

WIDOW AND BABIES TO LEAVE COTTAGE

Mrs. Price Unable to Keep Up Home in Suburbs.

BENEFIT PLAN PUZZLE

Generosity of Public Bewilders Woman Whose Husband Was Killed by Indian.

The fresh muck of wheels in the yellow mud of the new road that is being cut from Multnomah station to the canary-colored cottage where Glenn Price's young widow lives bore mute testimony of the care that had carried the little group of mourners to Glenn Price's funeral yesterday morning and brought them home again to the sad little house.

From the station our car had wound along a bit of paved road and off along the yellow muddy trail in search of the house which a woman at the station called canary.

"You can't miss it," she had called after us, "it has yellow roses on the porch and a little girl is always playing out in front."

We found the house and the late roses glowing all gold against the small porch, but no little girl was out in front.

Widow Holding Girl.
She was sitting on her mother's lap on a big comfy couch drawn before a little fireplace, in whose yawning opening an artificial grate winked brazenly with a fine attempt at imitating a glowing log.

Ethel Belle is the name the girl wrote in the front of the big Bible when the little maid arrived three years ago last March, but Ethel Belle is not what they call her. When she was one day old her big soldier daddy arrived from his training quarters at Camp Stanley, in Texas, where he had started a journey to beat the storm. He gave one look at his lovely little daughter and promptly nicknamed her Pollywoggles.

The name has clung and she is still Pollywoggles. She was using all the baby blandishments at her command yesterday to coax a smile into the tragic face of her young mother.

Despite the pallor which masks her face and the shadows under her eyes, Mrs. Price is a beautiful young woman. Her face is beautiful and her great dark eyes probe and search and keep seeking. She is delicate in features and slender and her voice is low and well modulated. The black dress she was wearing she had made.

"I more than made the payments on my machine by sewing," she said, "I make all my clothes and all the clothes for the children. I loved to keep house for Glenn although I didn't get to see much of him. We would have celebrated our fifth wedding anniversary this week, September 7—why, that's Thursday."

Religious Beliefs Told.
Mrs. Price dropped her head into her hands and stared dry-eyed into the fire while Pollywoggles plucked at her mother's dress.

"Pollywoggles always has seen me with a smile," said the mother, "and I guess she can't get used to seeing me sad."

The child is old for her 3 baby years and she put her arms protectively about her mother's small black-clad figure, looking straight at the visitors. "I am going to be my mamma's daddy now," she announced, "and I told my mamma I won't ever go dead."

The child had been to see her dead father and her listening little ears have heard details of the tragedy which made her an orphan. She smoothes her mother with caresses and flings her long little body protectively between the twins and strangers.

"Some people have been to see me about adopting me," said the mother, "but I tell her nothing on earth can separate us. No one can have my babies. I have never worked save in my own home, but I'd do the most menial work in the world before I'll let anyone have them. I believe my husband's spirit would haunt me all my life if I wasn't a good mother to his babies. He absolutely adored his three babies."

Polly Father's Favorite.
"Polly was his favorite, but that's because she is the oldest. Father is like that I think. He called the boy Steamboat. He was the greatest hand for nicking. The boy's name is Glenn Henry Jr., but he won't pay any attention when we call him Junior—he's got so used to being called Steamboat. His twin we call Dorothy. I spell it different from Dorothy. They are such good boys."

She gazed lovingly at the two plump starry-eyed babies who sat ensconced in a clothes basket between

sinet beside the brave little fire-cooked "Mother's lamb," she cooed and Steamboat and Dorothy beat the air with clenched fists and gurgled joyously.

"Steamboat is the image of his daddy," said Steamboat's little mother. "If I am glad about anything in this terrible trouble I guess I'm glad that my boy looks like his father. I have his father's watch and two silver dollars they brought me that they found in his pockets, and a letter they found he had written and was going to mail. They all are spotted with his blood. Maybe folks will think I'm mad, but I'm not, and I'm going to keep those things exactly as they are."

Love Letters Preserved.

"I have every letter he ever wrote me. We were happy. Just a pair of kids, folks said. Glenn was 26 and I am just 21. I was married when I was 15 and while we had our share of troubles, no wife was ever better loved than I, and no children ever welcomed more honestly and loved more than ours."

Mrs. Price is a tragic figure of dry-eyed grief. She sits rigidly and calmly reviews the train of events that led up to her husband's murder and she smiles wanly when she looks at her little ones.

Her voice broke when she told of the kindness of Dr. Linville, prohibition director, and of various neighbors and friends and of the American Legion. She was overcome and could not talk of the plan sponsored by Jensen & Von Herberg and J. J. Parker to give a monster party for her at the Peoples next Tuesday night.

"I never heard of these gentlemen," she said, "and I think they must love little children and have sympathetic understanding of her wouldn't have thought of helping me. PRICE FUNERAL IS HELD

Slain Dry Agent Gets Military Honors at Services.

