

AMERICAN FORCES ALLIES INTO OPEN

Mudanica Censorship Swept
Away by Correspondent.

BRITISH TO RETALIATE

John Clayton of The Oregonian-
Tribune Service Is Threatened
With Arrest and Expulsion.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 11.—(Held for two days at Constantinople.)—Major Johnson, British intelligence officer in liaison with the press at British headquarters in Constantinople, today asked me to notify John Clayton, correspondent of the Tribune in Asia Minor, that he must report to the British military authorities and give a satisfactory explanation why he violated the decision of the allied generals that no journalist would be permitted at the Mudania conference with the Turks.

Otherwise, he said, Mr. Clayton would be arrested and expelled as an undesirable alien.

I asked Major Johnson why no action had been taken before, as Mr. Clayton made his way into Mudania despite the British blockade several days ago.

The military officer replied that he previously had not been aware that Mr. Clayton had been in Mudania.

Censorship Forced Aside.

Major Johnson, continuing, said Mr. Clayton's presence at the opening of the Mudania conference had compelled the allied generals to lift the censorship on the conference entirely and to permit all journalists to proceed to the conference afterward.

Mr. Clayton returned to Mudania before I could deliver the order of the British military authorities to him.

I am submitting the case to Rear Admiral Mark Bristol, representative of the United States in the near east.

Mr. Clayton's sensational trip through the center of the British blockade in the Black Sea, beginning Monday night, October 2, is one of the big journalistic feats since the great war. His account of the trip was printed in the great dailies of Europe and America.

British Attitude Dismaying.

The British announcement October 2, that all newspaper correspondents would be excluded from the Mudania conference, caused dismay throughout the civilized world. The newspapers of all countries protested against this sudden decision to abandon the open conference.

Mr. Clayton took the ferry across the Bosphorus, crossed a strip of land to the village of Kartal on the sea of Marmara. There he boldly announced his plan to the Turkish mayor of the town, who put him aboard a coasting vessel bound for Mudania. The captain of the vessel, however, proved to be a Greek in disguise, who tried to hand him over to Greek destroyers. Mr. Clayton and his interpreter, however, thwarted this scheme by seizing the captain, throwing his revolver into the sea and his interpreter into the water, and then fled to Mudania.

Destroyer Is Outwitted.

The Turkish mayor started Mr. Clayton out again on a power barge. A British destroyer hailed the barge half way to Mudania, but Mr. Clayton and his interpreter concealed themselves in the small cabin and the Turkish captain obtained clearance papers and landed his passengers shortly thereafter at the Mudania wharf in Turkish territory.

From there Mr. Clayton sent his scoop to the world.

SOVIET CHIEF LAUDS FEAT

Telichev Declares Clayton's Methods Are Americanism.

MOSCOW, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—In formal press reception today M. Telichev related with great gusto the news just received by the foreign office about an American correspondent smuggling through the British blockade and landing at Mudania.

"You American newspaper men deliver the goods. That is Americanism," he said. "Moreover, I know the correspondent. He is John Clayton of the Chicago Tribune."

Karl Radek, in the Pravda, declares "naphtha is the cause of the fighting in the Dardanelles question." He says that all motivated the near east affairs and repeated John Clayton's interview with Mustafa Kemal Pasha.

A headline in the newspaper Economic Life says, "Chicago Tribune's referendum shows Americans against canceling debts."

The statement by the minister of foreign affairs of Russia is remarkable for the reason that in 1920 Mr. Clayton spent several weeks in Russia and on his return to the outer world wrote a series of articles depicting the chaotic conditions in the realm of the soviets. For this he was denounced by the high officials of the soviet and forbidden to ever again enter Russia.

The Mudania experience is not the first time that Mr. Clayton has forced the powers of Europe to abandon their plans for dark covensants darkly arrived at. In October, 1919, he exposed the circle of bayonets which Gabrielle d'Annunzio, the soldier-poet and dictator, sought to keep the world out of Fiume. After completing his investigation in Fiume, Mr. Clayton was seized by a Croat and expelled.

