

## DEMOCRATS TO GAIN IN BIG COMMITTEES

Party Chiefs Begin to Figure New Alignments.

## GREEN TO BE CHAIRMAN

Retirement of Fordney Means Place Will Go to Ranking Republican From Iowa.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 10.—By cutting down the republican majority in the house, democrats in the next congress will obtain larger representation on all of the big committees by which the most important legislation is framed. Leaders of both parties began figuring today on the new alignments.

As it now stands, the ways and means committee, which reported the revenue, tariff and bonus bills, consists of 25 members, 17 republicans and eight democrats. As the lineup is determined by the size of the house majority, democrats, it was stated, will insist upon a division of 14 to 11. Retirement of Chairman Fordney means that Representative Green, Iowa, ranking republican, will become chairman under the seniority rule system.

**Footings to Be Changed.**

Because of the large number of subcommittees, which prepare the supply bills, the appropriations committee, consisting of 23 republicans and 12 democrats, is expected to stand at about the ratio. But all committees now composed of 15 republicans and six democrats probably will go on a 12-to-9 footing.

The rules committee, still powerful in itself, generally stands eight to four, regardless of majority. Defeat of Chairman Volstead of the judiciary committee, will make Representative Graham of Pennsylvania chairman.

**Representative Grist in Line.**

All bills relating to prohibition are considered by the judiciary committee. Mr. Graham, among the few members who refused to vote one way or the other when the Volstead measure was put up for passage some time ago.

Representative Grist of Pennsylvania stands in line for chairman of the postoffice committee in place of Chairman Stevenson, defeated. Only two big committee chairmen were defeated—Volstead and Stevenson—and both come from Minnesota.

**Under the seniority system,** Representative Snell of New York will be head of the rules committee, succeeding Chairman Campbell, defeated in the Kansas primary.

**Republicans Lead by 20.**

There will be 20 more republicans than democrats in the next house of representatives and 11 more republicans than democrats in the next senate unless results indicated by practically complete returns are overturned.

In the house the republican majority over the combined democratic and scattering vote will be 19, while in the senate it will be 19. In the present congress republicans have a house plurality of 165 over the democrats and a majority of 145 over all. In the senate the republican majority over the democrats is 24 with no scattering votes.

The lineup of the new house heretofore listed as including 225 republicans and 207 democrats, was altered to 226 republicans and 206 democrats today through a change in technical party affiliations by one of the successful candidates in Tuesday's election.

**Affiliation Changed by One.**

Representative Guy E. Campbell of the 26th Pennsylvania district who in the past two campaigns has run as a "republican democrat," but who was carried heretofore on the official house membership roll as a democrat, requested the house clerk to list him hereafter as a republican. The request was complied with, making the party division of the new congress as compared with the present division as follows:

**Sealed Box Holds Secret.**

GHARD, Kan., Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—A sealed ballot box in the Crawford county courthouse here today contained the secret of the exact plurality by which W. H. Sproul of Sedan, republican, has been elected to represent the third Kansas congressional district. So close was the race that this district was the last in the entire United States in which the result was definitely determined. With one precinct missing out of 302 in the district, the complete unofficial vote gave Sproul a lead of 529 votes over his democratic opponent, Charles Stephens of Columbus.

**Montana Betting Law Wins.**

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 10.—Scattered returns on the amendment to permit pari-mutuel betting in Montana seemed to indicate today that the total vote tabulated to date is as yet too small to be accurate. The soldier bonus apparently passed, as did the measure for a state tax commission. Senator K. Wheeler, democratic candidate for the United States senate, has slightly in excess of 16,000 with 246 out of 1526 precincts yet to be compiled over Carl W. Riddick, his republican opponent.

**Sweet Elected by 4000.**

DENVER, Nov. 10.—William E. Sweet, democrat, was elected governor of Colorado by a majority of approximately 4000 votes over Benjamin Griffith, republican. Ten scattering precincts which were not available until the official count, the republican state chairman conceded could not change the result.

