NEW YORK, Oct. L-With New York's two clubs wearing the diand crowns for the second year in

mond crowns for the second year in succession—the first time in base-bali history that one city has held such a monopoly on permants—the American and National leagues today closed the 1923 campaigns, among the most keenly fought and nerve-racking in the annais of the same. The Giants and Yankees will renew their world's series rivalry in the opening game Wednesday. To the Yankees victory came by the narrowest of margins—a single game—and after a tonis, brilliantly played battle with the St. Louis club throughout the season. 
