

DR. ABBOTT DIES IN BROOKLYN

Noted Editor, Clergyman and Lawyer Succumbs.

RANGE OF WORK WIDE

Head of The Outlook Also Was Known in Diversified Fields of Civic Enterprise.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Dr. Lyman Abbott, editor-in-chief of the Outlook, with which he has been associated nearly 40 years; clergyman, lawyer, author and successor to Henry Ward Beecher as pastor of Plymouth church, Brooklyn, died today. He would have been 87 next December. When he came his four sons and two daughters were at his bedside.

Dr. Abbott suffered a severe attack of bronchitis at his country home in Cornwall-on-the-Hudson last summer, from which he never fully recovered.

Dr. Abbott was one of the most active leaders in many avenues of religious and civic thought in the United States. As preacher, editor, author and theologian he exhibited a quality of character which impressed itself on all who came in contact with him, a singular poise and serenity of spirit.

In his early youth, after graduation from the University of the City of New York, he studied law and was admitted to the bar, and afterwards practiced in partnership with his brothers, Benjamin V. and Austin Abbott, giving up the law for theology, he studied for the ministry of the Congregational church with his uncle, S. C. Abbott, and was ordained at Farmington, Me., in 1860. His first charge was in Terre Haute, Ind., where he remained five years.

Editorial Work Noted.

As editor of the Christian Union, which was later to be known as the Outlook, his work in association with that of the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher, made him a man of great promise and one who saw religion, not too narrowly conventionalized, but overlapping and spiritualizing many of the social and civil problems of the time.

After the death of Mr. Beecher, Dr. Abbott became pastor of Plymouth church in Brooklyn, where his predecessor had earned fame as one of the foremost pulpits orators in America. He was installed in Plymouth church January 16, 1880, and remained in charge until 1899, when he resigned. He published a life of Henry Ward Beecher and a volume of his sermons.

In Dr. Abbott's work as editor of the Outlook, in which he was associated in his long career with many famous men, including Theodore Roosevelt, he sought to interpret the different orders of political organizations from the Christian viewpoint.

Working Power Extraordinary.

Those who were near him during this part of his life say that extraordinary working power was one of his chief characteristics. Moderation and sanity were the chief notes of his temperament and attitude. He commanded attention by his transparent sincerity and by a gift of clear persuasive statement. The range of Dr. Abbott's connection with civic and political work was wide; he had intimate association with betterment work in many fields. He held office in at least a score of organizations for city, state and national, and even international reform, and was actively interested in many others, including societies for child, civil and prison reform, charity organizations, forestry associations and the American Red Cross society.

Before starting on what might be called his ministerial career, he collaborated with his brother wrote two novels, "Come-out Comers" and "Matthew Caraby."

Books Are Listed.

His most important volumes are: "The Result of Emancipation in the United States," "Old Testament Shadows of New Testament Truths," "A Layman's Story," "Dictionary of Religious Knowledge," "A Study of Human Nature," "The Theology of an Evolutionist," "The Evolution of Christianity," "Social Problems," and "Problems of the Future."

Dr. Abbott was born in Roxbury, Mass., December 18, 1835. In 1857 he married Abby Frances Hamlin, who died in 1907. By her Dr. Abbott had six children, two of whom, Ernest H. and Lawrence F., were associated with him in the management of the Outlook.

quiet in the vicinity of the docks. The usual verbal abuse of men who refused to strike was not heard. No threats or violence were offered. In fact, Chief Jenkins stated, the pickets seemed exceptionally few and mild-mannered.

"In the other longshore strike," Chief Jenkins said, "there was no violence whatever for the first two weeks. Then hell broke loose all at once. It took us by surprise. This time we are not going to be fooled. We are ready for trouble, should it occur. With our 74 extra policemen now on duty I feel confident that we can handle any situation that can arise in Portland."

The invasion of Portland by the wandering hordes of I. W. W. is still being urged by radicals of other cities, according to papers and literature now in the possession of Chief Jenkins and Captain Moore. One Seattle radical paper printed the words "On to Portland" in huge boldface type on its front page. The appeals for foot-lease pickets and revolutionaries to march on Portland has evidently been offered in earnest, for the 75 arrivals and the party of 75 now en route seems to be the only organized movement toward Portland.

Evangelists Are Hooted.

Religion and bohemism, natural enemies, clashed in the pens of the city jail yesterday when a group of religious workers, representing the Apostolic Faith, attempted to hold a meeting in the jail. The evangelists had been warned by police officials that they would not be welcomed by the prisoners and could expect insults, but, firm in their faith, they decided to hold the meeting.

