

## HERRIN RIOT CASE ARRESTS STARTED

Otis Clark Held on Charge  
of Murder.

### INTERVIEW IS REFUSED

Defendant Gets Advance Infor-  
mation of Action Taken  
by Grand Jury.

MARION, Ill., Aug. 31.—(By the Associated Press.)—In the same narrow cell in which Settimio Desantis, who precipitated the riots at West Frankfort several years ago, spent the waning days of his life before ascending the gallows sat tonight Otis Clark, the first man indicted by the grand jury investigating the Herrin riots, which took place here, Aug. 27.

Clark was taken into custody today afternoon. The cell is an ordinary jail compartment usually occupied by women prisoners.

With an open magazine on his knees, the prisoner sat preoccupied, his thoughts wandering off to Greenville, not far from here, where he had to leave behind his family, a wife and five little children.

The prisoner is charged with having slain C. K. McDowell, cripple, superintendent of the Lester strip mine, near which the massacre occurred.

"Desantis was hanged because he killed two innocent boys—at least that was the verdict of the executioners of justice—but I am not guilty," Clark said.

Interview Is Refused.

An attempt was made to interview him this afternoon by a representative of the Associated Press, but he refused to discuss his arrest.

Clark appeared to be well educated. For some time he has been president of the local coal miners' organization at Weaver, Ill., and check weighman at the Old Ben Coal company's mine No. 1. He spends the off mining season farming at Greenville. He is the father of five children and is about 35 years old.

The sale of a mowing machine and some farm implements at low prices was what caused county officials to become suspicious that Clark contemplated leaving this vicinity, and as a result the indictment against him was hastened.

Defendant Told of Indictment.

A leak which State Attorney Duty declared gave Otis Clark advance information on his indictment has been discovered and stopped "for once and for all."

"I trust the grand jurors implicitly," Mr. Duty asserted. "The leak did not originate with them. The information was broadcast by the underground method after the jurors reported in open court."

Late today Judge Hartwell announced that W. A. Kerr, counsel for the Illinois mine workers, had filed a petition for the release of Clark on bail. The date for hearing will be agreed on between Attorney-General Brundage of Illinois and State's Attorney Duty, Judge Hartwell explained.

### SINGER IS THREATENED

Marriage Failures 1 to 9.

