

FLIGHT OF KILLER RELATED IN COURT

Quizz of Mrs. Phillips' Friend
Ends Abruptly.

CLOSE EXPECTED TODAY

Sister Says Mrs. Meadows When
Murdered With Hammer Had
\$85, Unaccounted for Yet.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30.—The story of the flight of Mrs. Clara Phillips after the slaying of Mrs. Albert Meadows was begun today in the trial of Mrs. Phillips for murder, and the prosecution brought out that Mrs. Meadows at the time of her death had \$85, unaccounted for as yet.

The cross-examination of Mrs. Peggy Caffee, who witnessed the slaying, was brought to an abrupt close this afternoon, after she had stuck closely to her direct examination story of the tragedy. Deputy District Attorney Fricke said the cutting short of the cross-examination would enable him to close the case some time tomorrow.

Sister Meets Mrs. Meadows.
Miss Genora Tremaine, sister of Mrs. Meadows, testified she met the latter at noon on July 12, the day of the slaying. The meeting was at the bank where Mrs. Meadows was employed. Miss Tremaine said her sister drew \$100 from the bank and gave her \$15. Jules Lucas, who called himself a sweetheart of Mrs. Meadows, had previously testified that he passed the rest of the noon hour with Mrs. Meadows and she spent nothing.

Mrs. Caffee testified that she and Mrs. Phillips met Mrs. Meadows just after the latter left the bank that afternoon and drove directly to the spot where the slaying occurred. After the tragedy Mrs. Caffee said, Mrs. Phillips carried away Mrs. Meadows' purse.

Arrest Related in Court.

Guy Millman, clerk at a downtown hotel, testified that Mrs. Phillips registered there, using the name "Mrs. R. S. Jackson." The hotel register was admitted in evidence, also the county jail register bearing Mrs. Phillips' signature, for purposes of comparison.
Jesus Camacho, city detective of Tucson, Ariz., testified he arrested Mrs. Phillips there the night of July 13 on a Southern Pacific railway train bound from Los Angeles to El Paso, Tex. Mrs. Phillips, he said, was traveling as "Mrs. R. Jackson," but when summoned from her berth said she was Mrs. Clara Phillips of Los Angeles. Camacho said he found a pasteboard box among her effects on which the name "Clara Phillips" had been written and that an attempt had been made to destroy it. He also found some jewelry and \$69 in cash, he testified.

TOWN MARSHAL ASSUSED

JURY FINDS SHOOTING BY
L. D. CLARK UNJUSTIFIABLE.

Witnesses Tell of Angry Words
Exchanged With Cigar Store
Man by Helix Officer.

PENDLETON, Or., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—L. D. Clark, Helix marshal and deputy sheriff, tonight was held in the county jail with the expectancy of a charge of manslaughter being preferred against him in the morning, following a shooting affair in which he killed Harry Rose, cigar store man of Helix Saturday night.

Harry Rose came to his death by a bullet wound inflicted in his breast from a bullet fired from a .32-caliber Colt automatic by one L. D. Clark, and was, as the coroner's jury find, that the shooting was not justifiable. This tells the story of the coroner's inquest held at Helix and lasting throughout the day. Clark is held without bond. He is 50 and the father of 11 children.

Feeling runs high in Helix against the officer.
The most damaging evidence against Clark is that all witnesses who witnessed the fight, and saw the fatal shot fired, testified today that Clark never declared Rose under arrest, and that in their opinion that fight was purely a personal affair.

Several farm hands who were eyewitnesses to the whole event told of young Clark, a son of the marshal, entering Rose's cigar store and getting into an argument with the proprietor. The upshot of that was that Rose struck young Clark, and at that moment the marshal arrived at the store. Hot words were exchanged between the officer and proprietor and then the marshal left.

Trieste Taken Easily.

TRIESTE, Oct. 30.—Trieste passed into the hands of the fascist calmly. According to a prearranged plan the fascist seized the governor's palace. Under the leadership of Sig. Giunta, the fascist deputy at Trieste, a group demanded entrance to the building. Thousands of fascist paraded the streets of the city, wearing black shirts and black faces. The blue-shirted members of the pro-Dalmatia society also paraded. The latter carried clubs. Business is proceeding as usual.

Medford Has \$8000 Blaze.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—Fire originating in the offices of Dr. Lincoln Kallen in the four-story Liberty building today caused an estimated \$8000 loss by partially destroying the doctor's X-ray equipment and flooding the stocks of the Southern Oregon Hardware store and the Colonial Ladies' Wearing Apparel store on the main-street floor.

Creswell Rural Route Starts.

CRESWELL, Or., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—The new rural route west of town will open Wednesday and will be operated on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Harold Traxler has been appointed temporary carrier. The route covers about 19 miles and is known as route No. 2.

J. H. JAYNE DISAPPEARS

NATION-WIDE SEARCH BEGUN
FOR EX-LEGISLATOR.

Properties Held by Monmouth,
Ill., Boiler Pipe Company to
Be Sold by Sheriff.

MONMOUTH, Ill., Oct. 30.—While the nation-wide search for the whereabouts of J. Howard Jayne, ex-state legislator and for years a prominent leader in state politics, was being pushed Sunday under the personal direction at Chicago of the missing man's wife, Mrs. Lynette Jayne, at least one of the many alleged ill-fated business projects of Jayne was scheduled to fall under the auctioneer's hammer at Monmouth today.