Some four women and a couple of men comprised the party. They were ushered into the section devoted to the 70 I. W. W. prisoners. The organ was turned and the revivalists struck up the words of a well-known hymn. Instantly the words of another hymn, an I. W. W. parody on a sacred verse, was struck

up by the men behind the bars, completely drowning out the hymn. Yells, cat calls, shrieks and wobbly cries echoed through the jail. An elderly woman, one of the appeals to the jailer for quiet.

He was taken to jail, his stock confiscated, but was afterwards released.

L. W. W. Decide to Fight.

Hereafter the I. W. W. convicted of vagrancy in the police court will refuse to take "floaters"—that is, to promise to leave the city if sentence is suspended. A formal meeting was held in the "tank" of the city jail Friday night and this mode of procedure decreed. According to information which reached Chief Jenkins, the meeting was a regular and formal I. W. W. business meeting. Mike Dooney, an organizer of being a vagrant, was very vocal in the city or of staying in jail was debated at length and the resolution to refuse "floaters" carried by a vote of 22 to 20.

Municipal Judge Ekwall, who had been quoted as saying the proceedings of the last few days had made something of a radical of him, declared yesterday that his remarks and his intentions had been misunderstood. blowing therefore is not likely to arise.

Assuming this conservative majority, who will be the prime minister after the elections? Balfour, Chamberlain and Birkenhead are out of the question owing to their advocacy and association with Lloyd George's plans. Leadership seems to lie between Bonar Law, Lord Derby and Lord Salisbury. My own fancy is Lord Derby.

Lloyd George to Fight.

What of Lloyd George? He will fight like a tiger, but for whom? The election cannot fail to complete his downfall. He hoped to return, not as leader, then holding the balance of power in the house of commons. That is unlikely to happen. It is more probable that he will head a small party of personal adherents without power to make or break governments.

I expect to see him try to return to the liberal party and restore the organization he has wrecked, but I doubt the success of his move. One thing is certain, he is down and out and will make a desperate fight to recover his dominion. But all the king's horses and all the king's men will not put Humpty Dumpty together again later.

Bonar Law's acceptance of office was not a surprise, as his name was given Lloyd George's death blow at the Carlton meeting. His action was doubtful up to the last moment. The late conservative leaders resigned with Lloyd George, leaving the party in Law's control. It is expected the election will be delayed until after Christmas but the battle will begin immediately, the strangest battle in the history of English politics.

TWO GLIDERS TOP MARK

FRENCH AVIATOR STAYS UP 3 HOURS 21 MINUTES.

Machine Moves Nose Upward Like Power Airplanes, But Avoids Rolling and Pitching.

NEW HAVEN, England, Oct. 22.—

(By the Associated Press.)—Two new records for gliding were established in the competition at Oxford Hill yesterday. Flying without a passenger, the French aviator Maneyrolle remained in the air for 3 hours 21 minutes, thus beating by 11 minutes the record in the German competitions recently by H. P. Hentzen of the Hanover Technical school.

Maneyrolle won a prize of 1000 pounds by his feat. Extraordinary ability was shown by the Frenchman in spite of changing winds. He occasionally glided into dangerous eddies, but always recovered. He flew in a Peyret monoplane.

The other record was in flight with a passenger. In this competition, G. R. Olley, gliding in a Pucker biplane, remained in the air for 49 minutes, or 36 minutes longer than the best previous record.

When Maneyrolle launched his machine, Raynham, the Englishman who glided an hour and 53 seconds Tuesday, also went up but was forced to land within eight minutes. The Frenchman meanwhile calmly soared to and fro, always flying toward the wind, but drifting steadily sideways, so that the machine appeared to be gliding at right angles to the normal line of flight. Whenever he reached the end of his beat, Maneyrolle altered the machine a quarter turn and retraced his aerial path, making the proceedings rather monotonous.

The spectators noted the absence of rolling and pitching movements and also that when he climbed the glider appeared to move nose-upward like a power airplane.

GENERAL REVISIONS BELIEVED UNNECESSARY.

Commission Moves Slowly in Considering Applications for Changes in Duties.

(By Chicago Tribune Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 22.—General tariff revisions may be unnecessary in the future even with a change in administration if the new flexible tariff system proves as successful as some of its advocates think it will be.

An expectation that such a situation may be made possible is a factor which is causing members of the tariff commission to move slowly in the tariff commission in making recommendations to the president for changes in duties.

Under the new tariff law the tariff commission, in making recommendations to the president, is instructed to propose rates of duty which will measure the difference in cost of production at home and abroad. Such duties may be increased or decreased by not more than 50 per cent of the rate specified in the act.

The advantage in revising the



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torit law in this manner, it is contended, would be that each case would be considered on its merits and there would not be the likelihood of trading and log-rolling which takes place in congress.

PEACE PARLEY IS BEGUN

Far East Chief and Japanese Negotiate on Vladivostok.