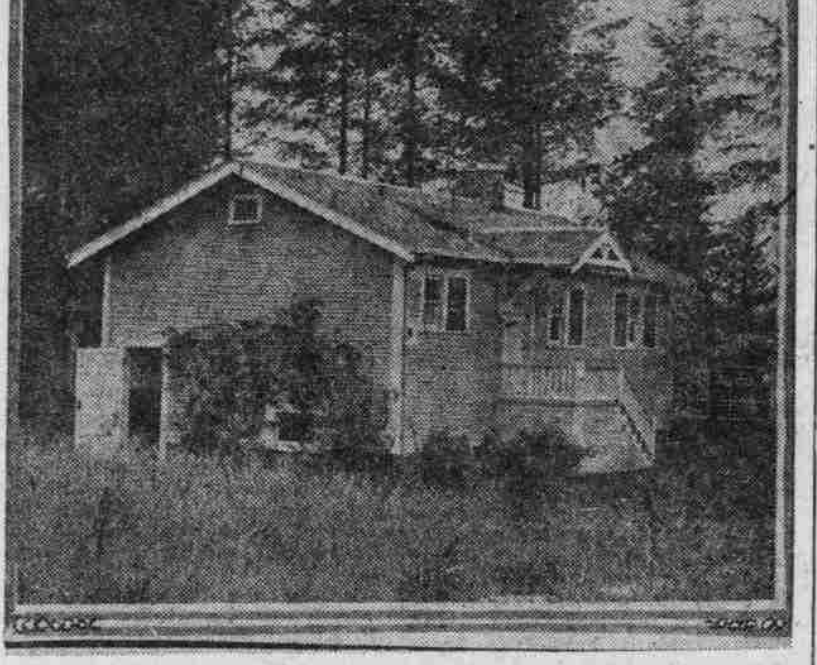
Funeral services for Glenn H. Price, federal prohibition agent, who was shot at New Grand Ronde, Ore., last Sunday by a drunken Indian, were held yesterday afternoon at the American Legion at the Portland crematorium. A firing squad and a bugler from Vancouver barracks were on hand to render final military honors.

Meanwhile contributions continued to flow into the fund for the relief of the widow and the three small children. The Portland Ad club at its weekly luncheon yesterday passed the hat and took up a collection of \$200 for Price's dependents. The Foster-Haynes company, maker of Dixie bread, has agreed to supply the family with bread for six months.

Thomas B. Kay of Salem, proprietor of the The Grand Kay mill, has forwarded a personal check of \$100 as a contribution to the fund. Municipal Judge Ekwall donated \$20 at a meeting of the American Legion Tuesday night. The Oregonian has received a personal check for \$5 from E. A. Smith of Oak Grove. Ernest Welsh, proprietor of the Portland crematorium, announced that he would make no charge for Price's funeral and that he would forward a deed for the repository where the dead man's ashes were placed.

A civil-service clerk at the custom-house, checking up on federal statutes, notified prohibition officials that under the federal customs act of 1915, as amended in 1919, Mrs. Price and her children are entitled to a pension of \$65 a month from the government. Although no Oregon employee ever has qualified for this pension, an attempt will be made to obtain it for Price's widow.

night appointed a committee composed of J. J. Crossley, commander; Glenn H. Price and Dr. J. S. Able to look after Mrs. Price's interests and to see that whatever funds are collected for the widow are properly administered.

Dr. J. A. Linville, national prohibition director for Oregon, has received a score of offers of assistance for the widow and her children. United States officials have decided that Philip Warren, the lawyer, can be more properly furnished by the state than the federal courts. Sheriff Orr of Dallas, who arrested Warren, has collected a mass of evidence. Warren will be tried at Dallas.

Two ex-service men will be appointed federal agents to take the places of the two men shot down by the bootlegger. Though prohibition officials and agents spent yesterday at the funeral of Todd and Price, they are back in the hills today in a renewed warfare on moonshiners and bootleggers. Special attention will be paid to the men who have been supplying the Grand Ronde Indians with whisky and those who are caught will face a term in a federal prison, as the act is a felony.

CAPTAIN TODD IS BURIED

Military Honors Given U. S. Dry Agent at Woodburn.

WOODBURN, Ore., Sept. 6.—(Special.)—The funeral of Captain Grover C. Todd, killed Sunday morning at New Grand Ronde while performing his duties as a federal prohibition officer, was held here this afternoon, services being held at the armory and attended by more than 800 persons. Active pallbearers were men who accompanied him to France as members of Company I of Woodburn. Ralph Brantner, Clyde Whitman, Warren Hicks, S. F. Scollard and George Hicks.

The honorary pallbearers were six captains in his old regiment. Accompanying the body from Hall's undertaking establishment to the armory were Company I of Silverton, headquarters company of Woodburn, the officers of the Grand Army of the Republic, Elks and Masons. Among the officers were Adjutant-General George A. White, General W. E. Finner, Colonel Dentler of the regular army, Colonel Hammond, Majors Brombaugh, Bowman, Sturffin, Lylesley, Captains Carruth and Alexander, Lieutenants Hedges, Killian and Laursen.

