WINBURN'S PAST DUG UP

BOURBON DECLARED KNOWN AS "MR. FIXIT."

Pierce Barker Said to Have Told About Adventures as Henchman for Tammany.

Jesse Winburn, "angel" of the Pierce campaign for governor, who acted as Santa Claus for the "non-partisan" dinner given for Pierce at Albany Wednesday night, was formerly known as "Mr. Fixit" in Tammany circles in New York city, it has been said.

"Mr. Winburn," said C. E. Ingalls, secretary of the republican state central committee, "has evidently forgotten that there are certain letters extant in Oregon in which he states over his own signature that he was connected for 25 years with the democratic political organization in New York city."

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According to Chairman Toole, Mr. Winburn told him the history of his life and said that he was connected with the Tammany organization for 25 years. He also entertained the state chairman by several weeks ago, which was addressed by Walter L. Toole Jr., republican state chairman, "Mr. Winburn was a guest and sat next to Mr. Toole."
