

LAUSANNE PARLEY WITH TURKS FAILS

Political Commission Session Called Off.

BRITISH, FRENCH SPLIT

M. Barriere Demands Instructions From Premier Poincare as to What Attitude to Take.

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LAUSANNE, Nov. 26.—The near east conference has broken down. Tomorrow's meeting of the first, the political commission, to discuss the Turkish southern frontiers concerning Mosul oil fields, has been canceled. No date has been set for the next meeting.

A disagreement between the British and French as to what policy to pursue has been given as the reason for the break. M. Barriere has demanded instructions from Premier Poincare in Paris as to what attitude to take and whether to make concessions to reach an agreement with Lord Curzon. Lord Curzon's failure to reach a private Anglo-Turk agreement on the Mosul oil fields with Ismet Pasha tonight was another reason.

The Turks have refused to recognize the British seizure of oil lands despite the tempting offers of Lord Curzon, the Turks hoping to obtain full rights of sovereignty in this region through American cancellation of an oil company policy.

One Committee to Meet.

While the conference is broken down, the third, the economic committee, under M. Barriere, is scheduled to meet tomorrow instead of Lord Curzon's committee. It is merely a pretext to mask the situation, as it is not denied that the success of the third committee is dependent upon the first.

Americans can be sure of equal rights in the Mosul oil fields, and can even get preferential treatment if the United States will recognize Ankara and negotiate in the treaty.

Ismet Pasha tonight rejected Lord Curzon's proposition to restore the Mosul region to the Ottoman sovereignty and return ratification of the British petrol concessions.

In the hopes raised by the American commission's warning demand for an open-door policy in the near east, the Turks intend to avoid commitments with other powers until they can get America to participate in the development schemes.

Turks Demand Freedom.

Ismet Pasha tonight declared he wished the American people, the American government and American capital to realize that Turkey seeks to escape the fetters binding her by foreign governments, squeezing special rights and privileges from her.

"Turkey demands independence and freedom to settle her own affairs," Nouri Bey, second Turkish delegate, said. "She realizes that she is incapable of developing her industries alone, as she lacks capital and experience. She prefers to give concessions to Americans, believing that the United States government will not intrude with political pressure in Turkish domestic and foreign affairs if its legitimate rights are protected."

"Turkey prefers to do business with the United States if the United States will stand behind her national who are trading in Turkey and protect them—and therefore the United States—against demands and claims of foreign powers. Pressure is being put on Turkey to grant concessions in Turkish territory in exchange for political freedom. We have not accepted because we wish to confide the exploitation of our natural resources to Americans, in whom we have confidence and whose ability we respect."

TRIALS BY TURKS OPPOSED

Allies Won't Stand for Proposal on Punishing Foreigners.

LAUSANNE, Nov. 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—The position of the United States on Turkish capitulations probably will be found to be not essentially different from the French and English positions, particularly the French, when the time comes to discuss that delicate topic.

All the great powers undoubtedly will follow America's lead in insisting that foreigners accused of crime still shall come to trial before foreign courts in Turkey and that foreign or at least mixed tribunals shall have jurisdiction in property disputes involving foreigners.

It seems likely that France will propose the establishment of judicial guarantees as a substitute for capitulations touching on judicial privileges enjoyed by foreign residents.

France has a large Moslem population in her north African colonies who were loyal to France in the great war and she has logical reasons for insisting upon equitable treatment for the Mohammedan population at this moment when Turkey's political status in the world is definitely fixed. Like the United States, however, France probably will not submit to having her citizens tried by Turkish courts, which are essentially founded on Moslem laws.

When it comes to the taxation of foreign property and the fixing of the customs tariff, France probably also will be found ranged beside the American position. France undoubtedly will propose some plan whereby foreign property in Turkey will be obliged to contribute some revenue to the Turkish state and an impartial international examination of the Turkish customs tariff problem, like that accorded China as the outgrowth of the Washington conference.

FIGHT FOR SON IS LOST

Ex-Waitress From Chicago to Appeal Case, She Says.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 26.—Mrs. Gladys Frankenstein, formerly a waitress in Chicago, lost her fight yesterday in court here to cancel adoption of her son Kenneth, 5 years old, by Miss Nellie Cornish, a student at a Seattle school of music.

Miss Cornish, a foster daughter of Mrs. Walter Graffie, whose husband was said to be a wealthy spice merchant in Chicago, said that she would return to that city with the lad. Mrs. Frankenstein's husband, Al Frankenstein, announced that the case would be appealed. The Frankensteins are starting for Chicago in the morning.

CAUSE OF GRAVITY FOUND

ETHER WAVES BELIEVED TO PRODUCE FORCE.

Astronomer at Mare Island Navy Yard Announces Deductions After 40 Years' Work.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 26.—Discovery of the cause of gravitation—something that Sir Isaac Newton, discoverer of the law of gravitation, could not find—has been made by an American naval officer, Captain T. J. See, government astronomer at the Mare Island navy yard, near here. Captain See announced his discovery in a lecture before the California Academy of Sciences here today.

Discovery by Captain See of the cause of magnetism, which was also announced in the lecture, led to the finding of a definite connection between magnetism and gravity. Both, he said, are due to invisible ether waves traveling across the heavenly spaces with the speed of light.

For 40 years Captain See has been doing research work in magnetism and gravity. He has completed this work, chiefly, since 1914.

The astronomer said his theory is a distinct development on Newton's law of gravitation. Magnetism, he explained, is a million times more powerful than the corresponding force of gravitation.

Captain See demonstrated during his address that a small magnet, when suspended by a thread near a larger one, is pulled bodily toward the nearer pole of the larger magnet. Yet, he showed that while the nearer pole has the greater power, the remoter pole of the large magnet actually pulls back on the opposite end of a magnetic needle suspended by a thread about its center.

The result is to make the lines of force, tension lines, stretched like tight ropes.

At the equator, therefore, the two poles of the earth's magnetism, being equally distant, attract equally in opposite directions. But at the poles the needle stands on end and is pulled downward bodily by the magnetic force.

By an extension of the theory of the earth's magnetism by Gauss, celebrated German mathematician, in 1838, Captain See draws two conclusions:

1. That magnetism is due to waves, the rotatory motion of the ether particles being about the lines of force, which is also confirmed by Faraday's experiment of the magnetic rotation of a beam of polarized light, 1845.

2. As magnetism is connected with gravitation by See's mathematical law of 1922, it follows that gravitation also is due to waves like those of magnetism.

OLD PARTIES SNUBBED

President of Women's Organization Ignores Election.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26.—The democratic and republican parties received a gentle snub from Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont, society leader and president of the national woman's party, who sailed yesterday on the Majestic for Europe. She will spend the winter at her home in the Riviera.

"My goodness," she said when asked what she thought of the recent elections. "I haven't given them a thought. The democrats and republicans don't pay any attention to us these days. Why should we worry about them?"

She added that her party would continue to operate independently in national political affairs and that it would be an organization to reckon with in 1924.

VESSEL FARES TO DROP

North Atlantic Passenger Rates to Be Reduced Sharply.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—Sharp reductions in first and second-class passenger rates on vessels plying north Atlantic waters are to be announced soon, this step having been agreed upon at a conference of north Atlantic steamship companies, which has just ended here.

The lower fares were adopted in the hope of stimulating American touring to Europe.
