general charge was completed today by the appointment of Dr. J. T. Allen, Fred W. Brooker and J. W. Shaw, to act with Lewis Shattuck and Dr. A. C. Wagner. It was decided to hold the festival after the harvest feature is over.

C. C. Hutchins, secretary of the Vancouver chamber of commerce, was appointed director of publicity for the festival. He outlined his plans at the weekly meeting at noon today.

RENT SCHEME DEVISED

Hoquiam Chief of Police Acts to
Protect Loggers.

HOQUIAM, Wash., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—A plan whereby room rent which loggers pay while in Hoquiam and which it is claimed has been exorbitant, may be lowered, has been devised by Chief of Police Thompson. Each rooming house and hotel in Hoquiam will be canvassed by officials of the police department and a list of room charges obtained. This list will be placed, easy of access, at the police station, and when any dispute arises the loggers can report their claims. A duplicate list of room charges also will be sent to the camps.

FOUR STATES AND BRITISH

About 150 Present at Opening
Session of Northwest Association at Olympia.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—Approximately 150 library workers from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia were registered before the close of the first session of the annual conference of the Pacific Northwest Library association here this afternoon. Addresses of welcome and responses, reports of officers and committees and round-table group discussions occupied the afternoon. Mrs. Josephine Cortis, Preston, state superintendent of public instruction of Washington, addressed the convention tonight on "The Library's Part in the State Educational Scheme." The feature of the convention will be at the Thursday afternoon session when Professor Edmund S. Meany, of the University of Washington, will give a talk on the history of Olympia and vicinity, following which delegates will be taken in automobiles to visit the scenes referred to by Professor Meany.

GENERAL GRANT'S DAUGHTER IS DEAD

Mrs. Franklin Hatch Jones
Passes at Chicago.

DEATH NOT UNEXPECTED

One of Nation's Popular Heroines
Lived in Log Cabin Before
Going to White House.

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—Mrs. Franklin Hatch Jones, only daughter of General U. S. Grant, one of the country's "White House brides" and one of the nation's popular heroines of the century, died at her home here today. Death was due to paralysis, which made her an invalid several years ago.

Burial will be at Springfield, Ill.

Niece Is Princess.
Mrs. Jones, who was affectionately known throughout the land as "Nellie Grant," is survived by her husband, a Chicago banker and former assistant postmaster general in the Cleveland administration; two brothers, Ulysses S. Grant Jr., of California, and Jesse R. Grant of New York; two children by a former marriage, Algernon and Vivian Sartoris and several nieces, among them the Princess Cantacuzene.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at the Chicago home, with Dr. James McClure of the McCormick Theological seminary officiating. Burial will be at Springfield, her husband's old home.

Death was not unexpected, as for two weeks Mrs. Jones had been lying rapidly as the attack of paralysis from which she suffered extended to her brain. For several days she had been too weak to be moved.

Nellie Grant Born in 1833.

Nellie Grant was born on July 4, 1833, at Wintonich, the estate of Colonel Dent, her grandfather. Nellie Grant, who afterward lived in the White House and became the mistress of a mansion on Chicago's Lake Shore drive, for two years as a child lived in a log cabin built by General Grant, her father. The Dent estate, where she was born, was located near St. Louis, Mo.

In 1874 Nellie Grant was married to Algernon Sartoris, son of a prominent English family, and went with her husband to live in England. There were three children, one of whom, Rosemary, is dead. After the death of Mr. Sartoris the widow turned to the United States and lived with her mother in Washington, D. C.

Widow In Made Citizen.

Shortly thereafter, by a special act of congress, Nellie Grant was made a citizen of the United States, since by her marriage to a British subject her American citizenship had been forfeited.

She was married to Frank Hatch Jones, Chicago lawyer and banker July 4, 1912. Mr. Jones formerly was secretary of the Continental and Commercial National bank of Chicago.

Three months after her marriage Mrs. Jones was attacked by illness. Throughout the years her invalidism had prevented her taking an active part in social or other affairs.

The wedding of Nellie Grant and Algernon Sartoris took place in the White House in Washington in 1874 and the event aroused tremendous interest on both sides of the Atlantic.

Nellie was only 13 years old when her father went to the White House where she spent the remainder of her girlhood and shared national popularity with her soldier father.

EX-ARMY CHIEF IN WEST

General Hugh L. Scott Addresses
Pendleton Rotarians.

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—General Hugh L. Scott, former chief of staff of the United States army, spoke before the Pendleton Rotary club today on his western experiences, dating from the time he was with Custer's old regiment. General Scott, although on the retired list, is a member of the Indian commission and is visiting the Umatilla Indian agency as part of his work.

The melon was grown without irrigation and Mr. Huot says that his September melons will attain a much larger size and weigh in the vicinity of 60 pounds.

He was an employee of the Grays Harbor Stevedore company and had been a resident of the city 12 years. He is survived by a widow and three small children.
