FOSSIL SHARK TOOTH WEST'S BEAUTIES

RELIC DECLARED TO BE

Scientist Makes Interesting Discovery Where Road-Builders Cut Across Hill.

Porter, who is investigating fossil remains in this vicinity. The ancient relic was discovered on the southwestern slopwere exposed where road - builders have made a cut across the face of

The shark tooth has been classified by J. J. Crawford, Albany scientist, as belonging to a specimen of amna elegans. The rock in which ONE IS ASKED TO WED it was embedded when classified gives an idea of the age of the tooth. The Miocene period is de soribed by geologists as being in the time of the Cenozoic, or mammalian era and tertlary age, many million years ago when the present Willamette valley was not in existence and a sea covered this part of the globe.