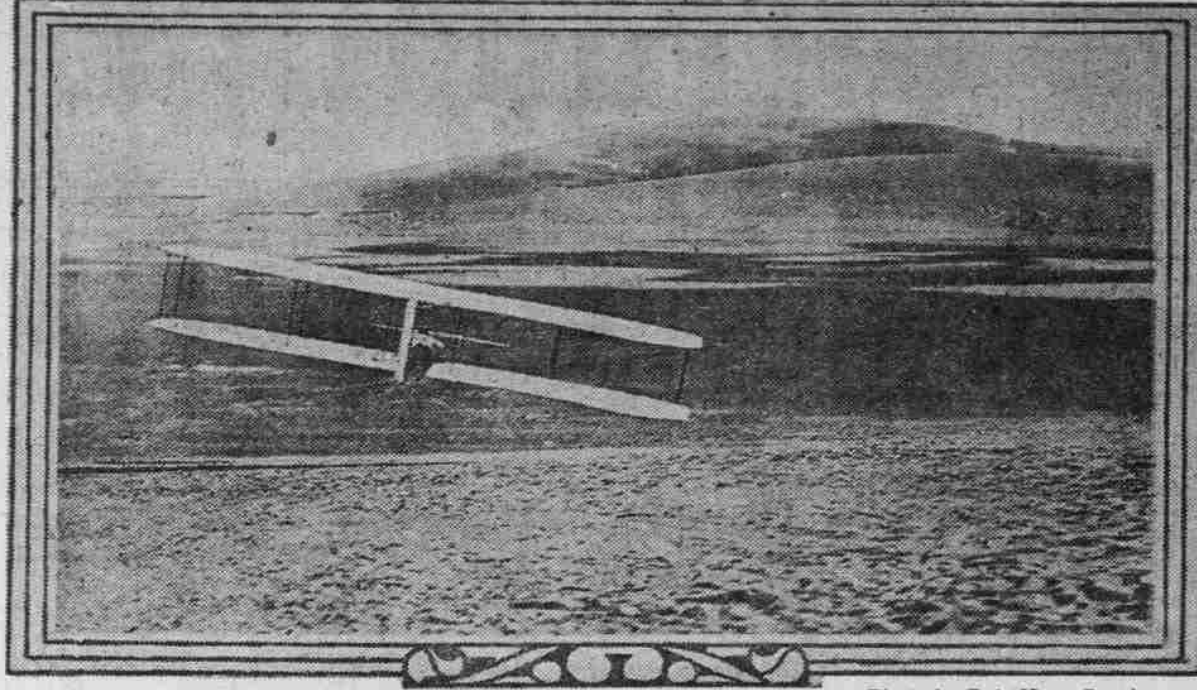

## GLIDING EXPERIMENTS EXTRAORDINARILY SUCCESSFUL.



OCTAVE CHANUTE'S GLIDER IN FLIGHT.

The extraordinary success of the German gliders in their recent tests, one of them remaining in the air more than three hours in a simple gliding plane, makes timely this picture of Octave Chanute and his gliding experiments on the shore of Lake Michigan 20 years ago. For these were the beginnings of flight. Credit for the invention of the flying machine should be divided between the Wright brothers and Mr. Chanute. The initial gliding experiments of which there is a record were made by Lillenthal of Germany. If he had lived no doubt he would have solved the problem of flight, just as the German technology students now seem likely to solve the problem of soaring without power. But Lillenthal was killed while gliding. Chanute, a Chicago engineer, took up Lillenthal's experiments and made many glides. When he felt that he was growing too old to continue the work personally, he turned over all his records and machines to the two Wrights. They followed up his work under his observation and eventually solved the problem of flight by working out the warping of the wings of the aeroplane.

## GREEKS ATTEMPT RALLY

COUNTER ATTACKS MADE ON  
ADVANCING TURKS.

General Offensive Also Reported  
Under Consideration by  
Retiring Forces.

SMYRNA, Aug. 31.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Greek army in Asia Minor, which has been falling back before the Turkish nationalist advance along a wide front, was understood this morning to be attempting local counter attacks, following the arrival of reinforcements.

The counter drives were soon to be followed by a general counter offensive by the Greeks, the advice reported.

The civilian Greeks and Armenians in the invaded district are following the Greek army, fearing a massacre.

WHAT CONGRESS DID AS ITS DAY'S WORK.

Senate.

Passed soldiers' compensation bill by a vote of 47 to 22. Made the Borah coal commission measure the unfinished business and debated it until adjournment.

Hitchcock, democrat, Nebraska, urged government to request the withdrawal of black troops from Germany by France.

House.

Passed bill authorizing president to declare emergencies in coal situation and control distribution and priority orders through a federal fuel administration. May be set into effect January 1, 1924.

Military affairs committee considered bills to reduce the number of army officers to be cut off under existing law.

Floor Leader Mondell announced an amendment to send the bonus bill to conference.

here declare Athens is panic stricken as a result of the victorious advance by the Turkish nationalists in Asia Minor.

Mount Ushak, toward which the Greeks retreated after the loss of Afium Karahissar. A demand is being made for a change in the general command, the cry being for the restoration of General Papoulas and Doumanis.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 31.—(By the Associated Press.)—The first two communiques issued by the Turkish nationalists on the battle centering around Afium Karahissar have indicated that the fighting was extremely heavy. The Turks did not give the number of Greeks taken prisoner, but say they captured considerable booty.

The Kemalists, according to the communiques, were forced to break through a triple defense system of barbed wire, entanglements.

General Tricoupi, Greek commander, effected the evacuation of the city in a skillful manner. The Turkish cavalry pursued the Greeks toward Banaz, to the southwest, but the retreat was finally brought to a standstill by counter attacks.

The fall of Afium Karahissar, although a serious loss to the Greeks, does not involve the evacuation of Esiki Shehr.

CUBANS MUST ACT SOON

Ultimatum Delivered to Government by General Crowder.

