

COX IS IN LEAD IN MASSACHUSETTS

Republican 9567 Ahead of Fitzgerald.

758 PRECINCTS ARE IN

Total Vote Is Given as 198,003 for Cox and 188,436 for Democratic Returns.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 7.—Returns from 758 precincts, including 270 in Boston, gave Cox, republican, a lead of 9567 over Fitzgerald. The vote: Cox, 198,003; Fitzgerald, 188,436. Speaker Gillett, of the national house of representatives, was re-elected in the second district.

GROESBECK HAS GOOD LEAD

Cummins, Democrat, About 10,000 Behind for Governor.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 7.—In 233 precincts Governor Alex G. Groesbeck, republican, held a comfortable lead over the democratic aspirant for governor, Alvin M. Cummins. The vote was: Groesbeck, 24,263; Cummins, 14,794. Republican congressional candidates were leading in all districts heard from. A close vote was recorded on the proposed income tax amendment on returns from 83 of the 2896 precincts in the state. The vote was: Yes 2757, No 2848. All the returns were from rural centers.

PINCHOT LEADS IN RACE

Senator Reed Is About Two to One Ahead of Samuel Shull.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 7.—Returns from 96 districts out of 301, in Pennsylvania gave Gifford Pinchot for governor 7471 and John A. McSparran 4125. For United States senator, 29 districts gave David A. Reed, rep., 2660; Samuel E. Shull, dem., 1023. The same number of districts gave George Wharton Pepper 2675 for the other seat in the United States senate and Fred B. Kerr 1223.

THOMPSON LOSES LEAD

Donahy Steps Ahead in Race for Governor of Ohio.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—A. V. Donahy, democratic candidate for governor, took the lead over Carmel A. Thompson, republican, on returns from 695 of the state's 1167 precincts early today. The vote for these precincts was: Thompson, 86,078; Donahy, 87,296. Returns from 255 precincts gave a majority of 5000 against adoption of the beer and light wines constitutional amendment.

GOVERNOR MILLER BEATEN

Total Defeat Is Admitted by Republican Committee.

(By Chicago Tribune Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—At 2:55 o'clock tonight the republican state committee admitted the defeat of Governor Miller and all of his colleagues on the republican state ticket. There also was a strong indication that the assembly would be democratic.

North Dakota for Nestos.

FARGO, N. D., Nov. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Returns from seven out of 2138 precincts in North Dakota gave: Nestos, republican, 515; Lemke, independent, 137. Returns from eight precincts out of 2138 in North Dakota for senator gave Frazier, republican, 194; O'Connor, democrat, 567.

Kendall Winning in Iowa.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 7.—For governor: N. Kendall, republican, had in 238 precincts 52,076 votes and J. Ray Files, democrat, 20,232. The proposal to issue \$22,000,000 state bonds for a solid, bonus had 20,170 votes in 205 precincts and there were 15,997 votes against it.

Nevada Race Is Close.

RENO, Nev., Nov. 7.—Returns from nine complete precincts out of 290 gave for governor: Miller, republican, 98; Scruggs, democrat, 75. For senator, Pittman, democrat, 24; Chandler, republican, 67.

McMaster Ahead for Governor.

SILOU FALLS, S. D., Nov. 7.—Scattered returns from 87 precincts over South Dakota show for governor: McMaster, rep., 7121; Crill, dem., 4327; Daley, non-partisan, 2779.

South Carolina Elects McLeod.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Nov. 7.—Thomas G. McLeod, democrat, was elected governor of South Carolina today without opposition. Other members of the state ticket also were unopposed.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 7.—Complete returns from 25 precincts out of 430 in the state for governor give Hunt, dem., 2620; Campbell, rep., 2454.

MUSIC COMPOSER TALKS

MR. LIEURANCE SPEAKS AT LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL.

Audience Listens to Discourse on Indian Languages and Songs From Prominent Authors.

Thurlock Lieurance, the composer of music based upon American Indian themes, delivered an interesting lecture last night in the auditorium of the Lincoln high school under the auspices of the Elwyn lyceum. He was assisted by Mrs. Lieurance, soprano, and George Shuck, flautist. Mr. Lieurance has visited 31 Indian tribes throughout the United States, learned their language, customs, music, and has recorded many of their songs on the phonograph. In one tribe alone, the Cheyenne, he recorded 250 songs! Mr. Lieurance has worked hand in hand with the Ethnological society at Washington. Recently he discovered that an ancient six-toned scale which has been used by the Chinese for a thousand years or more is identical with that of the Cheyenne Indians of our own country. To illustrate this, the lecturer had the scale played upon an old cedar flute made many years ago by a Cheyenne Indian. Afterward Mr. Lieurance and Mr. Tack played one of his own compositions based upon this ancient scale. This six-toned scale played in the key of F sharp was run like this: F sharp, A, C sharp, D, E sharp, F sharp. This scale, as Mr. Lieurance pointed out, is quite in line with the whole-toned scale of the modernists.