His exposure of the actual conditions within the city eventually forced the Italians to abandon their plans for seizing the city from the Jugo-Slavs in defiance of open treaties.

Escaped Convicts Still Free.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Prison guards and dogs, late this afternoon, were still engaged in fruitless search for convicts, who last night scaled the penitentiary walls and escaped. DIABETES CURE IS FOUND

SUCCESS IS REPORTED AFTER
YEARS OF RESEARCH.

Serum Pronounced Absolute Remedy
for Disease—Successful
Experiments Conducted.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 13.—After years of investigation and research, in which time medical science was at a standstill to discover some remedy for the successful treatment of diabetes, physiologists at the University of Toronto, Canada, have prepared a serum which is pronounced an "absolute cure for the disease."

A small quantity of the serum was sent to the University of Pennsylvania a week ago for physicians to use experimentally on diabetic patients. Today after several injections had been administered to three cases, Dr. Alfred Stengel pronounced the experiments an unqualified success.

"I regard the serum as one of the big discoveries of the age in medical science," Dr. Stengel said. "So far as we have been able to discover, the results have been entirely satisfactory. After using it we have found a great improvement in the patients to whom it was administered."

Dr. Stengel was asked if he regarded the serum as still being in the experimental stage.

"No, I think it is an absolute cure for diabetes," he replied. "People must not imagine, however, that it is a cure-all for everything. For treatment of diabetes, a disease that has always baffled physicians, it is a great step forward. Undoubtedly in that way lies the future treatment of the disease."

FULL RATIFICATION AIM

Chile Wants No Amendments to
Ancon Treaty Protocol.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Oct. 13.—Only unqualified ratification of the Ancon treaty protocol by the senate will be regarded as acceptable of the agreement by the Chilean government, according to El Mercurio, which says this information comes from an authoritative source.

Any amendment or reservation will signify rejection, says the newspaper, since the government has been informed officially that Peru will accept modification of either of the protocol or its complementary act.

The Washington agreement is now being considered by the senate in secret session and it is understood that various senators are urging the adoption of reservations.

DAIRY HIT BY BIG FIRE

Creamery, Bottling and Ice Plant
at Scappoose Are Burned.

SCAPPOOSE, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—A midnight fire swept the creamery, bottling and ice plant of Ramsey Brothers on their large dairy ranch at the place. Several heavy blasts were heard for miles around caused by exploding gas and ammonia tanks.

The large dairy barn and house and other outbuildings were saved. The loss will reach almost \$15,000, a little insurance. The Ramseys purchased the farm about a year ago from the G. A. and Charles Heggie estate.

SHIP COMPANY IS SUED

Oil Concern Demands \$235,000
for Loss of Gasoline.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—The Shell Oil company of California filed a libel suit for \$235,000 against the Loebach Steamship company as the result of the loss of 1,000,000 gallons of gasoline when the tank steamer Lyman Stewart collided with the steamer Walter Luckenbach in the Golden Gate last Saturday.

The tanker, which was abandoned and is still on the rocks, belonged to the Union Oil company, but was hauling the gasoline for the Shell company.

BRITISH PREMIER CAMPAIGNS TODAY

Political Limelight Shines on
Manchester Again.

LUNCHEON IS POPULAR

Coalition Liberals Are Expected
to Have Nearly All Seats
at Big Gathering.

MANCHESTER, Eng., Oct. 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—The political limelight will shine upon Manchester tomorrow as it has not shone since the memorable day when President Wilson visited this northern metropolis, which prides itself upon being the center both of industry and culture.

David Lloyd George, the prime minister, has chosen the home of his friends to launch his platform. The Manchester Reform club, where the premier will deliver an address at a luncheon, has stood behind the premier while the National Liberal club of London was taking down his portrait from the library and hanging it in the basement.

Mr. Lloyd George will have nearly all the seats aside from those occupied by members of the premier's family and his staff.

Great efforts were being made among the Manchester liberals to be among the elect at the luncheon. There was gossip that anyone with a transferable ticket for the luncheon might easily obtain \$100 for it.

Sir Edward Rhodes will preside and propose a toast to the prime minister, whose address is expected to begin at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

COALITION IS SUPPORTED

Austen Chamberlain Makes Sensational Talk at Birmingham.

