

REPUBLICAN BOOST TO INDUSTRY CITED

Secretary Davis Makes Appeal to Voters.

FARMERS HELD HELPED

Relief Afforded After Hardships Under Democratic Regime Is Pointed Out.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—James J. Davis, secretary of labor, who is in San Francisco on a campaign tour of the west, tonight issued what he termed as "eve of election" appeal to voters over the nation to elect republican senators and representatives in tomorrow's elections.

The statement follows: "In the short 15 months since the republican administration, under President Harding took charge of the affairs of the nation at Washington we have brought America back from the brink of industrial and commercial disaster and started on the high road to prosperity.

"When the democratic administration ended we found between five and six million working men walking the streets of our towns and cities, seeking in vain for employment.

Industry Troubles Cited. "Mine, mill and factory were closing down under the system of laws and taxation which was rapidly driving industry to the wall. By some legislation enacted by the republican congress and by the administration we have halted the movement toward industrial panic and have already entered upon an era of prosperity.

Today the five or six million who were then unemployed are back at work. Industry has revived until today the demand for labor exceeds the supply. The finances of the nation have been rehabilitated and the liberty bonds held by the patriotic citizens of the country have been brought back from 85 cents on the dollar to par. The federal deficit bill has been reduced by \$300,000,000. An American protective tariff bill has provided security for the operation of American industry and agriculture.

Farmers Declared Aided. "The farmers of the country have been aided through the war finance corporation and under the agricultural credits bill. Government funds which enabled them to tide themselves over a period of ruinously low prices which were brought on by a democratic policy of financial deflation that safeguarded no one.

"These things have been accomplished in a year and a half and the work is just begun. The administration in pursuing its policy of rehabilitation needs all the support the American people can give. Now is the time to vote the republican ticket from top to bottom and to send to Washington senators and representatives who will take an active part in the constructive work that lies before the administration.

"To elect a democrat at this time means to elect a minority officer whose sole function will be criticism and obstruction. The administration has earned support for every republican candidate."

Mayfield's Name Printed. In Texas the supreme court, by an eleven hour decision, today ordered the name of Earle B. Mayfield, the democratic candidate for United States senator, printed on the ballots. The word was sent to all county clerks, but some doubt exists whether all can comply in time. Injunctions by his political opponents had prevented the printing, heretofore. The name of his republican opponent, George E. Pugh, has been stricken from the ballot because he was not nominated by a regular party convention.

REPUBLICANS SEE VICTORY

Record Vote for Off Year Likely in Pacific Coast States.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—In pre-election statements, issued by the political party leaders today, the major party leaders declared their standard-bearers will be successful tomorrow and the minority party leaders declared they would make gains over previous years.

With favorable weather, it was predicted that the heaviest vote ever cast in an off year would be cast tomorrow. Party leaders in their last appeals to the voters stressed the necessity of the voters turning out to cast their ballots.

The registration in California for the election is 1,232,334, of which 948,423 registered as republicans and 219,107 as democrats. Other states in the west reported heavy registration.

The campaign in Oregon has been one of the most bitterly contested because the religious issue was injected by reason of a compulsory public school bill and through activities of secret organizations. The Federated Secret societies and the Ku Klux Klan issued lists indorsing candidates for all offices.

The normally democratic state of Nevada was claimed tonight by the republicans who based their prediction on increased republican registration and an economy plea made by the speakers.

Interest in Washington, divided between Miles Pindexter, United States senator who is seeking reelection, and C. C. Pugh, his democratic opponent, attracted more than state-wide attention.

The leading contest in Montana was for the United States senatorial seat to be vacated by Senator Myers. Both the republican and democratic candidates claimed the seat in the latest statements issued tonight.

The republicans in New Mexico expect to send Mrs. Adeline Otero-Warren to Washington as a member of the national house of representatives, according to a statement issued today. The principal campaign in Arizona was centered in the governorship and the campaign was closed with a twilight procession by the democrats.

With both sides strong in the expectation of victory, the republicans by an approximate 200,000 majority and the democrats by 50,000 or more, according to their respective claims.

The republican tacticians, United States Senator Johnson, who is a candidate for reelection, and Samuel M. Shorridge and Albert E. Boynton, chairman of the republican state central committee, held a final conference today preliminary to the election, and announced that a careful consideration of all available information pointed to "big republican successes."