Another interesting composition was founded upon a counter charm of the Sioux to the song of the owl which was considered a very unfortunate sound to hear. Mrs. Lieurance illustrated this in a mysterious song, with a flute obligato. She makes a picturesque little Indian maiden, and her voice is extremely agreeable, more of a rich mezzo than soprano in quality. The audience appeared to enjoy her singing. But if one were disposed to be captious, it seemed rather pity that there was not more of the direct experience of the lecturer, the composer, the investigator into all this interesting matter of racial music. Any pretty girl with a luscious voice could render the songs as Lieurance finally wrote them. But one sensed their vital meaning more when the lecturer rasped out the themes with their touch of savagery. Mr. Lieurance made a perfect mine of thrilling Indian yarns. If one could induce him to tell them.

He had a collection of Indian flutes made in various styles by different tribes, some of which were illustrated by Mr. Tack. All had a plaintive sound, but were musical in effect. The lecture was highly educational.

JOHNSON'S ELECTION DECLARED ASSURED

Vote of 300,000 for Senator Forecast.

RICHARDSON ALSO AHEAD

Election of Seven Republican and Two Democratic Candidates for Representative Conceded.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—Albert E. Boynton, chairman of the republican state central committee, predicted at 9 o'clock tonight a victory for Hiram W. Johnson for senator by 300,000 and for Richardson for governor by 150,000.

Seven republican and two democratic representatives in congress were conceded re-election from California today, leaving California with the fifth, seventh, eighth and tenth districts, where there was no doubt as to the outcome in only two districts. The two democrats, Clarence F. Lea and John E. Baker, and four of the republicans, John I. Nolan, Henry E. Barbour, Arthur M. Free and Henry Z. Osborne, from the fifth, seventh, eighth and tenth districts, were unopposed.

Charles F. Curry, Julius Kahn and Phil D. Swine, representatives from the third, fourth and 11th districts, had only socialist opponents. Slowdown of the count made it difficult to determine at an early hour the results in the ninth district, where Walter F. Lineberger of Long Beach, the republican incumbent, was opposed by former Representative Charles H. Randall, democrat and prohibitionist nominee, and in the sixth district in Alameda county. In the sixth district James H. Macfarland of Oakland, republican, had W. Brunk and Mrs. L. W. Boales, democratic and socialist nominees, were candidates to fill the place of the late J. Arthur Easton.

Partial returns from 56 precincts in the state on propositions show: For No. 1, veterans' validating act, yes 469, no 151; No. 2, prohibition enforcement, yes 1084, no 411; No. 3, veterans' bond act, yes 339, no 147; No. 19, water and power act, yes 486, no 1113.

The 2:30 P. M. tabulation gave for senator in 629 precincts: Johnson, rep., 8156; Pearson, dem., 3470; Needham, pro., 30; Sinclair, soc., 22. Los Angeles contributed 7700 votes to this total. For lieutenant-governor 326 precincts gave: Young, rep., 10,422; Shearer, dem., 3696; King, soc., 29.

Returns at 9:30 tonight gave Richardson, rep., 26,055; Woolwine, dem., 14,419; Horr, soc., 41, for governor to returns from 77 precincts scattered throughout 22 counties. Of these votes, 20,000 are from Los Angeles county.

Greeks Reported Burned.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—A message from the Greek consul-general at Beirut, according to the Greek legation here, says that the Turks have burned Greek prisoners in the concentration camp at Caesarea and massacred the Christian inhabitants of that city. Eight Greek officers, by the consul-general adds, were shot by order of Kemal Pasha, on the charge of breaking the rules for prisoners.

LA GRANDE, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—Practically the entire politically interested citizenship of La Grande was gathered in the Rex hall in La Grande to receive newspaper election returns. When The Oregonian conceded Walter M. Pierce's election by a majority of 20,000, a committee was immediately dispatched to Pierce's farm, where Mr. Pierce had retired at the close of a strenuous campaign, and returned with the governor-elect.

Mr. Pierce was greeted with a wonderful reception by the La Grande citizens. He was introduced to the large crowd by Senator Bruce Dennis, who remarked: "Now that our fellow citizen, Mr. Pierce, is governor, although he and I have had many political differences in the past, he is my governor and I will help him in every way to give Oregon a good administration."

"I sincerely thank the good people of the state of Oregon who have placed their trust in me, and I pledge myself to be a governor of all the people. I trust that the people will forget the things said by all sides in the campaign which has just come to an end, and I wish to say that I have forgotten them already. Again I wish to thank the good people of the state, and I will give them the best service that is within my power," said Mr. Pierce.