A forced sale by Sheriff Hicks of the properties held by the Western Boiler Pipe Company, of Monmouth, founded by Jayne 15 years ago, has been announced at the Warren county court house here. There was a hint that the state blue sky commission might be concerned with the investigation before it is completed. Large blocks of stock in at least one of the reported unfortunate Jayne ventures, it was said, have been sold broadcast. It is not vouchsafed, however, that proof of irregularities in these sales existed. At the moment it is impossible to ascertain in just what condition Mr. Jayne did leave the various ramifications of his business activities. His host of friends in this community were therefore slow to state unqualifiedly that his disappearance was voluntary and actuated by business worry, though that theory was the one most prominent.

Mrs. Jayne, who hurried to Chicago early Sunday morning in the belief that her husband went direct to that city, was insistent that Mr. Jayne is the victim of foul play.

McARTHUR IS INDORSED

RE-ELECTION ADVOCATED BY
M. E. CRUMPACKER.

Aspirant to Congress Defeated at
Primary in May Declares
for Representative.

M. E. Crumpacker, who was defeated by C. N. McArthur for the republican nomination for representative of the third congressional district, issued the following statement last night:
It is imperative, especially at this time, that the third district of Oregon be represented in Washington, D. C., by a republican. The Harding administration cannot be expected to carry out the policies of the republican party, nor can Oregon expect to receive its just due, unless we have from this state a congressional delegation of the same political complexion.

Although I opposed Mr. McArthur for various reasons last May, the fight was strictly personal between us. In view

of the fact that he was successful at the primary, he has become the candidate of the republican party, and it is my sincere hope that he will be successful next Tuesday at the polls. The party is bigger than any individual and unless the republicans of this district present a united front at the election there will be danger of placing in congress men who are not in sympathy with the policies of the administration.

At no time have I questioned the integrity or sincerity of purpose of Mr. McArthur. He has carried on a clean, hard fight for the election, and I hope he will receive the endorsement of all republicans who have the interests of the party at heart.

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HARDING TO DEFER HIGHER TAX ACTION

Increasing Revenue May
Absorb Budget Deficit.

INCOME IS ON UPGRADE

Congress Will Not Be Asked to
Change Tax Laws Until Reg-
ular Session in 1933.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 30.—The administration has no intention of urging imposition of additional taxes upon the people at the coming session of congress.
This was made plain today by officials of the treasury who have the confidence of the administration in revenue matters and who declared that any comprehensive revision of the revenue law would be deferred until the regular session of the next congress beginning in December, 1932.

The direct statement was made by a high treasury official that the present congress would not be called upon to revise the existing revenue law in any important particular. In fact, administration leaders hope to keep the administration recommendations regarding legislation down to a minimum in order that congress may devote its whole attention to the enactment of ship subsidy legislation before March 4, next.

Deficit May Be Absorbed.
Officials admit that there will be a deficit during the current fiscal year of several hundred million dollars, but they hope to meet it without calling for increased taxation. They believe that it can be absorbed to a great extent. The internal revenue bureau is making a drive for collection of back taxes and the settlement of pending claims. From this source it is anticipated that the returns will be larger than estimated previously. Disposal of surplus supplies of government departments is being estimated and with the return of favorable business conditions it is expected that the corporation and income receipts will show a substantial increase. Estimates for returns from corporation and income taxes were scaled down as a result of the business depression and it is believed that the taxes received next year will be considerably more than has been expected.

Better Conditions Awaited.
Even though a deficit continues in prospect treasury officials believe it is preferable to wait another year before proposing additional taxes. They believe that the conditions will be such that the government will be able to meet its obligations without the need of increased taxation. The treasury department is making a study of the situation and will report to congress next year.

issuance of tax-exempt securities by the states and municipalities which already has been reported from the house ways and means committee, and is on the house calendar. This is entirely distinct from any amendments to the revenue law, being in the form of a resolution instead of a bill, and requiring a two-thirds vote in congress and ratification by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states. Even if congress adopts this resolution at the coming winter session it might require two or three years to obtain action by the states, which means that it will not help to solve immediate financial problems of the treasury.

PAROLE QUESTION RAISED

CAN STATE PRISONER BE
TRIED IN FEDERAL COURT?

Habeas Corpus Proceedings Ask-
ing for Release of James H.
Spencer to Settle Answer.

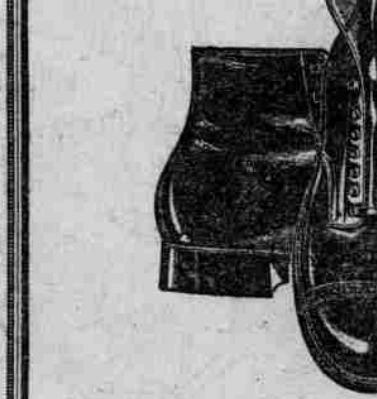
Whether a prisoner on parole from the state courts can be arrested and tried in the federal courts will be determined when the habeas corpus proceedings asking for the release of James H. Spencer, are heard by Federal Judge Bean sometime this week. A petition for the writ was filed yesterday by Attorney Tom Garland.

Spencer, a veteran of the world war, was found guilty of forgery in the circuit court and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. He was paroled from the bench by Judge Walter H. Evans, at the request of the jury, on October 26. On October 25 Spencer was charged by the federal grand jury with the crime of impersonating a federal officer and on this representation inducing a merchant to cash two worthless checks for him. Spencer was arrested by a deputy United States marshal and lodged in the county jail on October 27.

Garland raised the point that Spencer, being on parole, was legally an inmate of the Oregon penitentiary and as such could not be arrested until his period of detention was up. Claiming that his client is immune from arrest because of his status, Garland asks that he be released.

Even though the lawyer wins his point, Spencer is not out of trouble. Though an American, he expatriated himself by serving with Canadian forces in the world war. Because of his lack of American citizenship, immigration officials have a warrant for arrest for deportation already issued, and in case Spencer is released he will be re-arrested and returned to Canada.
