Hitchcock Concedes His Defeat by Republican in Nebraska, But Utah Race Is Close.

In the house of representatives the democrats, at the same hour, had gained 23 seats and lost none. DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 7.—In maintaining a strong lead which has not been once shaken since the Iowa returns began to be received, Smith, W. Brookhart, rep., was running more than 29,000 ahead of Clyde L. Herring, dem., for United States senator for Iowa in 408 precincts out of 2348, approximately one-sixth of the state. The vote in 408 precincts: Brookhart, 73,199; Herring, 39,692.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 7.—With a lead of 4544 in 105 districts out of 134, Senator Peter G. Gerry of Rhode Island is deemed practically a winner over E. W. Loring, rep., Beechman, his republican opponent. The remaining districts to be heard from are for the most part democratic strongholds and for W. R. Smith, rep., is held to be the favorite. In the gubernatorial race for S. Flynn, democrat, is making a strong race and holds the lead with returns in from 105 districts out of 184. The count is: Flynn, dem., 38,462; H. J. Grom, rep., 37,853.

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 7.—With returns from all parts of the state dragging slowly in, indications at 11 o'clock tonight were that the results in New Jersey's senatorial and gubernatorial contests would be extremely close. At that hour, representatives of none of the candidates would hazard a confident estimate of the final result.

Only 233 of the state's 2484 election districts had tabulated the votes by that time. Senator Frelinghuysen, rep., got 20,915, and Governor Edwards, dem., 21,363 in the fight for the senatorial office. The same districts gave, for governor, Runyon, rep., 27,515, and Silzer, dem., 26,412.

At midnight returns from 122 districts out of the 2464 in the state gave Edwards 109,564 and Frelinghuysen 99,808 for United States senator, and Silzer 109,566 and Runyon 93,480 for governor.

BOSTON, Nov. 28.—When returns from a little more than half of the election precincts in Massachusetts had been counted Senator Lodge, rep., was trailing 31 votes behind Gaston, dem. The precincts counted were from all parts of the state and included all but 19 of the 274 precincts in Boston. The vote of 743 precincts was: Gaston 175,600; Lodge 174,510.

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 7.—The contest for United States senator in Utah has narrowed down and both Ernest Bamberger, republican, and William H. King, democrat, incumbent, are confident of victory. Returns from 67 scattered precincts gave Bamberger 3661, King 3626. The race for congress in the first district is exceptionally close, with Milton H. Wellington having a slight

lead over Don B. Colton, republican, incumbent, on the face of early returns. In the second district congressional race E. O. Leatherwood, republican, incumbent, has a lead of several hundred votes over David Dunbar, the democratic candidate.

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 7.—Mrs. Anna D. Olsen, running for the United States senate on the democratic ticket, carried Cloquet, her home town by 67 votes. The city complete gave Mrs. Olsen 542, Kellogg 475 and Shipstead 458.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 7.—In returns from 797 precincts, more than one-third of the state, tonight William Neely, democrat, maintained his lead over United States Senator Howard Sutherland in the fight for the senatorship. The figures were: Neely 78,681, Sutherland 73,714.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—With more than a third of the precincts in Missouri heard from, James A. Reed, United States senator, democrat, held a lead of more than 16,500 votes over R. R. Brewster, his republican opponent, for re-election to the senate. Unofficial returns from 1361 precincts out of 3873 in the state give: Reed, 148,901; Brewster, 132,287.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Nov. 7.—A. A. Jones, United States senator, democratic candidate for re-election, was leading his republican opponent, Stephen B. Davis, Jr., on returns from six scattered precincts. The vote was Jones 458; Davis 181. Mrs. A. Otero-Warren, republican candidate for New Mexico's lone seat in the national house of representatives, was running behind John Morrow, democrat. The vote was Morrow 419; Otero-Warren 177.

For governor James F. Hinkle, democrat, had 461 votes to 143 for C. L. Hull, republican.

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 7.—W. E. Talbot, director of the republican organization in Texas, at 11 o'clock tonight conceded election of Earle B. Mayfield, democratic candidate for senator, over George E. B. Peddy, republican and independent democratic candidate. Returns at that time showed practically a 3 to 1 lead for Mayfield.

Colonel Henry D. Lindale, Peddy's campaign manager, while he conceded Mayfield's election, said:

"From partial returns it seems quite certain that on the face of it Mayfield has a large majority of the vote."

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 7.—Returns from 1208 out of 3395 precincts in Indiana for United States senator gave: Ralston, dem., 221,548; Beveridge, rep., 209,744; Henry, soc., 140.

DETROIT, Nov. 7.—Returns from 540 out of 7906 precincts at midnight gave Senator Townsend, rep., 64,338; Ford, rep., 64,311.

For governor 526 precincts gave Groesbeck, rep., 60,594; Cummins, dem., 29,908. Republican congressmen continued to pile up comfortable leads in all the districts heard from.

FARGO, N. D., Nov. 7.—Returns from 108 precincts out of 2108 in North Dakota for United States senator gave Frazier, rep., 7222; O'Connor, dem., 12,466. Ninety precincts gave Frazier, rep., 13,835; Lemke, ind., 4140.

WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 7.—Seven out of 124 districts in the city of Wilmington gave DuPont, rep., for senator, 1935; Bayard, dem., 1309; Layton, rep., congress, 1815; Boyce, dem., 1307.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—Returns from 699 of Ohio's 1167 precincts today showed that Representative in Congress Fess, republican candidate for United States senator, maintained his lead over Senator Alton Pomeroy on returns from 748 precincts. The vote: Fess, 62,463; Pomeroy, 59,829; Virginia D. Greene, independent, 594.