BIRMINGHAM, England, Oct. 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—Austen Chamberlain, the government leader in the house of commons, in a sensational speech here today declared the coalition government must be continued.

His speech indicated the line upon which Prime Minister Lloyd George will make his fight for political life in the next general election and removed doubt as to whether Mr. Chamberlain as a unionist party leader would support his chief.

Special significance attached to the speech, inasmuch as the prime minister himself was said to be awaiting the pronouncement to learn what support he had before writing to the country to deliver at Manchester tomorrow.

Mr. Chamberlain took his stand in favor of the coalition on the grounds that the country faced a great national danger in the labor party. If labor obtained a majority, he declared, direct action would triumph over the government, which would have to take instructions from the labor caucus.

The unionist party leader asserted that the country must not hand over an experiment in national reconstruction to the subversive if not revolutionary policy of the labor party. He declared the government's policy had prevented the conflagration in Asia Minor from spreading to Europe.

REED TO HOLD DEBATE

Tryout for College Team to Be Held October 23.

Six debaters will be chosen to represent Reed college in the annual triangular debate with the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college on December 8 at tryouts to be held Monday, October 23. Two teams of two men each will be selected from the sextette just before the contest.

Optional choice of sides and issues will be allowed entrants in the tryout. The question selected for the debate is, "Resolved: That a federal court with powers to enforce its decisions be established for the adjudication of industrial disputes." A record of aspirants have been filed with William Graham, foreman manager for the preliminaries.

Ashland Fire Report Held False.

ASHLAND, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Three months to a day and almost to an hour the local fire department awaited an alarm, yet a recent report from the state fire marshal's office in Salem credited the city with \$45,000 in property destroyed by conflagrations during September.

In his indignation, George M. Robinson, fire chief, has written to the state officer asking that the report be changed. From July 5 to October 2 the fire department was not a single alarm turned in to the fire station.

SMYRNA PLIGHT GREAT

ALL MONEY POSSIBLE TO GET
IS DECLARED NEEDED.

Barclay Acheson, Formerly of
Portland Y. M. C. A., Sends
Message From Near East.

Secure every cent possible, the need is twice as great as we first thought, is the burden of a message concerning the Smyrna disaster from Barclay Acheson, formerly of the Portland Y. M. C. A., to J. J. Handmaker, state director Near East Relief, yesterday.

"Several eastern and central Oregon counties, Crook, Deschutes, Jefferson, Klamath and Lake, which have been visited recently, have responded liberally," said Mr. Handmaker. "Gilliam, Wheeler, Grant and Umatilla are preparing for campaigns. Of western Oregon counties Yamhill is farthest along with pressed, party leaders, say they will meet executive discouragement, and if passed, would be vetoed."

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MAN ROBBED OF GLAND

AUTO FORAGERS FOR PREY
KIDNAP THEIR VICTIM.

CHICAGO CAPTURED FOR CLINE, Chloroformed and Mutilated by Skillful Operator.

CHICAGO, Oct. 13.—Joseph Wenzl is a lanky, normal person, who occasionally takes a drink, but his last adventure with liquor cost him one of his interstitial glands. He is now in a hospital recovering from his remarkable experience.

On the morning of October 11, he was walking under a viaduct, slightly lit up after a few rounds of drinks, when four men seized him, threw a sack over his head and dragged him into an automobile. A sponge filled with chloroform was pressed against his face and he slipped into unconsciousness. When he regained his senses, he was in a vacant lot, the car still over his head. He staggered home and there made the discovery that one of his glands had been removed. He called a physician who ordered him to a hospital.

The attending surgeons say the gland was removed by a skillful operator, presumably in some hospital, as the wound had been carefully sutured and dressed. The work of an expert.

It is the theory of the hospital authorities and the police, that Wenzl was kidnaped at the behest of some wealthy potent in need of a gland transplantation, that Wenzl had been chosen because of his virility and that he occasionally drank and would be easy to capture.

It is the first case of gland kidnap reported in Chicago.

School Building Near Completion.