MOSCOW, Oct. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Ubovich of the Far Eastern republic's revolutionary army has begun negotiations with the Japanese commander and the Vladivostok consular representatives for the surrender of Vladivostok, according to advices received by the soviet government from China.

The dispatches said the American consul handed General Ubovich a note, requesting him to guarantee the personal safety of American citizens. Similar requests were made on behalf of the British and Japanese consulates and the safety of foreigners and of property was assured by Ubovich, on condition that Japanese retreat and that the American army be permitted to enter Vladivostok.

Additional advice to the government said the red army encountered at Okeanskais Japanese detachments which were covering the city. Representatives of the Japanese command reached Okeanskais Friday and warned the far eastern troops to retreat four miles to the north that place.

The dispatches assert that disorders broke out in various parts of Vladivostok in connection with the Japanese retreat and that the American consulate sent word later to General Ubovich that the Americans were impatiently waiting the Far East troops to restore order.

A government announcement said great danger threatened communists, workmen and far eastern Chinese. A few minutes later the flames blocked the corridor at the hands of the remaining White Guard bands. The government declared responsibility for any acts would rest entirely upon the Japanese command, which was retarding the entry into Vladivostok of Russian red troops.

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STARTLING TURN LIKELY

WOMAN'S MURDER DEFENSE PROMISES DISCLOSURES.

Evidence on Killing of Husband's Stenographer Is Expected to Be Completed Wednesday.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 22.—Startling disclosures are forecast for the continuation this week of the trial of Mrs. Catherine Rosier, who is charged with the murder of her husband's stenographer, Mildred Reckitt. The commonwealth expects to close its case on Wednesday, after taking the testimony of 20 or more witnesses.

The defense will attack the character of the slain stenographer and of the defendant's husband, Oscar Rosier. Many revelations are promised, although the state maintains that the relations between the two were confined to business activities.

It has been learned that Mrs. Rosier, previous to her marriage, was not an artist's model as reported but worked as a model in a clothing store, displaying merchandise on her slender, attractive figure to public view. She was but 19 when she became the wife of Oscar Rosier. Rosier at the time of his marriage to the defendant was 35. It was his second marriage.

Hunter Out Under \$500 Bail.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Oct. 22.—(Special.)—Jack Ekstrand, well-known hunter, is at liberty under \$500 bail on a charge of shooting an elk and having dogs in the woods during the deer season. Ekstrand has denied the charges. The evidence was said to be circumstantial and hearing has been set for Saturday but was postponed.

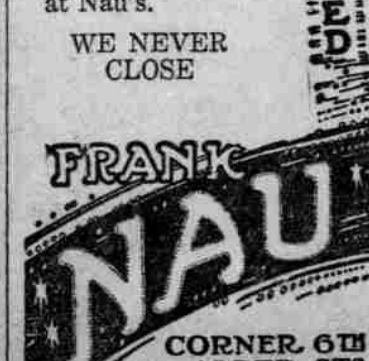

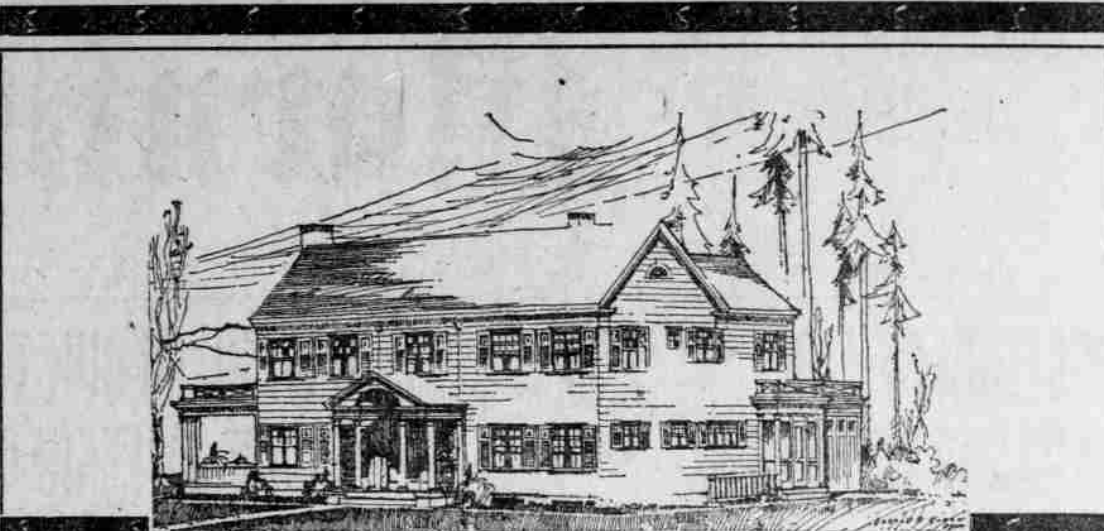
