

## MORE FUNDS ASKED FOR VICE CLEANUP

Seattle Mayor Proposes  
Use of Fines.

## BIG PROBLEM IS SEEN

Bootleggers and Narcotic Dealers  
Declared Outbidding City for  
Detectives' Services.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., Nov. 30.—More money must be raised and spent if any real progress is to be made in the cleanup of Seattle's moral health, according to Mayor Edwin J. Brown. The mayor proposes that the money shall be raised by increasing the amount of fines in cases of conviction for various offenses. He also proposes that one-half, or at least one-quarter, of the money produced by such fines shall be turned in to an investigation fund for further work, instead of reverting to the general treasury of the city.

To carry out this plan Mayor Brown finds that a new law or laws must be enacted by the state legislature. He would adopt some features of the Oregon law which grants larger jurisdiction to the police courts of cities of certain size. The mayor believes that the police courts in the larger cities of this state should have power to assess fines up to \$500 on conviction of violation of the prohibition and narcotic laws, and for gambling or prostitution. At present the limit in the police court is \$100, corresponding to the jurisdictional limits of all justices of the peace, whether in city or country precincts.

**Much Work Ahead, Says Mayor.**  
Mayor Brown has asked the King county grand jury, now in session, to let him appear and discuss this plan with the members. In an interview today the mayor said that he felt the grand jury was entitled to all the information in his hands relating to vice conditions in Seattle. He also would like to have his new plan incorporated in the grand jury's report to the superior court, with recommendation that it be pressed in the coming session of the legislature.

"I am not dissatisfied with the work that is now being done to suppress the liquor and narcotic traffic and to prevent other violations of law," said the mayor. "But there is so much to be done that we must have better help and better means. We cannot turn the whole police force into a detective squad. Beats must be covered, traffic must be regulated, and our uniformed force is kept busy with the routine of preserving peace and good order. The liquor and drug traffic call for special treatment. We must have the right kind of men, and to get the right kind of men costs more money than we are now able to spend. If the police court could assess fines up to \$500, and if we could use a considerable share of the fine money for our special work, a great deal of good could be done. The court's jurisdiction should also be extended to permit jail sentences up to six months. The danger of heavier fine or sentence, or both, would have powerful effect on lawbreakers."

## Outlaws Outbid City.

"As it is now we cannot pay our special men enough compensation. The bootleggers and narcotic dealers can actually outbid the city for the services of men who would be valuable on our side of the contest. Right now, if I could pick ten men and give them \$250 a month each, we could push our campaign ahead so fast that it would make the bootleggers and drug peddlers dizzy. Our showing for October, the master of prohibition enforcement, broke all records since the state went dry. We obtained, in that month, 296 convictions and collected \$8600 in fines for violations of the liquor laws alone. It would be a good thing if the habitual criminal law of this state could be made to apply to our police courts, so that persons who have been three times convicted might be put away for an indefinite period."

## SUICIDE NOT DESPONDENT

Vaden Boge Cheerful in Last  
Letter to Mother.

HILLSBORO, Or., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—Vaden E. Boge, Hillsboro youth, who died of poison in a Los Angeles hotel Monday, did not give any intimation that he was melancholy or planning to end his life when he wrote a letter to his mother, Mrs. Edward Boge, last Sunday, according to a report today from the Boge home near here following receipt of the letter. Boge told of his trip to Los Angeles, described his impressions of the city, said he intended to stay at the home of his cousin there, and promised his mother he would write to her every week.

Los Angeles police decided Boge ended his own life after calling for luncheon for two in the room which he had engaged for himself "and wife," according to reports from the California city.

The funeral will be held here Sunday if the body arrives in time.

## YOUTH HAS DISTINCTION

Toppishish Boy Held "Most Married" High School Athlete.

YAKIMA, Wash., Nov. 30.—Toppishish high school claims the "most married" high school athlete in the state in the person of William Coleman, 19, who today took as his second wife Knoxville Young. Coleman had to wait for the judge to sign his final divorce decree from Mary Howe before he obtained a license to wed his 17-year-old bride.

Both young people presented written consent from their mothers. Coleman two years ago married Miss Howe in British Columbia. Later the girl sued for divorce and damages from Coleman's parents for alleged alienation of his affections. She was given \$2500 by a jury.

Coleman is the star player on the Toppishish high school football team.

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## GOVERNOR RESENTS SLUR

IDAHO EXECUTIVE ORDERS  
OFFICIAL TO VACATE.

Predatory Animal Inspector Is  
Removed From Capitol for  
Calling Names.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 30.—(Special.)—Luther T. Goldman, predatory animal inspector of the federal bureau of biological survey for the state of Idaho, has been asked by Governor D. W. Davis to vacate the office in the capitol, which has been placed at his disposal by the state administration.

The action was taken because of objectionable and indiscreet language used by Mr. Goldman in correspondence wherein he applied opprobrious epithets to Miles Cannon, commissioner of agriculture, and severely criticized Governor Davis, Mr. Cannon and Mr. Goldman in their respective bulletins to the press from time to time relating to the work of destruction of predatory animals, have carried on a sharp debate for several months. The governor's letter to Mr. Goldman was as follows:

"Boise, Idaho, November 29, 1922.

Luther J. Goldman, predatory animal inspector, Boise, Idaho: My dear Mr. Goldman—This is to notify you to vacate your desk room in the capitol of the state of Idaho. This action is taken in view of the fact that you have been unable to confine yourself to statements of principle wherein your department's standards come in controversy with the laws of Idaho, and have so lost your self control as to indulge in inexcusable personalities. D. W. Davis, governor."

Copies of the offending letter written by Mr. Goldman and of the governor's letter to him have been forwarded. It was said by the governor's secretary, to the secretary of agriculture in Washington. Mr. Goldman's letter was addressed to Otto M. Jones, state game warden. It was dated at Dubois, November 11, and was devoted to the subject of suggested co-operation between the fish and game bureau and the biological survey in use of poison for destruction of predatory animals. Extracts from the letter were as follows:

"Idaho alone remains a stink

among western states. Governor Davis' action in vetoing the predatory animal bills in 1921 is without precedence in the history of the United States, as is also his approval of Miles Cannon's fifth. I have an idea the swine who sits in the office of the state agricultural commission will run up some imposing figures, but your wardens will be a long time collecting their bounties. Understand, I do not blame you because Miles Cannon is a polecat, but you and all Idaho must pay the price and we cannot lose sight of the fact that Governor Davis, your chief executive, places the seal of his approval on Miles Cannon's actions."

Costa Rican Declines Honor.

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica, Nov. 29.—Ricardo Jimenez, who is now in Washington in connection with Costa Rican foreign affairs, has declined to accept the presidency. The office was tendered him by the national congress.