A majority against the beer and wine amendment to the constitution was given in returns from 468 precincts which showed: For the amendment, 23,159; against, 37,488.

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 7.—Nineteen-five precincts out of 1525 in Montana gave for senator, Riddick, rep., 7774; Wheeler, dem., 12,721; for congressman, 1st district, 53 precincts: McCormick, rep., 4808; Evans, dem., 645; Representative, 2d district, Leavitt, republican, 1279; Moss, dem., 944, Chief Justice, 68 precincts: Callaway, rep., 6716; Jackson, dem., 6001.

OMAHA, Nov. 7.—Senator Hitchcock tonight conceded the election of his republican opponent, E. B. Howell, republican national committeeman. In congratulating his successor, the senator said that he expected Mr. Howell's majority would be 22,000 or more. This was based upon what was claimed to be an indicated Hitchcock plurality of 10,000 in the county, of which Omaha is the seat.

Returns from 221 precincts out of 1921 in Nebraska gave for United States senator, rep., 25,994; Hitchcock, dem., 15,495.

The same precincts gave for governor: Randall, rep., 17,344; Bryan, dem., 22,887.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 7.—Seventy-three precincts out of 659 gave for senator: Mondell, rep., 2170; Kendrick, dem., 2478. For governor: Hays, rep., 1936; Ross, dem., 1812.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 7.—With a little more than half the state reported at 10 P. M., Cabell Bruce, democratic candidate for United States senator, was leading Joseph E. M. Howard, republican, incumbent, by 4631 votes. All but 340 precincts are in Baltimore city. Total vote was Bruce 76,882, France 72,951.

In the race for the house of representatives, John Philip Hill of the third district, with but nine precincts, led Anthony Dimario, his democratic opponent, by 14,335 votes.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 7.—George P. McLean, United States senator, had a lead of nearly 6000 over Thomas J. Spillacy, his democratic opponent, in figures for 39 towns out of 169 in the state. The totals were: McLean, rep., 80,235; Spillacy, dem., 74,362.

Forty-one precincts for governor gave: Templeton, rep., 161,723; Fitz-Gerald, dem., 96,582.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 7.—Kenneth D. McKellar, democratic candidate for re-election for United States senator from Tennessee, was leading Newell Sanders, republican nominee, by a ratio of more than two to one on the face of unofficial returns from 642 precincts out of a total of 2680 in Tennessee. Returns from these precincts gave McKellar 38,807 votes, Sanders 16,208.

Alabama Democrats Win All. BIRMINGHAM, Nov. 7.—The democratic state ticket, headed by W. W. Brandon for governor, today was elected in its entirety, although republican strength in some sections was the heaviest ever recorded.

ALICE ROBERTSON LOSES HOUSE SEAT

Only Woman Representative Beaten for Congress.

CHICAGO WOMAN WINS

Daughter of Late Member Ahead on Face of Early Returns, But Thompson Slate Is Beaten.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Miss Alice Robertson of Muskogee, republican, the only woman member of the 67th congress, was defeated for re-election by the man over whom she won in the republican landslide of 1920. Incomplete returns indicated late tonight.

W. W. Hastings, democrat, veteran of three terms, who was unseated by Miss Robertson in the last election, had a lead of almost 2 to 1 with 117 precincts reporting out of 266 in the district. The count stood: Hastings 12,333; Miss Robertson, 6665.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—The first five down-state precincts reporting on representative in congress at large gave Mrs. Winifred Mason Huck, republican, 456, and Allen D. Albert, democrat, 181, in the contest to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Huck's father, the late William E. Mason. Albert is a dry, who recently broke with the Anti-Saloon league.

Early returns give the present republicans in congress in the 10th, 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th Illinois districts leads over their democratic opponents.

In the 11th district where Representative Ira C. Copely was defeated by Frank R. Reid for the republican nomination, Reid is leading Edward J. O'Beirne, his opponent, by 1453 to 594, on the basis of returns from 22 out of 210 precincts.

The democratic ticket in Cook county took the lead on first reports over the republican nominees endorsed by Mayor William Hale Thompson.

County Judge Righelmer, one of the mainstays in the Thompson organization, was running 6147 behind on reports from the first 200 out of 2344 precincts, the figures being: Edmund K. Jarecki, dem., 34,188, and Righelmer, 29,041.

Democratic nominees for the four next most important offices were leading by similar amounts.

WET DEMOCRAT IS IN LEAD

Candidate on Light Wine and Beer Ticket Popular in Iowa.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 7.—Fred Hageman, democrat, of Waverly, Ia., who made his campaign for representative in congress in the third Iowa district on a light wine and beer platform, was leading his republican opponent, T. J. B. Robinson, Hampton, rep., nearly 2 to 1 upon reports from 14 out of 217 precincts in the district. Eleven of these precincts, however, were from Dubuque, a former "wet" stronghold.

In the second Iowa district, too, a democrat was slightly ahead in 27 out of 164 precincts. W. G. Cook, democrat, had 4669 votes and Harry Hull, republican, 3796.

Elsewhere in the state republican candidates for congress had some leads in fragmentary returns.

Berger Leading Republican.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 7.—Victor L. Berger, socialist candidate for congress in the fifth district, polled 451 votes to 312 for William H. Stafford, incumbent, republican, in returns from three precincts reporting tonight.

Hull Leads Republicans.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 7.—Cordeil Hull, democrat, was leading Representative Wynne F. Clouse, republican, by 6 to 1 in the first scattering returns from the 5th district.

Kentucky Names Republicans.
