Problem of Dressmaking

PORTLAND, Nov. 2.—Dear Madam Richer: I have a dress like the illustration, made of sample material. It has brown velvet around the neck and sleeves. The three-quarter-inch belt is run through two in front and two brown cords of the same material. The skirt is long with the underskirt coming in at the waist. The skirt has one seam and is 56 inches around the bottom and comes to within an inch of my shoes.

If you have any suggestions as to how I could make this dress over without too great an expense, and labor I'd be very thankful. I am 31 years old, 5 feet 3 inches tall, weigh 130 pounds and am blonde.

MRS. W. H. H.—There seems to be one style which will solve, and solve your problem. Combine your material with a pretty tulle or silk, using the latter for the lower portion of the blouse and upper half of skirt. The model is shown in the winter quarterly of the Butterick on page 17, No. 3589. The scheme of materials for your dress will be just the reverse of that shown, but will be equally attractive. Remove the pleatings from your sleeve and neck and finish with a piping of the froul. The over skirt you now have will be of value in widening the back in the form of an inset and lined on the seams with a row of tiny buttons made of the new material. Be sure that a pretty tulle or silk is a most lovely green as shown in the sample and a combination of the gold, black, henna and royal blue.

ROAD BIDS TO COME UP

Highway Contracts for 25 Miles Are to Be Considered.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 28.—(Special.)—The state highway commission, at a meeting held in Portland December 13, will receive bids for the construction of state highways aggregating 25.5 miles.

The projects, which proposals will be considered include:

One mile of paving in the city of Rainier on the lower Columbia river front and extending to Chehalis on the Willamette highway in Lane county.

Two and three-tenths miles of paving from Dr. J. J. Cross' crossing south on the Pacific highway in Lane county.

Half mile of paving on Murder creek on the Pacific highway two miles north of Albany in Lane county.

Seven and four-tenths miles of rock from Sandy to Chaverville on the Mount Hood road in Clackamas county.

Eight and seven-tenths miles of grading and rock from Goshen to Lowell on the Willamette highway in Lane county.

Four and one-tenth miles of grading and rock from Goshen to Chehalis on the Willamette Valley-Florence highway in Lane county.

The last two projects will be paid for by Lane county. The state will award the contracts and supervise the work.

Oregon City Has Fire.

OREGON CITY, Or., Nov. 28.—(Special.)—Damage to the extent of \$6000 was done by a fire in the old United Women's hall at Seventh and Central streets early today. The upper part of the hall, which was vacant, was burned and the Hub grocery and Seventh street meat market sustained considerable damage by water. The fact that two men were seen leaving the stairway about half an hour before the fire broke out to the theory of incendiarism.

4000 Fail to Pay Poll Tax.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 28.—(Special.)—Forty per cent of the Clarke county residents subject to the poll tax have not yet paid it, although it became delinquent six months ago. Some delinquents are paying, however. There is small probability that the tax will be paid, said Sheriff Thompson. The indifference to the tax was largely due to the fact that it was repealed by a big majority at the last election.

CIRCLE, ALASKA, LISTENS IN

Oregonian Radio Programme Enjoyed in Far North.

Sunday night's sacred concert programme broadcast from The Oregonian's new station was enjoyed at Circle, Alaska, a few miles from the Arctic circle, according to a telegram received yesterday. The message, sent by George S. Barnett, radio operator of the United States Signal Corps station at Circle, follows:

"Last night my wife and I enjoyed music by First Unitarian church broadcast by KGW. After numerous attempts, I first heard you Friday night, my wife obtaining extracts of a speech in shorthand. You are the first broadcasting station received here intelligently."

Circle, Alaska, is easily 1800 miles from Portland as the crow flies and is surrounded by high mountain peaks.

Another state in the union was added to the growing list of those from which reports have been received. A telegram from Artesia, N. M., written by L. P. Evans, said in part:

"I thought possibly you might be interested in knowing that I tuned in on your station last night and received a part of your programme very clearly. We are approximately 1500 miles by air line from Portland."

The total number of states heard from is now 24.

Letters from many sections of California, Ohio, Canada, Colorado, Texas, Indiana, Nebraska, Wyoming, Minnesota and Iowa, were among those received by The Oregonian yesterday.

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
