

SCHOOLS DROP OUT OF AMATEUR UNION

Cards No Longer Required of Football Players.

ACTION IS KEPT SECRET

Public League Directors Hold Star Sessions Before Deciding on Radical Action.

Portland public school athletes who violated the rules of the American Amateur Athletic union this summer by playing summer baseball with semi-pro or professional players, will be eligible to play scholastic football this season, despite the fact that they are professionals in the eyes of the Amateur Athletic union.

This was made possible when the Portland public school league directors, who are the principals of the high schools, met Wednesday night and voted, four to one, to withdraw from the jurisdiction of the American Amateur Athletic union, during the football season at least.

The resolution passed at this meeting, which was kept darkly secret until details leaked out yesterday, was somewhat to the following effect: "That amateur cards would not be required from football players this fall and that the Portland public school league directors would pass on the eligibility of players themselves and not leave it to A. D. Wakeman, northwest representative of the American Amateur Athletic union."

Actual Professionalism Barred.

This does not mean that actual professionals will be permitted to play on high school football teams. Any athlete against whom it is proved he has ever taken money for participation in baseball or any other form of sport is absolutely barred. But, on the other hand, the Portland Public School league will let athletes participate in high school football who have played summer baseball, and not leave it to A. D. Wakeman, northwest representative of the American Amateur Athletic union.

The American Amateur Athletic union takes a highly technical view of such matters. Even though it cannot be proved that an athlete took money, if he merely played in the lineup with players who did take money the Amateur Athletic union will not issue an amateur card.

High school football here first came under jurisdiction of the Amateur Athletic union last year. The original amateur semi-pros immediately resulting started during basketball season. Just before the opening of the football season, Wakeman, Amateur Athletic union district chairman here, ruled that Howard Hobson and Charles Thomas, Franklin high school basketball stars, were ineligible to play with the Franklin quintet because they had played what is termed "summer baseball."

Two Are Suspended.

Hobson has played at North Bend, Or., and Thomas with some other high school club. It was not proved that either of them took money outside of their expenses. In fact, they swore in affidavits that they had not. However, they were suspended for several days after the suspension of the league directors met and voted to place all high school athletes under the jurisdiction of the Amateur Athletic union. Previous to that basketball and track were the only sports in which high school athletes were required to hold amateur cards.

Several months ago the league directors again met. The question of when is a semi-pro not a professional, and so forth, came up again. It was hinted at the meeting that if the league directors met and voted to place all high school athletes under the jurisdiction of the Amateur Athletic union, the league would be liable to protest.

Hopkins Jenkins, principal of Jefferson high, also president of the High School League, who always has been a champion of clean amateur sports, came out flat-footed for the league and there to settle the question for good, and not to make fish of one and flesh of another. It was agreed that summer baseball, if constructed as virtually professionalism, a high school athlete, and that the Amateur Athletic union variation in individual cases would be accepted as they came up for ruling.

Other Schools Feel Pinch.

Not long after the meeting was developed that Benson Tech had a couple of promising young athletes who had participated in some kind of high school baseball and would be ineligible under the stringent ruling adopted. Also, it began to develop that several other of the schools had athletes who would be ineligible when it came down to brass tacks.

So last Monday night the Portland Public School League met again. Three Benson football players—Mason, right half; Bottler, right end; and Robinson, left end—had played summer baseball. They had not accepted any money, but it was said they had played on teams where players had accepted money. Then, again, there was Harold Serber of James John, mentioned as an all-star halfback last year. Serber played summer ball with Astoria. He swore he did not receive money outside of expenses.

There were other causes not specifically mentioned, but it was agreed that if the Amateur Athletic union rulings were to be accepted as handed down by A. D. Wakeman, all these players would be ineligible. After a session lasting several hours, the question of having the schools pass on the eligibility of their players themselves and not requiring amateur cards was put to a vote by the league directors.

