

CALDER'S ELECTION ALL BUT CERTAIN

Big Plurality for New York
Senator Expected.

TARIFF BOOST RECALLED

Senator Proud of His Record in
Framing Law to Suit Man-
ufacturers of Godham.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Barring a political earthquake in these parts next week, William M. Calder, United States senator from New York, will be re-elected.

That Calder will run far ahead of Governor Miller on the republican ticket is conceded at republican headquarters, while the democratic managers admit that Dr. Royal S. Copeland, the democratic nominee for senator, cannot expect to keep step with the popular Al Smith on the democratic ticket.

If Miller wins, Calder will be re-elected by a larger plurality than the governor. If Smith wins by a narrow margin it may be regarded as a virtual certainty that Calder will be found a victor also. An Al Smith landslide might reasonably be expected to sweep Copeland in as Governor Miller rode the Harding landslide into office in 1920. At the same time one hears a good deal of gossip from democratic sources to the effect that Calder is going to win, even if Smith should sweep the state.

Smith Republicans' Terror.
Al Smith is the terror and the only terror of the republican party hereabouts. Wherever he might turn up on the democratic ticket the republicans knew long ago that his republican opponent would be up against a desperate fight. Smith has been nominated for senator instead of governor, Calder would be sweating blood at this writing and Miller would be on easy terms. Dr. Copeland is a physician of note and is reputed to be the best health commissioner New York ever had. He is an exceedingly able man in his province, an orator of distinction, a gracious personality, and he is well known throughout the state for his health protection work. He is an amateur in politics, however, and with some difficulty persuaded to undertake an uphill fight in a field to which he was a stranger.

Calder served ten years in the house and now seeks a second term in the senate. He is a well known politician in the country and in this contest has an organization that is a marvel of ingenuity and efficiency. He has a united republican party behind him and also commands considerable support from conservative democrats who are not afraid of a protective tariff and cannot abide the radicalism of Dr. Copeland or his affiliation with the Hearst-Hylan wing of the democratic party, which he was nominated.

Calder Has Advantage.
Superficially, therefore, Calder possesses a tremendous advantage over his opponent, which is reflected in the two-to-one betting on the re-election of the senator, while the betting on the governorship fight gives Miller only the shade of preference represented by 11 to 10. The election of Copeland under the circumstances would denote a republican revolt against the tariff, if not the Harding administration, with the policies of which the senator is closely identified—a revolt which has not manifested itself on the surface to date.

Calder is not classed as a statesman, but he rejoices in the distinction of being the best legislator in the United States senate, as an after-dinner speech expressed it. He is the Washington and the best of his constituents and he counts that day long when he has failed to bring home the bacon for a single one of them. He receives the largest mail at the capital and maintains at his own expense a force of clerks to run minor errands and answer letters.

While he voted against the soldier bonus bill and to uphold President Harding's veto, which is reflected in the fact that he maintains a bureau in New York as well as Washington to facilitate provision of government care for disabled veterans and the adjustment of soldier claims of which 15,000, he says, have been handled to date.

Copeland Is for Bonus.
As to the bonus, Calder thinks he voted the sentiment of New York. Dr. Copeland has come out for the bonus.

The tariff is a conspicuous issue in the senatorial contest. Dr. Copeland and his democratic colleagues are assailing the Fordney-McCumber law as a specimen of special privilege which is operating to increase the cost of living. Calder is a member of the senate finance committee which helped to frame the law and it is a matter of pride with him that none of the 32,000 manufacturing establishments in New York failed to receive substantial protection. If an article was made in New York, Calder was for boosting the tariff rate and generally got it boosted. Of course, it would be unfair to say he never got a rate lowered. He did frequently on articles not made in New York, and now reminds New Yorkers that he lowered the cost of such articles to them. The tariff operates so mysteriously, however, that the tariff boost on articles made in New York, according to the senator, has not and will not increase the cost to the consumer.

A revelation of Mr. Calder's operations as a glorified alderman is affording the democrats much campaign argument. Calder got the tariff on gloves shaved sky-high and Lucius N. Littauer, the millionaire glove manufacturer of Gloversville, told about it in a recent outburst of confidence, which the democrats pronounce more of a knock than a boost for the senator.

CANDIDATES' LIVES INSURED

Wall Street Firm Takes Action to
Safeguard Wagers.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—The lives of former Governor Smith and Governor Miller have been insured for \$20,000 each by a firm of Wall street betting commissioners, who are handling a large number of wagers on the New York state gubernatorial contest, it was announced tonight.