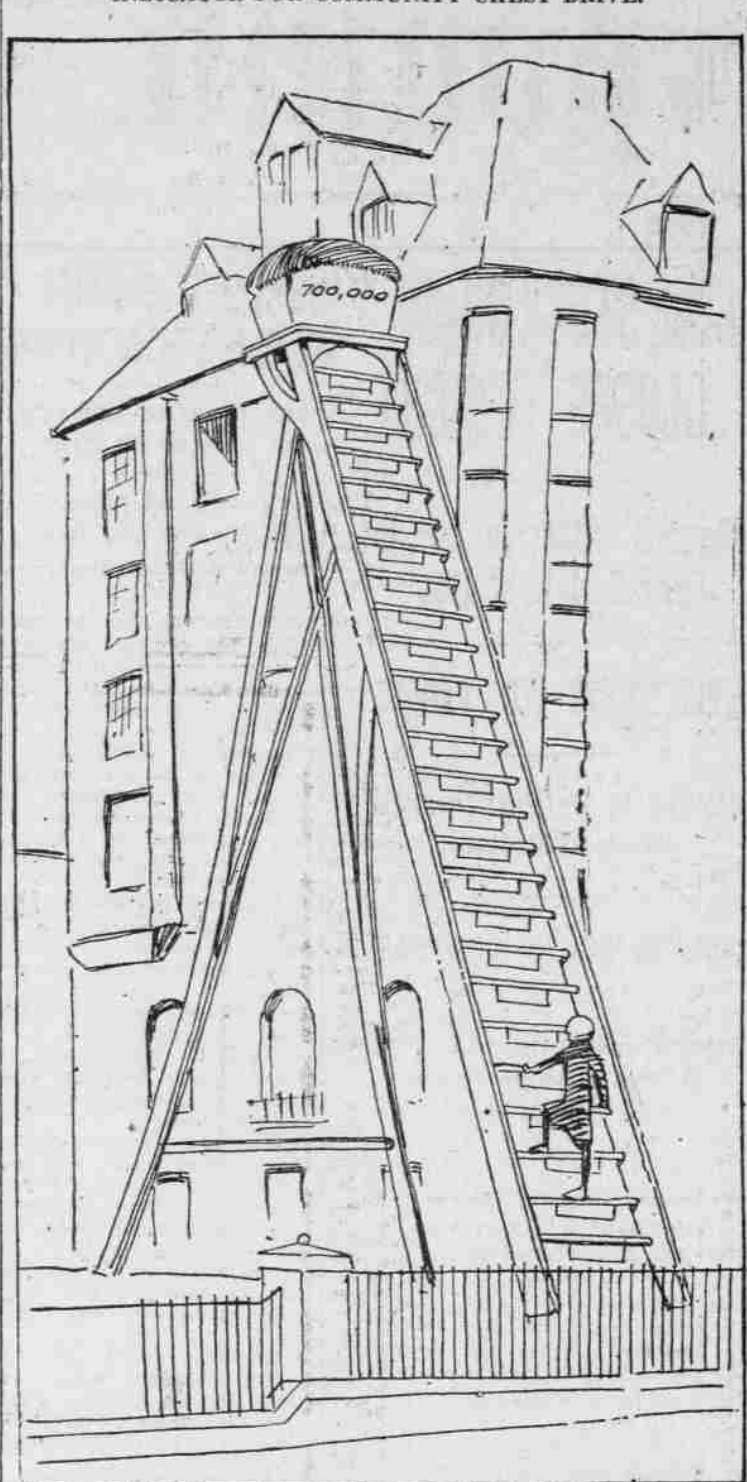
**Miss Pyle Maintains Lead.**

**Sproul Ahead in Missouri.**

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Complete unofficial figures from Tuesday's election in the Third Kansas district give for representatives in congress: W. H. Sproul, rep., 57,714; Charles Stephens, dem., 57,326. These figures were not available until today when the ballot box of a missing precinct in Crawford county was opened by county commissioners in making the official count.

**3 KILLED IN INDUSTRY**

State Accident Commission Reports on Week.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special.)—Three deaths due to industrial accidents during the week ending November 9 according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were: August Ulrich, chaser, Olney; Andrew Bredberg, quarryman, Olney; and W. R. Wallace, head rigger, Portland.

Of the total number of accidents reported 473 were subject to the provisions of the compensation act, 34 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the provisions of the law and 17 were from public utility corporations not subject to the provisions of the compensation act.

In preventing grave developments, and said his loyalty and high-minded views of the situation weighed heavily in the balance for peace. The Mudania armistice, however, was not a personal success, and not a French success—it was a common success which was far from being decisive.

In explaining the withdrawal of the French troops from Chanak at the time the British declared their determination to hold the town, the face of the Turkish advance toward the Dardanelles, the premier declared it was an error to interpret the Mudania armistice as an abandonment of her allies.

**POINCARÉ, CURZON TO MEET**

Conference Likely to Be Held in Paris Early Next Week.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—A conference between Premier Poincaré and Lord Curzon, the British foreign secretary, and Premier Mussolini of Italy probably will be held in Paris the first of next week, it was indicated in official circles today. France has approved the meeting, providing it does not delay the opening of the Lausanne near east conference beyond November 12.

The purpose of the conference of the allied leaders in Paris, if held, would be to present a solid front at Lausanne on the chief peace terms.

**TURKS OFF TO LAUSANNE**

Relations With Bulgaria Are Declared to Be Good.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Imet Pasha and the other members of the Turkish national delegation to the near east peace conference passed through Sofia today on the way to Lausanne.

Imet told the Associated Press correspondent that the Turkish-Bulgarian relations now were good and would grow better. He said the Lausanne conference would be called on November 12.

## "TIGER" DISCLAIMS INTENT TO PREACH

Ex-Premier Has No Thought of Advising America.

