Sensational French Tennis Player Proved Right to Be Regarded as Most Wonderful Tennis Player of Sex.

Too much hard athletic competition is likely to strain the heart of any boy or girl. Our colleges are beginning to realize that it is a great mistake to begin hard training during the period of rapid physical growth.

Statistics prove that many boys who go through active competition in grammar and high schools have weak hearts and are not fit to continue in competition when they enter college.

No boy should be put through the severe strain of competitive athletics until he has become fully developed and has reached nearly his full height and growth.

Negro boys are making their mark in amateur athletics. At the national championships in Newark, Hart Hubbard, an 18-year-old negro boy from Cincinnati, student at the University of Michigan, won the championship in the running broad jump with the splendid leap of 24 feet 5 1/2 inches.