The policies were taken out to protect the firm against loss in handling the bets in the event of the death of either candidate, which would invalidate these election wagers.

Readily accessible, I find it powerless to restrain myself from expression. I, too, have known of Margaret's love for this man for several years and it is only fair to her to say that she confessed it to me. I will not further violate her confidence, but I do want to state unqualifiedly and unreservedly that it is a fact that this preacher had led her to believe that he returned that love.

"I want further to say that I had plenty of opportunity and occasion to observe and study this big man mentally and physically time and again. I warned my wife and told her the results of observations and pleaded with her to save herself before it was too late. On several occasions, I believe, I convinced her of the true situation.

"In conclusion I want to say to the world that Margaret is not to be blamed for this affair but that the real blame should justly be placed upon the man who paid the price that must be paid by all who prove unfaithful to their trust. (Signed) "Frank E. Carleton."

The statement was given out in the ex-judge's law offices here. He declined to discuss his plans for the future.

WOMAN'S BODY EXAMINED

Prosecutor Ready to Make Fur-
ther Investigation as Result.

HAYRE, Mont., Oct. 31.—(By the Associated Press.)—Following findings by two local physicians, a coroner's jury today returned a verdict that the bullet which killed Mrs. Margaret Carleton in the double killing here last Friday morning had entered her body at a point directly in and slightly upward of her chest, and that she died of a gunshot wound.

Dr. Carl Foss, civil authorities were prepared tonight to make further investigation of the tragedy.

Neither Dr. Hamilton nor Mr. Kuhr would comment on the possibility of a self-inflicted bullet following the path taken by the one which struck Mrs. Carleton.

At the request of Mr. Pyle the home of the Rev. Leonard J. Christler, who was killed at the same time and place as Mrs. Carleton, was opened this afternoon by Mrs. Christler. Local authorities and a number of newspaper representatives with Mr. and Mrs. Pyle examined the contents of drawers, suitcases and trunks in an unsuccessful effort to find evidence that the revolver which discharged the fatal shots was the property of the Christlers.

Because of unexpected developments in the investigation today into Mrs. Carleton's death, Mr. and Mrs. Pyle did not present to Mr. Kuhr the list of questions they formulated late last night dealing with his official attitude toward the investigation and asking what had become of the diamond rings Mrs. Carleton had been wearing the evening of the shooting.

MRS. PHILLIPS' MIND WEAK, SAYS LAWYER

Alleged Hammer Wielder De-
clared Moron.

INSANITY IS IN FAMILY

Course of Defense Indicated in
Trial of Woman Held for
Mrs. Meadows' Murder.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 31.—Mrs. Clara Phillips is a "moron," "subject to epileptic convulsions," and has "the mentality of a child," her attorney, Bortram Herrington, declared today in opening the defense in her trial for the murder of Mrs. Alberta Meadows.

The attorney asserted he would prove that the defendant did not wield the hammer with which the state contends Mrs. Meadows was beaten to death on January 12 last. He declared it would be shown that Mrs. Phillips' every action on that day was "guided by Peggie Caffee," prosecuting witness, who testified she saw Mrs. Phillips striking Mrs. Meadows with the hammer.

The state rested after examining Lester Altkraper, who corroborated Mrs. Caffee's statement that he and a man named Gentry met Mrs. Caffee and Mrs. Phillips at Long Beach a few hours before the slaying. He said the women came to his apartment and Gentry and Mrs. Phillips went out and returned with a pint bottle of whiskey, which all four partook. He said he and Gentry drove the women to Los Angeles, Mrs. Phillips crying as he her bottle and what remained of its contents.

Women's Fight Revisited.

Herrington declared he would show that Mrs. Meadows was slain after an altercation and not between her and Mrs. Phillips in which the latter's little finger was practically broken and she appealed to Mrs. Caffee for aid. It was Mrs. Caffee, he asserted, who bought the hammer and not Mrs. Phillips.

After the slaying the attorney went on Mrs. Phillips went to a hotel and was there told by her husband that "something awful" had happened and she must go to Texas at once. Phillips, he said, got her some money and she started east. Referring to his client's mental condition, Herrington said her father and several other relatives had been mentally irresponsible, the father being insane for six years prior to his death. Mrs. Phillips herself, he asserted, was subject to epileptic attacks and her mental balance was "upset by the conduct of her husband."
