

PERSONAL LIBERTY ASSURED STRIKERS

Attorney-General Says Rail Injunction Has Bounds.

FREEDOM NOT IMPAIRED

Individual Rights of Labor to Be Respected by Government in Keeping Traffic Open.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—The injunction obtained in Chicago against striking shopmen by the government, Attorney-General Daugherty said today, will not be used to abridge personal liberty, nor will freedom of speech or the press be interfered with.

But, he added, "freedom of speech and freedom of press does not mean those mediums may be used to incite riots or murders."

The attorney-general declared that the injunction had not been obtained to force men to work nor was it a move to prevent strikes.

The statement of Mr. Daugherty, which was made to newspaper correspondents following earlier declarations by a White House spokesman after today's cabinet meeting that President Harding felt the injunction would not in any way endanger constitutional rights of the men on strike or of other citizens.

Traffic to Be Protected.

But, it was added, the Chicago injunction proceedings would be followed up with the determination of preventing interference with transportation.

Just how far the government would be obliged to go with prosecutions against individuals, the White House spokesman said, could only be determined by events. It was indicated that no activities in connection with the strike outside of court matters were now in progress.

Attorney-General Daugherty, in his statement, declared there would be no objection by the department of justice to meetings of union men to perform any of their functions "that do not interfere with interstate commerce or otherwise violate the law."

Personal Liberty Guaranteed.

"If anyone undertakes to abridge personal liberty," he added, "I will be as vigorous in upholding the people's rights as I am vigorous in opposing violence."

The attorney-general expressed the belief that the strike situation would "quiet down" this week and added: "I do not want to go any further in these proceedings than is necessary. I want to be reasonable about it, but not so reasonable as to let the government and the people be trampled upon."

The injunction, he added, "is sitting very comfortably," adding the department had received many congratulatory messages on it, including many from labor people.

Press Approval General.

The great majority of the press—about 90 per cent—that portion of the "respectable" press, Mr. Daugherty declared, approved the government's course. The press, he added, had performed "a very generous, heroic service to the American people."

Responding to a question, the attorney-general said he thought a court would construe advocacy of picketing as being in violation of Judge Wilkerson's temporary restraining order.

Reports to the department of justice today, he asserted, showed the situation over the country to be quiet, very comfortable.

Strike Methods Unchanged.

As the attorney-general discussed the situation, William H. Johnston, president of the International Association of Machinists, one of the seven striking rail unions, declared, in an address before a mass meeting of strikers here, that no change had been made in the methods of conducting the strike so far as his union was concerned.

Mr. Johnston characterized the Chicago injunction as "the big noise" and said he would "defy Attorney-General Daugherty or anyone else to interfere with me and my fellows meeting to discuss matters of mutual interest."

\$1000 LOOT OBTAINED

Home of F. H. Hilton Is Robbed of Jewelry and Silver.

Burglars looted the home of Frank H. Hilton, 441 Sixteenth street, late Monday and made away with jewelry, silverware and clothing valued at \$1000, according to a report made to the police detective bureau yesterday.

Mr. and Mrs. Hilton said they returned home shortly after 11 P. M. Monday night and found that their house had been ransacked from top to bottom. Articles of clothing, dishes and silverware not taken by the burglar were strewn about the floor, and practically every dresser drawer in the house had been emptied of its contents.

Entrance was gained by "jimmying" open a side window. Seven suits of clothing belonging to customers were stolen from the pressing parlors of John Noco & Co., 209 North Jersey street, some time Monday. It was reported to the police. The prowlers entered the shop by breaking open a rear door with a butcher's cleaver.

She did not have a hat when she left home, but wore a gingham house dress, new tan shoes, black silk stockings, orange scarf with white and orange border.

WOMAN HELD MURDERER

Evidence which he did not reveal but which he said was sufficient to connect the woman with the crime is in his possession, declared the sheriff.
