Long before the appointed hour of 7 o'clock the church was filled with a throng of fashionably dressed society folk.

Only on very rare occasions has it been the scene of a wedding, and last night when the doors were opened for the double nuptials, one of the principal society events of the season, the picture made a vivid impression on all of the guests.

Wedding Procession Held. Miss Katherine Seller led the wedding procession on the arm of her uncle, Philip Lowengart. They were followed by Miss Jane Seller, who was escorted by her father. At the steps before they approached the altar Miss Katherine Seller took the arm of her father, who gave both his daughters in marriage. Rabbi Jonah B. Wise performed the double ceremony.

The brides were beautiful indeed in their handsome white velvet gowns, which were very much alike. They were cut on long, graceful lines, elaborated with pearls and ribbons. Their veils were of tulle, adorned with gorgeous rose-point lace, which has been in the family for many years. Miss Katherine Seller's veil was attached to a becoming cap, which was charmingly adorned with orange blossoms. Miss Jane Seller's veil was worn with a fan-shaped coronet, which also was used with orange blossoms. Their flowers were shower bouquets or gardenias, white orchid and lilies of the valley.

New Today in the Markets NOW is the time to make sauerkraut. Large, solid heads of cabbage are offered in the markets at 2 cents a pound, which is probably as low as the price will get. Housewives - noted in the art of making sauerkraut know that fermentation takes place more promptly when the weather is warm than after it grows colder and therefore mend the present as the proper time.

Grapes are still plentiful in the market and the price remains practically unchanged. One new variety is being offered and is known as the Eton grape. It is an improved Concord, grown exclusively by one vineyard at Milwaukee. The fruit is larger and sweeter than the ordinary Concord. The variety is priced at 20 cents a pound, while the variety shipped from California is selling at 35 cents a pound. New green walnuts are coming into the markets in considerable quantity. This week will see the end of prunes for the season. Italian prunes are being offered at 4 cents a pound and petites, in small quantities, are 5 cents a pound. Blackberries are being shown in small quantities at 10 cents a box, and raspberries at 20 cents a box. Tillamook cheese went up 1 cent this week but retailers generally made no increase in their price, which is 40 cents a pound.

PORTLAND, Oct. 13.—Dear Miss Tingle: I am planning a birthday luncheon for my mother in the near future and am wondering if you will be so kind and help me out of my predicament. I am having 12 ladies, including my mother-in-law.

1. What is the proper way of seating them, including myself?

2. How should I serve the birthday cake?

YOU, as hostess, must sit at the head of the table and your mother-in-law, as guest of honor, at your right hand. As for the rest of the ladies, simply seat them around the table in any order that will bring the most congenial together as neighbors and will promote interesting conversation. 2. Serve the birthday cake as an accompaniment to ice cream or some other convenient light dessert, served in glasses. 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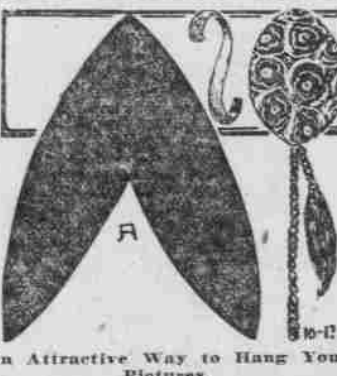

Things You'll Love to Make



An Attractive Way to Hang Your Pictures.

IT is often the small things that make a room look attractive and artistic. Picture books are far from attractive, yet they are usually necessary. Make covers for the books and instead of the ugly books you will have dainty, artistic ornaments. Cut pieces of buckram the shape shown (A). You will have to make it about twice the size of the pattern shown to cover the usual size book. Join the two inner curved edges with glue or by stitches. Then cover it with cretonne or silk that matches your hangings. Hang your pictures on wire covered with silk cord. Join a tassel of silk or wool to the top of each cord. Put over the book the cover you have made. It is nicest to hang each picture on two cords. FLORA. (Copyright, 1923, Public Ledger Co.)
