

## MR. LAW SEEMS TO BE VICTOR

### Conservatives Winning in British Elections.

## LOYD GEORGE WAY BEHIND

### Lady Astor Named, but by Much Smaller Plurality.

## LABOR MAKES BIG GAIN

### 39 More Seats Captured—Notable Victories Won in Big Industrial Districts.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—At 6 o'clock this morning the returns in yesterday's elections indicated that Mr. Lloyd George was way behind.

The returns showed the standing of the parties as follows: Conservatives 133, labor 66, Liberals 25, George's Liberals 22, others 8.

The conservative party has returned more members to parliament than all the other parties combined, so far as returns completed Wednesday night show.

The labor party is considered due for congratulations. Labor's seats are all in the congested industrial areas, notably in Glasgow, where predictions that labor would triumph have been fulfilled, and the results of the last election overturned by a flood of laborite votes.

The conservative and George's Liberals are being ousted in several London districts.

This was the most striking feature of the returns, but may be balanced by counts to be made today.

Two members of the government were defeated, Colonel Leslie Wilson, chief conservative whip, and Colonel Stanley, under-secretary for home affairs.

All of the women candidates Lady Astor is the only one returned thus far.

The prime minister, Andrew Bonar Law, carried the central division of Glasgow by a comfortable majority, while ex-Premier Asquith had a narrow escape in his Paisley constituency, where he just missed out the laborite.

Colonel Arthur Lynch of Boer war memory, standing as a laborite in Hackney central, was defeated, being at the bottom of the poll. Lynch was colonel of an Irish brigade on the Boer side during the South African war. He was convicted of high treason, but was granted a full pardon by King Edward.

Colonel Bury Elected.

Colonel Howard Bury, noted explorer and one of the Mount Everest expedition, was elected on the conservative ticket for Wolverhampton.

Miss Susan Lawrence, laborite, was defeated by C. W. Crook, conservative, for Eastham, North.

Sir Alfred Mond, minister of health in the Lloyd George cabinet, keeps his seat in West Swanssea. Sir Henry Norman, George's Liberal, retains his seat for Blackburn, sharing representation of the borough, as before, with conservative Sir Harry Brittain, conservative, who was re-elected for the Acker division of Middlesex, defeating the laborite, Miss Richardson.

Labor won a big victory in Sheffield, Attercliffe division, C. H. Wilson capturing the seat from the George's, T. W. Casey, by a vote of 16,296 to 7582. This is one of the biggest turnovers thus far, Casey being elected for the last time with a vote of 12,398 to the laborite candidate's 6538.

Another striking labor gain was in New Castle-on-Tyne, central division, where C. E. Trevelyan, one of labor's "intelligentists," defeated the retiring conservative, Sir George Renwick, 12,795 to 6629. Renwick had a majority of 4438 over the laborite in the last election.

Mr. Trevelyan was parliamentary secretary to the board of education in 1914 when he resigned from the government as a protest against the policy which involved Great Britain in the war.

In Wales, James Ramsay MacDonald, for the laborites, wrested the Aberavon division of Glamorgan-shire from the liberals. He polled 14,315, the conservative, S. H. Byass, 11,111 and the George's Liberal, Major J. Edwards, 5283.

Conservatives Win Seats.

Labor also captured East Swanssea from the liberals, the Keighley division of Yorkshire from the conservatives, the Brightside division of Ilkeston division of Derbyshire, where they ousted Lloyd George's follower, Major General J. F. B. Seely, who was secretary for war in 1914.

Among the conservative gains were East Cardiff from Asquith, and the Beckham division of Camberwell from the George's.

The Asquithians won Bethnal Green, southwest, from the conservative. (Continued on Page 2, Column 4.)
