

OFFICIAL MAJORITY OF PIERCE 34,237

Returns From Every County Completely Tabulated.

HAWLEY NOT OPOSED

Overturn-Bradbury Race Shown to Have Been Closest Contest for Legislature.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 23.—(Special.)—Walter M. Pierce, democratic, defeated Ben W. Olcott, republican, for governor at the recent general election by a majority of 34,237 votes.

Mr. Pierce carried 29 of the 36 counties in the state, some of which returned him a vote of almost two to one over his republican opponent.

Counties in which Governor Olcott defeated his democratic opponent included Benton, Gilliam, Hood River, Klamath, Lake, Malheur and Wheeler.

The vote on governor follows: Ben W. Olcott, republican, 99,155; Walter M. Pierce, democrat, 133,392; Pierce majority, 34,237.

Mr. Hawley Unopposed. In the first congressional district W. C. Hawley, for representative, was unopposed. He had received both the republican and democratic endorsements and polled a vote of 64,567.

In the second congressional district the official returns showed that N. J. Sinnott, republican, defeated Harvey Graham, democrat, by a majority of 70,175 votes.

In the third congressional district, Multnomah county, Elton Watkins, democrat, defeated C. N. (Pat) McArthur, republican, by a plurality of 992 votes.

Justice George H. Burnett, John McCourt and John L. Hand were unopposed for re-election. Justice Burnett received a majority of 48,224 votes in this contest.

Justice A. Churchill, republican, for state superintendent of public instruction, defeated S. S. George, independent, by a majority of 68,271 votes.

Analysis of the returns for circuit judge, state senator and representatives in the legislature, based on the vote in every county in Oregon with the exception of Multnomah, showed that the closest race for the latter office was in the 21st district, where H. J. Overturn defeated R. E. Bradbury by 27 votes for the third seat in the house.

Numerous Errors Made. Returns from most of the counties were received several days ago, but because of numerous errors in the tabulating of the secretary of state was compelled to return a number of the tally sheets for correction.

ROADS OUT OF POLITICS

CAPABLE MEN FOR HIGHWAY COMMISSION PROMISED.

Governor-Elect Says Appointees Will Not Represent Party Nor Geographical Divisions.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 23.—(Special.)—Existing conditions will require the appointment of capable men as highway commissioners without regard to political affiliations or geographical location, was the assertion made by Walter M. Pierce, governor-elect, in a telegram received from him this morning by A. W. Norblad.

The telegram, which was dated at Grande, was as follows: With highway bonds outstanding almost to the limit, with miles of highway demanding repairs, with many unfinished portions of the highway, with the situation demanding that I appoint commissioners of the highest type without thought of their political alignment or geographical location.

The message from Mr. Pierce was in reply to one sent him by Mr. Norblad and Mrs. Fred Assenheimer of Gardiner, Or., chairman and secretary of the meeting held in Portland last Sunday evening by 28 delegates, representing the seven coast counties, asking Mr. Pierce that in naming the new state highway commissioners he recognize the coast counties and appoint one member from this district.

OREGON EPIDEMIC WANES

Intestinal Trouble Disappearing From University.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 23.—(Special.)—The intestinal epidemic which has been causing much suffering among the students of the university for the last three weeks is disappearing, according to word announced by the university health dispensary today. Last week the men of the football team were afflicted at the same time, since they dine together at the same training table daily.

The malady is characterized by severe headaches and nausea. It was diagnosed as caused by the food which is being eaten about the city of Eugene. One physician attributed it to the spray on the fruits. Many cases of the epidemic were reported in Portland and at the Oregon Agricultural college.

Oregon Seniors to Try for Degrees in January.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 23.—(Special.)—Figures given out from the office of the registrar today show that 15 seniors in the university will be graduated in January at the end of this fall term if they fulfill their major requirements and obtain the necessary number of credits.