The Elks lodge of Salem, to which Captain Todd belonged, was well represented. Services at the armory were conducted by Lieutenant Colonel W. S. Gilbert of Astoria, chaplain of the Oregon regiment. Colonel Gilbert asked the community to look after the comfort of Captain Todd's family. There were two vocal selections by Mrs. Hallie Parrish Hinges of Salem. At the grave the Elks held their ritualistic services, a Company I squad fired a salute and taps were sounded.

SLAYER LOSES APPEAL

Wife Murderer's Request for Re-hearing Is Denied.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Sept. 6.—(Special.)—James E. Mahoney, convicted in Seattle and sentenced to the death penalty for the murder of his aged and wealthy wife, Kate Mahoney, was denied a rehearing before the supreme court en banc today. The full court joined in refusing to review the departmental decision rendered several months ago, affirming Mahoney's conviction before Judge J. T. Ronald of King county.

Mahoney's only recourse now to evade execution of the death sentence is an appeal to the United States supreme court.

LA FOLLETTE LEADS BY NEARLY 200,000

Entire State Slate Backed by Senator Nominated.

PILLAR OF DRYS LOSES

Primary Returns Indicate Weis Have Gained Two Seats in Lower House of Congress.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Robert M. La Follette of Madison, senior United States senator, has been swept into the republican nomination for lived states senator at the November election in this state by the greatest majority that any candidate ever polled at a primary in Wisconsin.

Returns received from more than four-fifths of the state early tonight showed him to be leading by 175,332 over W. A. Ganfield of Waukegan, president of Carroll college, his only opponent.

The vote from 2057 out of 2533 precincts in the state was: La Follette, 294,857; Ganfield, 116,524.

In piling up this majority Senator La Follette carried with him what was known as the entire La Follette slate, from United States senator down through to the attorney-general.

Dry Calculations Upset.

Governor Blaine, who headed the La Follette state ticket, likewise rolled up a remarkable vote and with 2051 precincts out of the 2533 reporting tonight has a plurality of 133,789 over his nearest opponent, William J. Morgan, attorney-general.

What appears to be the only real upset of the primary is the contest for representative in congress in the 11th district, where Adolphus P. Nelson, incumbent, rated as a dry and supported by the Anti-Saloon league, is running more than 4000 behind Hubert H. Peavey of Washburn, who was endorsed and assisted by the association opposed to prohibition. The returns from 252 out of 285 precincts in the 11th district gave Peavey 15,530, Nelson 16,277.

Weis Jubilant Over Result.

The La Follette supporters are not the only ones who are elated in Wisconsin tonight. Wet forces point with pride to the fact that they supported the entire La Follette ticket from the senator down and that they have gained two wet representatives in congress. These men are Peavey and George J. Schneider in the ninth district.

This latter race, however, is far from being over. Schneider and Henry Grassie having alternated in the lead all day for this nomination. The latest reports from 208 out of 243 precincts in the ninth district gave Schneider 15,973 and Grassie 15,254.

Mr. Schneider is a La Follette candidate, as was also Elmer S. Hall, the third man in the race. Hall likewise is rated as a wet and polled 10,026 votes in these 208 precincts.

TEXANS DODGE KLAN ISSUE

Democratic Convention Refuses to Denounce Ku Klux Klan.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Sept. 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—A decisive vote of 491 to 135 the Texas democratic state convention late today rejected minority reports openly denouncing the Ku Klux Klan and its activities. The convention went into an uproar when an attempt was made to discuss the anti-klan proposal and a motion to table the report followed immediately. An attempt to present resolutions to the convention from the floor opposing the klan in milder language than the minority report was unsuccessful and immediately following the adoption of the platform the majority report was adopted.

The platform adopted contains no declaration on the klan. The only provision in this direction language in favor of freedom of conscience and the separation of church and state. With the exception of minor changes the platform was adopted by the convention as approved this morning by the resolutions committee. Chief among the provisions of the document are: Declaration for a constitutional convention, declaration that the democratic party is a "white man's party" and opposition to the injunction.

CHANDLER LEADS IN NEVADA

Republican Race for Senator Is Close in Sage Brush State.

RENO, Nev., Sept. 6.—Additional figures early tonight in the four-cornered contest for the republican nomination for senator out of Silverton of Charles S. Chandler to 130 votes over his nearest opponent, Samuel S. Arntz. The figures at 7 o'clock Chandler 3098, Arntz 2948, Platt 2725, Buol 1578, and Adams-Williams 515.

James C. Scruggs, democrat, continues his lead of two to one over James T. Boyd for governor. John H. Miller is leading James Gault by a wide margin for the republican gubernatorial nomination.