According to reliable information three of the seven high school principals voted for taking the league out of the A. A. U. jurisdiction, two of them voted for keeping things as they were, and two did not vote.

High Boyd of Washington and T. T. Davis of Lincoln voted for the status quo. S. F. Ball of Franklin did not vote and Hopkins Jenkins of Jefferson, who is president, did not vote.

C. E. Cleveland of Benson Tech, W. T. Fletcher of James John and J. F. Elton of Commerce voted to take the eligibility ruling out of the hands of the Amateur Athletic union and for the schools to handle it themselves.

Second Meeting Held.

A second meeting was held Wednesday night. At this meeting it was understood that Mr. Cleveland, Mr. Fletcher, Mr. Elton and Mr. Boyd voted to take affairs out of Amateur Athletic union hands, while Mr. Davis of Lincoln still stood pat. Mr. Jenkins and Mr. Ball again did not vote. As president and chairman Mr. Jenkins did not have an opportunity to vote.

Harold Quigley, Jefferson football coach, said yesterday: "There are no professionals, semi-pros, or otherwise on the Jefferson football team. We have come clean from the start. Regardless of what action might have been taken, it would not have affected Jefferson."

Coach Craig of the Benson team said: "I cannot see where there is harm in a younger playing summer ball if he wants to, so long as he does not accept money for his services. Three of my boys would have been barred by the Amateur Athletic union ruling, yet I think they are as much amateurs as anyone else. It is unfair to the boys to bar them from playing ball if they wish to in summer. There surely can be no harm in it."

C. E. Cleveland, secretary of the Portland Public School league, was not very talkative, but said: "All we did was vote not to require amateur cards from the football players this fall. We shall pass on the eligibility of players ourselves."

So that's the situation. The Portland Public School League might still be under Amateur Athletic union jurisdiction and A. D. Wakeman could refuse cards to all the players in the league, yet they could prevent actual professionalism from creeping in, but so far as drawing such a strict line as the Amateur Athletic union and refusing to let boys play who have not accepted money, they will overlook that as a mere bagatelle.

Wild Pitching in Order.

Wild pitching seems to have become the order on the Portland and every recent game some pitcher has unfurled a basketful of walks and yesterday both of them did it. Kunz walked five and Crumpler seven. Some hurriers hardly give that many walks to a season, but they don't pitch in the Coast league, apparently.

SIKI AND MANAGER SPLIT

NEGRO BATTLES NOT LIKELY TO COME TO AMERICA.

FRENCH BOXING PROMOTERS MAKING OVERTURES TO DEMPSEY FOR BOUT IN DECEMBER.

PARIS, Oct. 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—French boxing promoters are maneuvering to bring Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, to a battle with Battling Siki, Senegalese conqueror of Georges Carpentier, in December.

In sporting circles it is reported that directors of the new Buffalo Velodrome, where Carpentier's eclipse occurred, have made overtures to Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager for such a contest.

Amounts varying between 1,000,000 and 1,500,000 francs have been mentioned as Dempsey's end of the purse. If the bout is arranged for December, it could be held in the open air.

Prospects for the departure to America of Siki now appear remote as the boxer is reported to be near the breaking point with his manager, M. Hellera, and to be intent upon avoiding whatever arrangements have been made.

The contract between Siki and Hellera will expire November 30, and it has become known that the former is not desirous of renewing it.

SIKI'S DECISION SURPRISE

Senegalese Booked for Fight in New York November 30.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Information from Paris that Battling Siki, who recently defeated Georges Carpentier and won the light heavyweight championship of the world, has decided not to come to the United States, caused a surprise in Metropolitan sporting circles.

Senegalese was booked for a bout November 30 at Madison Square Garden with an unnamed opponent.

Texted by the sports promoter who announced that he had closed negotiations with M. Hellera, Siki's manager, for the bout, could not be reached, but his partner, Frank Flournoy, expressed complete surprise. He said it seemed improbable to him that Siki would attempt to break an agreement made by Hellera.
