CHEHALIS, Wash., Oct. 12.—(Special)—William Murphy, alias Jack McDonald, is in the Lewis county jail, where he was placed last night by Deputy Sheriff Poyns and Hawkins following his arrest in Tacoma. Murphy is wanted in connection with the cracking of the safety deposit vaults of the Little Falls State bank at Vader, more than a year ago. Also Murphy is believed to have been implicated in the robbery of the Centerville, Or., bank.

Recently another member of the gang to which it is said Murphy belongs was arrested near Vancouver for complicity in the Vader robbery and is in jail here.