On the other hand Frank M. Silva, manager of the Thomas Lee Woolwine headquarters, said after a conference with the party chiefs in Los Angeles that Woolwine would be elected governor easily, through the help of not only the democratic but the progressive republican vote, and that the entire democratic ticket would go in with banners flying.

Senator Shorridge was of the opinion that the republicans "will win a splendid victory in the southland" as a part of the expected triumph of the party, while Mr. Silva predicted that the swinging over of the progressive republican vote to the democrats will swing the victory to his side.

Fred W. Richardson, republican nominee for governor, ended his campaign in San Francisco tonight, after talking in Marin county towns today.

MONTANA INTEREST IS KEEN

Heavy Vote Expected and Both Parties Predict Victory.

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 6.—With promise of favorable weather tomorrow and rapidly increased interest in congressional, state and legislative contests, leaders of both democratic and republican central committees tonight predicted a much larger vote than was anticipated in the early days of the campaign.

The prospects of a big vote from the farming counties of the eastern part of the state is hailed by leaders of both parties as favorable to their candidates. Democratic predictions of victory for Burton K. Wheeler for the United States senate are no less confident than those of the republicans for Carl W. Riddick.

The race for the upper house of congress is dividing interest with

the contest between Dixon and anti-Dixon forces for control of the next legislature. Political dopesters are figuring with especial care the probable complexion of the next state senate, which, it is conceded by members of both parties, will determine whether Governor Dixon will be able to put into effect the tax programme which he has been urging in his speaking tours over the state.

Last-minute rallies were scheduled for virtually every county seat and center of population in the state tonight.

DECISION WILL STAND

MAYFIELD'S NAME TO GO ON TEXAS BALLOT.

State Supreme Court Overrules Attempt to Vacate Motion Denying Rehearing.

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 6.—The state supreme court this afternoon overruled the motion of Luther Nickels for leave to file a mandamus application seeking to require the Dallas court of civil appeals to vacate its order of Sunday denying a motion for rehearing and its order dissolving the Groesbeck injunction suit.

A motion for a rehearing in the Corelana Mayfield injunction case was overruled by the court of appeals.

Telegrams advising of the decision of the supreme court this afternoon and that the name of Earle B. Mayfield, democratic senatorial nominee, should be placed on the ballots for tomorrow's general election were dispatched to all counties in the state by Chief Clerk Payne of the secretary of state's office this afternoon, following the court's decision, on advice of the attorney-general's department.

EUGENE, Or., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—The story of the forcible divestment of a young man of his peon pants at a dance in the armory here on Saturday night leaked out today.

The wearer was said to be a freshman of the University of Oregon, but his name was not given. The youth made a hit with the "flappers" for several dances, according to those in attendance. About 11 o'clock there was considerable confusion and even a body said the lad's pants had been

forcibly removed and that he was on his way home with them under his arm.

ALASKA GOLD ARRIVES

Half Million in Bullion Brought to Seattle From Peninsula.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., Nov. 6.—More than a ton of gold bullion, valued at nearly \$500,000, arrived in Seattle today on the steamship Victoria, from Nome. The treasure shipment is approximately one-half of the 1922 gold yield of the Seward peninsula of Alaska, the total production for the year having amounted to not more than \$1,000,000.

The bullion was brought south in steel chests and delivered to the Seattle assay office and local banks.

It is valued at an average of \$17 an ounce.

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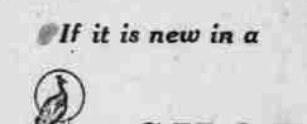

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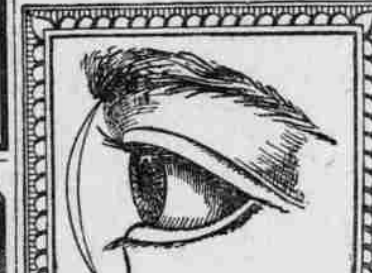
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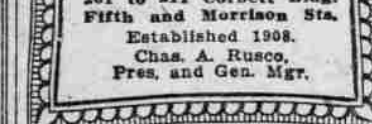
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
