

PRICE CUTS LEAD TO SHUT-OUT PLAN

Prise of Company Admitted. When on the stand and under cross-examination by J. Barrett Carter, attorney for the company, Mr. Dant was shown a copy of a letter which he wrote to Henry Ward Beer, federal trade prosecutor, and in which he said that he believed that the Douglas Fir Exploitation company was of "great benefit to the lumber trade."

Practically all of the big mills doing a cargo business to the orient are members of the Douglas Fir Exploitation company. Officers of the big organization declared that they had been operating with the understanding that they had the complete approval of the federal trade commission.

The hearing was adjourned in mid-afternoon yesterday for the purpose of giving all parties time to prepare for the session today. At this time the company will have its opening before the commission and officers will take the stand in defense of the charges that have been made by the commission.

CAR SHORTAGE NOW WORST EVER KNOWN
Immediate Relief in Northwest Imperative.

URGENT MESSAGE SENT TO INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION FOLLOWING CONFERENCE HERE.

That the Pacific northwest is helpless in the grip of the worst car shortage it has ever known and that immediate relief is imperative was the gist of an urgent statement framed and forwarded to the interstate commerce commission by officials of the public service commission of Oregon.

The emergency confronting the northwest states because of continued and increasing car shortage has become so severe that a conference between the public service commissions, the rail lines and shippers of the three northwest states met today in Portland.

"It appears that western lines are losing cars steadily by destruction with eastern lines and that conditions are, in this respect, growing rapidly worse." This was the chief complaint of the public service commission, which met today in Portland.

"We urge that you take immediate action; first, to place empty refrigerator equipment in immediate movement in priority list on par with most perishable perishables."

Newton McCoy and Thomas Kerrigan of the public service commission represented the state body at the conference, held in the courthouse, railroad officials reported conditions are extremely bad as regards car supply, due in large part to use of northwest freight cars by eastern and middle western lines.

The Southern Pacific already owns more than \$8,000 freight cars. The addition to this number just authorized is welcomed as being a substantial benefit to shippers.