## PLAIN TRUTH TO BE TOLD

Clemenceau to Talk on All Big Issues and Leave Hearers to Draw Conclusions.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Ex-Premier Clemenceau, who sails tomorrow for the United States on a personal mission designed to improve Franco-American relations, spent today in saying au revoir to scores of old friends who crowded his little house to wish him luck on his venture.

The veteran statesman was like a schoolboy. The Associated Press correspondent found him in excellent health and looking happy, but exceedingly impatient to get aboard the steamship Paris.

"Well, I'm ready for the Americans," he told the correspondent. "This is a big event in my life, but I think I shall live through it, despite the overwhelming hospitality of the Americans."

"As I am about to depart for New York I should like all Americans to understand the purpose of my mission. In the first place, I am going to talk in English and, in so far as I am capable, in good American English."

**French for Time Barred.**

"That is where France has made a mistake in the past. None of its representatives could speak the language of the country. I am not going to speak any French until I get back."

"I am going to talk about all the issues which are international and which concern any country with a world position like America, but I am not going to tell America what she ought to do."

"I am going to tell them what I think, what I know. They can draw their own conclusions. The Americans are wise; they like the truth, and I am going to give it to them. I know it is a cost of \$20,000, while I like them very much. That should make my task easier."

"Naturally, I am going to talk about the German reparations and the league of nations. Why shouldn't I? They are world questions and concern every big nation, even America."

"I don't think America knows her power in the world today. She is great, beyond her imagination. I shall tell the Americans just how powerful they are and how important this power is to the future of the world."

**"Tiger" Trained for Tour.**

Clemenceau laughed when he told how he had decided to speak in only four cities and to sail from New York on his return trip December 13, taking the same boat on which he goes over.

"You know a good show must last too long," he said, "and the audience gets tired and misses the point."

Clemenceau has been in training for his American tour, visiting three hours daily and following a careful diet.

"I am going to continue this in America," he said, "I can go to any banquets, if I must. Probably, however, I will do what Taft is supposed to have done as president—eat nothing but the digesters, then get a sandwich afterward."

**Bill to Be Rushed.**

Mr. Edmunds, as acting chairman of the merchant marine committee, sent out letters to all members of the committee urging them to be on hand on Monday, November 20, when congress convenes. ## STATE SPENDS \$20,724

DEFICIENCY APPROPRIATIONS MADE AT SALEM.

\$5000 Set Aside to Build Dormitory for Girls at Industrial School.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special.)—The state emergency board, at a special meeting held here today, created deficiency appropriations aggregating \$20,724.16.

The appropriations included \$5000 additional money for the erection of a new dormitory at the state industrial school for girls, \$850 to care for the expenses of the supreme court and \$15,000 to meet the demands of state-aided institutions for the care of homeless, neglected and abused children, foundlings and indigent orphans.

The legislature appropriated \$15,000 for the support of the institutions caring for needy children two years ago, but this appropriation has been exhausted. Additional money for the supreme court was necessitated because of the employment of a cost of \$30,450, while L. C. Inman of Silverton will install the heating plant at a cost of \$2418.

Theodore Barr received the contract for the plumbing at a cost of \$2900. Work on the structure probably will start within the next few weeks. The new building will replace the dormitory which burned last summer.

## CANDIDATE IS PUNISHED

MILLIONAIRE FINED FOR CORRUPT PRACTICES.

C. Fred Edwards, West Virginia Senate Aspirant, Deprived of Right to Vote.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Nov. 10.—Political history in West Virginia was written today, when C. Fred Edwards, millionaire Huntington mattress manufacturer and defeated candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator in the August primaries, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$1000, costs and deprived of his right to vote for the next three years.

Judge D. E. Matthews, lifelong friend, who recalled Edwards' "Horatio Alger" like rise in the world from a barefoot boy to one of the leading manufacturers of this district, imposed sentence on two indictments when Edwards pleaded "nolo contendere." One charged him with being one day late in returning his sworn post-campaign statement of campaign expenditures to the secretary of state. On this he was fined \$1000.

The other charge grew out of Edwards' campaign expenditures. He was indicted for having distributed \$75,000 in this county alone as a part of the \$36,000 he expended in the state. The West Virginia corrupt practices law, under which charges were returned, limited expenditures to \$75 a county or \$4125 for the entire commonwealth. On this count he was disfranchised for three years.

When the fine was imposed Edwards sat stunned for a moment, because he was but one day late in filing the statement he anticipated the minimum fine of \$50. Had this been given the manufacturer would have accepted his fate. But \$1000 was too much, his counsel told the court. The pleas were withdrawn and constitutionality of the state act will be attacked in appeals to the state supreme court.

Edwards' defense was that Attorney-General Daugherty in Washington had told him the United States supreme court's ruling in the Newberry case permitted candidates for the senate to expend as much money as they chose.