HAYANA, Aug. 31.—The Zaya administration today faced a crisis following receipt of an ultimatum yesterday from Major General Enoch Crowder, representative of the United States, giving the government 10 days in which to act on the legislative programme submitted by him and approved by Secretary of State Hughes.

The programme called for the enactment of five laws providing for reforms in the government's accounting system, suspension in part of the civil service law, the clearing up of current indebtedness, judicial reform and the flotation of a foreign loan.

General Crowder has threatened to return to the United States and report to the state department unless there is some action.

\$25,000 BONDS TO STAND

Denver Court Refuses Concession to Alleged Swindlers.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 31.—District Judge C. J. Morley this afternoon denied a motion for reduction of bond entered by each of the defendants arrested here during last week's raid on an alleged million-dollar ring of confidence men. Judge Morley ordered each of the defendants held for \$25,000 bond, the amount originally fixed by the court.

F. R. Nicholson of Cleveland, O., who arrived here today in company with former Chief of Police Smith of Cleveland, has identified Jack Homer French, arrested here last week, as a member of a gang alleged to have swindled Nicholson out of \$120,000 at Miami, Fla. It was announced by Philip Van Cise, district attorney.

French was arrested during the roundup of alleged members of a ring of swindlers last week.

DALE CORNUTT FINDS WAY OUT OF MOUNTAINS AND SEARCH ENDS.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—Although Dale Cornutt came through safely after being lost two days in the coast range mountains and reached Marshfield last night by way of South Coos river, he and his friends failed to advise the officials who had been searching parties out looking for him, and Sheriff Ellingson did not learn of his arrival here until today at 1 o'clock.

Cornutt left for Roseburg this morning. He was without food for one day.

## TRIANGLE COMPLEX ONE

MORE ANGLES ADDED IN JERSEY MURDER CASE.

Wife of Slain Man Expresses Admiration for Slayer; Brother Involved in Affair.

HACKENSACK, N. J., Aug. 31.—More strange angles were added today in the triangle which brought John Bergen to death at the hands of George Cline, whose lawyer announced that the defense would be the "unwritten law." Charles Scullion, brother of Mrs. Cline, for intimacy with whom Bergen was killed, was arrested today and held without bail on a charge of murder.

Prosecutor Hart questioned Scullion after he had appeared in court, pleaded not guilty and been sent to jail to await further developments.

Hart said later that Scullion had given four different versions of certain incidents happening in the Cline home, Edgewater, N. J., last Friday night. His story, it is known, is being checked with that of Miss Alice Thornton, of whom Bergen was said to be fond. The prosecutor wants to find out if Scullion handed Cline the pistol with which Bergen was forced back into the Cline house after he had got as far as the porch before the shooting.

What Bergen's wife thinks of the case was shown today, when she appeared to obtain records proving that she had become Bergen's wife in 1916. The proof was supplied, at the date when December 7, Mrs. Bergen was asked by reporters if she would sue Cline for killing her husband.

"No," the widow replied, adding: "Mr. Cline is a man, and that is more than I could say for my late husband."

Hints that other persons in the Cline home, for not attempting to stop the shooting of Bergen, whether it was done in the course of a duel or whether Bergen had no chance for his life, would be considered accessories either before or after the fact, were given by the prosecutor today. It was intimated that there would be at least one more arrest in the case.

Hawaiian Race Prolific.

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—There is no evidence of racial suicide to be found in the 20 Hawaiian and part Hawaiian families thus far selected for settlement on Molokai in the effort being made to rehabilitate the Hawaiian race by placing it back upon the land. The 20 families selected for the first settlement have a total of 123 children.

Seattle Building Booms.

SEATTLE, Aug. 31.—Building permits issued in Seattle for the first eight months this year totaled \$13,151,115, an increase of 35 per cent over the figures for the first eight months of 1921, which were \$9,669,245.

FRUIT BUYERS ANGRY.

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—Fresh fruit is being shipped to the Pacific coast of the United States from foreign countries on the Pacific ocean, though such shipment is denied to the fruit men of Hawaii. This apparent discrimination, growing out of the federal quarantine imposed on fruit from Hawaii because of the Mediterranean pest fly, is angering the California fruit dealers, who want island products.
